

*Same family name but two spellings? Why, asked the ever curious translator. LeRoy provided the explanation: in Scandinavian countries, particularly in Iceland, people are known principally by their first names, followed by their "patronymic". If their father is named "Rafn" the sons become: Rafnson, and the daughters become "Rafnsdottir". So Kay's family name is Rafnson. Later on in life, these third generation Rafnson descendants decided that the silent 'n' in their father's last name was too difficult to explain, so all three of them decided to drop the 'n' from their last name. So, then Kay's maiden name was Kay Diane Rafson, no longer Rafnson.

MUCH GRATITUDE TO LUCIE JASMIN

n 16 August 2014, in Chicoutimi, during the last KFA's AGM, a message from Lucie Jasmin was read saying that she would not renew her mandate as a Board Member. She was first elected on 5 August 2006 and, for the past eight years has been a much appreciated volunteer for the Kirouac Family Association. Lucie is a Kirouac, not by blood, however, very much by heart. She was first introduced to the KFA activities when, in August 2003, she attended the KFA annual gathering in Longueuil (Montreal South-Shore) with Brother Gilles Beaudet (a member of the Brothers of the Christian Schools, the order to which belonged Brother Marie-Victorin. Her admiration for our famous cousin, born Conrad Kirouac, had a lot to do with accepting to become a KFA Board Member.

On 7 October 2006, she represented the KFA at The Montreal Botanical Garden's celebrating the 75th Anniversary of the creation of the CJN (Cercles des jeunes naturalistes = young naturalists club) founded by, among others, Brother Marie-Victorin. A few weeks latert, on 23 October 2006, again at the Montreal Botanical Garden, she was part of the KFA delegation when the Bourse Marie-Victorin (M.V. Scholarship) was launched by Montreal University. The following year, on 5 November 2007, she was part of the KFA delegation invited to Montreal University to the launching of Dr. André Bouchard's book entitled Marie-Victorin à (in) Cuba, the correspondence of Marie-Victorin with Brother Léon, published by Montreal University (Les Presses de l'Université de Montréal).

Since 2007, Lucie has been travelling around the Province of Quebec telling people about Marie-Victorin and his work. Her lecture is entitled: Brother Marie-Victorin (Conrad Kirouac 1885-1944) and the Odyssey of the Laurentian Flora. Hence she makes possible for many more people to get to know Conrad Kirouac, the first French-Canadian scientist. And this is just a beginning as, for over two years now, she has been writing a book about Marie-Victorin. We are very eager to see and read her book and we hope it will be in print soon.

In 2008, when the KFA created the *Marie-Victorin* **Observatory**, she immediately accepted to take it on. She is still in charge, and gladly for us all, although she is no longer a Board member she will keep this responsibility. Besides her various tasks and regularly attending the

quarterly Board meetings, she also wrote many articles for Le Trésor des Kirouac.

Her first article entitled, The Best Time of my Life, was an interview with Miss Madeleine Gervais, Brother Marie-Victorin last assistant and secretary from 1942 to his death in 1944, (Le Trésor, #75, March 2004). Then she wrote: I Entered Into the Forest... An Introduction to the Tree: a Meditation by Brother Marie-Victorin (#86, Dec. 2006); followed by: The Botanist (#90, Winter 2007). In 2008, as responsible for the Marie-Victorin Observatory, she presented Brother Gilles Beaudet observations clarifying the comments made by a journalist and published in Le Devoir (a Montreal intellectual daily newspaper) during the previous month of June. The journalist, Louis Cornellier wrote about a recently published book by Alexandre Chouinard, and quoted Brother Marie-Victorin in a rather simplistic/ naive way. (# 92, Summer 2008).

During the KFA annual gathering in Quebec City during the Summer 2008, she told us how her interest in Marie-Victorin was awaken. It is well worth reading that story as it was published under the title: The Improbable meeting (#93,Autumn 2008). Marie-Victorin's Laurentian Flora, was first published in 1935 and is considered the Bible of botany for Eastern Canada. There were celebrations to mark the 75th Anniversary of its publication and Lucie wrote the story of the book: O, My Beautiful Book (#98, Winter 2009-2010). Her last article so far was published in Le Trésor des Kirouac, number 99, entitled *Lullaby* it was dedicated to her mother who had passed away in January 2010.

