## MINISTRY OF PRAISE A Word From Deacon Roger Filips

Greetings Prayer Warriors,

The past month has been hard for anyone paying attention to our country. First, we had the Ukrainian refugee who was stabbed to death on a train by a career criminal, apparently because of her skin color. As she bled to death, sobbing, no one on the train moved to help her. Less than a week later we had the Catholic School shooting in Minneapolis which left 2 innocent children dead, and 21 others injured. The transgender shooter shot blindly through stained glass windows during a school Mass.

Then we had the assassination of Charlie Kirk by a shooter who was living with a transgender furry boyfriend. Perhaps surprisingly, this last killing will have more long-term consequences than the other two atrocities. It will take more time to understand what happened that day, but we need to know who Charlie was. News reports call him a "right wing political activist" but he was something much more powerful. He was the most effective Christian evangelist of our time, and all of his policies and politics all flowed from that. The only other religious figures of this importance to the faith in our country's history were Bishop Fulton Sheen and Billy Graham. All of his political positions came from his deep faith in Jesus and in the civilization built by His church, and he told everyone about it. Charlie was an Evangelical Christian, but he often went to Mass with his Catholic wife. He said Mary was the solution to toxic femininity, and he prayed the rosary, so I think we can say he was at least a friend of Catholics.

All three of these murderers had something in common, and it wasn't mental illness. It was likely demonic evil. Demonic influence is not always as obvious as the severe cases you see in movies, it goes through four stages.

Infestation: Strange phenomena that seek to create fear or vulnerability.

Oppression: Demon-caused anxiety, depression or irrational thoughts. The goal is to weaken the person's will and faith.

Obsession: A further loss of control, with intrusive, compulsive thoughts, often blasphemous or self-destructive.

Possession: The most severe stage, when the demon takes partial or full control of the person's body or behavior. Including such things as supernatural strength, speaking unknown languages, aversion to sacred objects or altered personality.

Although only God will truly judge these people, we can draw some lessons already. All three people who committed these crimes had opened themselves to demonic evil by living in serious habitual sin outside of any practice of the faith or sacraments. All three crimes were shocking, with unnecessary violence that did nothing to benefit the criminal. All of the victims were innocent and unsuspecting and their deaths shock us and cause anxiety or depression.

There were countless reports of people going back to church or checking it out for the first time after these incidents. Countless others are leaving Protestant Churches for the Catholic Church. These people usually



could not express why they were finally taking this step, but I think I know: There is high-resolution video of all three crimes. We have all seen and experienced this evil as closely as possible without having been there. When people understand in their gut that evil/Satan really exist, it makes them take seriously the idea that there is also an ultimate good/God that also exists, and they realize they need more of this. Stay close to your faith.


#### ST. PATRICK'S RESTORATION

#### OCTOBER—MONTH OF THE HOLY ROSARY

The rosary is one of the most well known devotions of the Catholic faith, but do you know these facts about it?!

9 Incredible Facts About The Rosary

- 1. The rosary is also known as the "bible on a string" because the Mysteries of the Rosary share the Gospel.
- 2. Catholics are often buried with a rosary for protection.
- 3. In each rosary there are 59 beads, 3 feet of cord, 14 plastic spacers, a metal spacer, a crucifix, and a Miraculous or Saint medal.
- 4. The world's largest rosary is 1965 feet long and is in Beirut. It includes 59 large concrete beads and each one is the size of a car!
- 5. Catholics have been praying the rosary as we know it today since the 13th Century, but monks and hermits as early as the 3rd century used rocks and prayer beads in a similar way.
- 6. The Columbia Gorge Interpretive Center Museum near Stevenson, Washington currently holds the record for the largest collection of rosaries with over 4,000 on display!
- 7. St. Thomas Aquinas gave the longest (known) homily on the rosary and it lasted FORTY days.
- 8. The Roman Catholic Rosary has 59 beads, but the Eastern Orthodox of Greece and Turkey rosary has 100 beads and the Russian Orthodox has 103 beads.
- 9. Catholics may obtain a plenary indulgence once per day by the recitation of the Rosary either in a church, with your family, or a gathering of the faithful (Enchiridion of Indulgences, Grant 17.1).







We are living in an exciting time of revival. Our National Eucharistic Congress, and the Eucharistic processions that led to it, involved hundreds of thousands of Catholics who will never be the same. The revival continues, and is so needed, especially in our efforts to defend human life.

Jesus, truly present in the Eucharist, gives us the fullness of life. He calls each of us to respect that gift of life in every human person. While we live in a society that often rejects those who are weak, fragile, or vulnerable, they are the most in need of our care and protection. Pope Francis reminds us that "every child who, rather than being born, is condemned unjustly to being aborted, bears the face of Jesus Christ, bears the face of the Lord, who even before he was born, and then just after birth, experienced the world's rejection."

The law and millions of our brothers and sisters have yet to recognize this reality. We thankfully no longer live under the regime of Roe v. Wade, and our elected officials are now empowered to reduce or end abortion. But what we now see is that fifty years of virtually unlimited abortion has tragically created a national mindset where many Americans have become comfortable with some amount of abortion. This allows the abortion industry to continue to provide any amount of abortion. Given this challenge, the U.S. bishops have affirmed that, while it is important to address all the ways in which human life is threatened, "abortion remains our pre-eminent priority as it directly attacks our most vulnerable brothers and sisters, destroying more than a million lives each year in our country alone."2

In a tragic way, abortion has become the preeminent priority for others as well. We see many politicians celebrating the destruction of preborn children, and protecting access to abortion, even up until the moment of birth. Few leaders are standing up to limit the harm of chemical abortion (abortion pills) to mothers and children, which is now the most common form of abortion. And heading into the November elections, as many as ten states face gravely evil ballot initiatives that would enshrine abortion in their state constitutions.

Pope St. John Paul II's words resonate today: "we are facing an enormous and dramatic clash between good and evil, death and life, the 'culture of death' and the 'culture of life' ... we are all involved and we all share in it, with the inescapable responsibility of choosing to be unconditionally pro-life."

And so we need a revival of prayer and action:

 We must renew our commitment to work for the legal protection of every human life, from conception to natural death, and to vote for candidates who will defend the life and dignity of the human person.

- We must call for policies that assist women and their children in need, while also continuing to help mothers in our own communities through local pregnancy help centers and our nationwide, parish-based initiative, Walking with Moms in Need.
- We must likewise continue to extend the hand of compassion to all who are suffering from participation in abortion, through the Church's abortion healing ministries like Project Rachel Ministry.
- Most importantly, we must rededicate ourselves to fervent prayer on behalf of life.

I invite all Catholics to join me in a concerted effort of prayer between now and our national elections, by daily praying our Respect Life Month "Prayer for Life to Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament":

Fesus, you came that we might have lifeand have it in abundance. Together with the Father and the Holy Spirit, you form us in our mothers' wombs and call us to love you for all eternity. As your most precious gift of human life is attacked, draw us ever closer to your Real Presence in the Eucharist. Dispel the darkness of the culture of death, for you are the light that shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it. By the power of your Eucharistic Presence, help us to defend the life of every human person at every stage. Transform our hearts to protect and cherish all whose lives are most vulnerable. For you are God, forever and ever. Amen.



Through the graces of this revival, may we witness, work, and vote so that all children in the womb will be protected in law and welcomed in love, and that all mothers and families will be strengthened by our support and accompaniment.



May the steam of our breath in the cool air remind us that it is you who give us the breath of life.