Among other mandates that Lucie filled on behalf of the KFA, in 2007, she contacted the organizing committee of Longueuil's 350th Anniversary to make sure that Brother Marie-Victorin's contribution to education, during many years, would be rightly acknowledged during the festivities.

Lucie, with Michel Bornais, our past secretary, channelled the special requests from TFO (Ontario's French Television) for help in putting together a programme in their French series for children, *La Quête (The Quest)*, about Brother Marie-Victorin. (see Le Trésor, #88, Summer 2007)

Lucie also had a great part in the making of a video (2DVDs) relating the history of the KFA's first thirty years. She chose the background music and secured the appropriate authorisations from the composers, then helped incorporating and synchronizing the sound track.

She was also greatly responsible, with Brother Gilles Beaudet, to save from destruction (by the printer/editor) of the balance of stock of the book *Mon Miroir*, Marie-Victorin's personal diaries, published in 2004. Thus, if the KFA can still offer you copies of this precious book, it is thanks to Lucie's and Brother Beaudet's quick and effective action.

Above all, what the Board members who worked with Lucie over the past eight years may best remember is Lucie's wisdom and pertinent comments during the Board meetings. Lucie will be greatly missed!

Dear Lucie, if you are not a cousin by blood, you are a precious cousin by heart. Much gratitude for your past contributions; all the best with your present and on-going endeavours and much success in all your future projects and thank you again, and again, to carry on the mission of insuring that Conrad Kirouac is better known!

33th Annual Kirouac Family Association Gathering

Report by Mercédès Bolduc-Villeneuve, translated by Marie Lussier Timperley

This was the fourth gathering held in the Saguenay-Lac-Saint-Jean region since the creation of our family association. This time it was held in Chicoutimi on 15-17 August 2014.

The weekend took off by the spectacular presentation of our kingdom's fabulous story: Fabuleuse histoire d'un royaume at the municipal theatre in La Baie (name of the new amalgamated This remarkable show city). includes lots of pyrotechnical effects like cannons, guns, storms, etc. hundreds of costumes, lights and incredible sets, music and singing, animals and one hundred volunteer actors. Among various scenes, one depicting the WWII struck me particularly when, parachutists, a.k.a. soldiers came

down from the rafters landing among the audience; it was almost too real and brought war very close indeed. Whether young or old, the Kingdom's Fabulous History is a show well worth seeing at least once in a life time. Every one of our group attending the Friday evening performance much appreciated it. Note to our English-speaking cousins, as of this year, an English version of the show will be presented; info on website.

At 8:30 am, Saturday morning, registration started followed by the Annual General Meeting at 10:00 am. After some free time for lunch, all were back for the guided tour of Chicoutimi and Jonquière. Following the road along the land settled by the first Kirouacs in the area was supposed to be added to

the tour. Unfortunately, our guide had not been properly informed about it so it was not included and, personally, I was rather sad that we missed that. However, before the tour all participants had been handed a document including photos of the houses of our K/ pioneers and houses of some of their descendants still living in the area, some houses are no longer standing but others still are. The document also included a map of Jonquière where I had indicated in red ink the first K/ lots. Copies of this document are still available, so if you wish to receive one, simply let me know.

Our guide, Mrs. Laurence Duval, was very competent and pleasant. She knows the area as much as she loves it. She pointed out all the

interesting and beautiful sites in each city. Unfortunately Saturday was rather rainy but there was a patch of blue sky above the old Jonquière cemetery, on Saint-Jean-Baptiste Street, where my greatgreat-grandfather Clovis is buried, and his own father, Emmanuel, as well as other Kirouacs who lived in the area in the past two centuries. Afterwards, we stopped at the Blackburn Cheese Factory to sample some of their delicious cheeses. My, that was good!

Then our guided tour took us to Saint-Dominique Church Jonquière, one of the region's most beautiful churches. The most beautiful according of our guide, Mrs. Duval; however, Jacques Kirouac, our founding president, prefers the Chicoutimi Cathedral. For many years, father Hubert Kéroack was the parish priest of Saint-Dominique in Jonquière; whereas Bishop Sylvio Kéroack, was parish priest at the Chicoutimi Cathedral

There was enough time to take in another sight, so Mrs. Duval took us to the quay in La Baie where cruise ships leave for a tour of the Saguenay Fjord. The view from the pier is magnificent and it was even better as a rainbow lit up the sky just at the right moment. We got back to Hôtel Chicoutimi by 4:30 pm. in time to get ready for the 5:30 cocktail followed by dinner. For the occasion, I welcomed everyone particularly our American cousins: Greg Kyrouac from Ashland, Illinois, and Stacy Trahoon from Topeka, Kansas. family present at the dinner. Eightyeight-year young Lauréat Kirouac came with his daughter, Rachel and her husband, Clément Vaillancourt, their daughter and Lauréat's granddaughter, Josée Vaillancourt and her husband Stéphane Lessard; and Lauréat's five great-grand-children: Antoine, Alexandre and Arnaud (Josée's children), Charles-Édouard and Marie-Rose (Annie's children), Annie being Rachel's daughter). What a beautiful family! It was so nice that they all came to share this evening with us.

Our dinner, prepared by Hôtel Chicoutimi, included a vegetable soup, the famous Lac St-Jean 'tourtière'* and dessert was a strawberry shortcake served in a small 'Mason jar' (a new serving trend here). (*Tourtière as prepared Saguenay-Lac-St-Jean is a scrumptious very deep dish meat (venison) and vegetable pie, quite the opposite to the meat pie, also called 'tourtière' served everywhere else in Ouebec. You do not know what you are missing until you try it. TN)

My sister, Sylvie, went blueberry picking the day before and had prepared small souvenirs for each participant: a small container of fresh blueberries as well as some blueberry-chocolate. That is fresh blueberries dipped into chocolate. Yummy! Many could not resist tasting such delicious treat! (*The region's blueberry are known for their size as well as great taste; people loved to say that it takes only three Lac-St-Jean blueberries to make a pie! TN)

After dinner, Pia Karrer O'Leary presented her numerous photos of Iceland, taken when she was there with the London Photo Club. Pia is award-winning photographer whose outstanding work enhanced bv her perfect commentary. Everyone said how much they had appreciated their evening and loved the fabulous photos of Iceland. The wonderful accompanying music was also from Iceland and I noticed some people tapping the beat on the tables. There was also one French song, the rather well-known "La Paimpolaise" that someone sang along to. It was really great. Many thanks indeed to Pia for this unusual and memorable trip to a Viking country.

On Sunday morning, we went to Mass at the Chicoutimi Cathedral. where Sylvio Kéroack was Parish Priest. The officiating priest welcomed the Kirouac families but unfortunately, forgot to mention the past Kirouac priests. I was a bit sad that this was forgotten but it was a beautiful ceremony.

President's Annual Report presented, on behalf of the KFA Board Members, at the KFA Annual General Meeting held in Chicoutimi, Saturday, 16 August 2014

MEETINGS

Since the last Annual General Meeting in Quebec City on 7 September 2013, three Board meetings were held at Sainte-Foy, Quebec, on 5 October 2013, 1 February 2014 and 3 May 2014.

NOMINATION TO THE KFA BOARD

At the last AGM, some positions on the board remained vacant, hence at its first meeting and as provided in our By-laws, the Board nominated two administrators for a two-year mandate, Mrs. Marie Lussier Timperley and Mr. Marc Villeneuve. However, one post remains vacant.

VISIBILITY OF OUR ASSOCIATION

Again this year, our Association took part in the Salon du Patrimoine familial (Family Heritage Fair) held in Quebec City on 21-23 February 2014. Many thanks indeed to those who worked with me during this event: Mercédès Bolduc-Villeneuve, Céline Kirouac, Lucille Kirouac-Boulet and Marie Kirouac-Royer; Jacques Kirouac, Jean-Yves Laurin and Marc Villeneuve.

Quebec City Genealogical Society contacted the KFA and all family associations as they have initiated a new project called **Armorial du Québec**, to gather data on all crests and coats of arms in use in the Province of Quebec since the beginning of New France. This data will be published on the web site of the *Société de généalogie de*

Québec. The KFA Board has decided to provide the KFA crest to this armorial data bank because it is another way to expand our family association's visibility.

PROJECTS – COMPLETED OR IN PROGRESS

During the past year most efforts were concentrated on updating our website. As you may have noted a great deal of information and photos have been added. We fully intend to keep up this work through 2014 and beyond. As soon as the French site is completed, we will start working on the English site.

We are also working on updating our genealogical dictionary. The first paper version was published in 1991 and comprised about 2,500 names. Presently we have over 18,000 names; about half being descended from our common ancestor. Nonetheless, it will take a few more years before we can offer an updated version of our K/dictionary.

2013 FINANCIAL RESULTS (Not audited)

René Kirouac, Treasurer

The financial results for 2013 show a surplus of revenues over expenses of \$35.85. Membership stands at 158.

The income for 2013 was \$1,163.65 more than the 2012 income. Thanks to the sale of promotional objects, particularly the sale of the new book about our Ancestor. However, all other items went down: annual memberships, gifts and recovery, and annual gathering.

Expenses for 2013 were \$1,271.53 greater than 2012. This increase is due to genealogical research, publicity and promotion. Promotion increased particularly because of the need to invest into the KFA Web Site, the printing of FK's new book

about the Ancestor and the launching of the new book. As for the expenses for our bulletin Le Trésor, the cost decreased by over \$1,000.00 as now we publish three issues instead of four per year.

A TRUE LOVE STORY

As told by Sister Laura Ann King, CSJ written by her cousin, LeRoy Roger Curwick

In 1923, Mabel Ann Curwick, a 16 year-old farm girl from southwestern Minnesota, employment up in the Twin Cities of Minneapolis/ St. Paul. She found work sewing men's underwear at Munsingwear factory in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

One day, early in her employment she found a Minneapolis morning newspaper on a table in the

lunch-room. She thought, "Isn't this wonderful! They provide newspaper for our break-room." As she sat reading and relaxing, a short, handsome, mature gentleman walked in and asked, "Do you mind if I join vou?" "Oh, please sit down." Mabel replied. (She was glad for the company, and he was, 'Oh. SO handsome'.) "Do you mind sharing

your newspaper?" He asked. "Oh, no!" responded. She did not know at the time, that in fact Arthur James King, a 27 year old widower and warehouseman, had ordered and paid for the paper to be delivered to the lunch-room.

It soon became a habit for Arthur King and Mabel Curwick to meet for lunch and share his newspaper daily. They became good friends and shared lots of stories about their childhoods growing up in large farm families in Dakota County, Minnesota and Iroquois County, Illinois. Soon thereafter Art asked Mabel, "Would you like to go for a ride this Sunday?" "Oh, that would be wonderful!" She exclaimed. The very next Sunday, on a sunny

summer day in 1923, Art cranked up his Model T Ford truck and picked up Mabel at the Evangeline Residence in Minneapolis (a church sponsored residence for single women). Art King had been a farmer near Hastings, MN when his young wife, Laura Ann O'Hara, died of tuberculosis in 1922. As they drove away from the near south side of Minneapolis, across the 10th Avenue Bridge to Southeast Minneapolis and University Avenue, Mabel was puzzled. "Where are we going? She queried. Art answered. "Oh, for a little ride over to St. Paul." When they parked in front of a large imposing residence near Summit Avenue and St. Catherine's College, Mabel was even more puzzled.

As they walked up the long walk, across the broad lawn, she got her answer. No sooner had they taken a few steps, when the front door flew open! Three rambunctious young children came bursting through the door and tumbling down the steps. They ran down the walk toward Art and Mabel, with their

arms in the air, yelling, "Daddy, Daddy, Daddy!"

That is how Mabel Ann Curwick met three ofArt's children from his first wife, Laura Ann, who had died tragically the year before. Unable to farm and care for his children after his loss, he sadly


adoption to a childless middle-aged couple in Hastings, MN. He then placed his three toddlers, Lucille (age 5), Donald (age 4), and Irene (age 3) into an orphanage in St. Paul, near St. Catherine's College, run by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet.

POLYCARPE KÉROUAC'S FAMILY AND SIBLINGS OF JOSEPH NAPOLEON CURWICK

Mabel Ann, age 16, fell in love that sunny summer day in 1923. Sometime thereafter, Arthur James proposed marriage. They were married on March 3, 1924. After their marriage, Lucille, Don and Irene would tease their new Mother. "You didn't fall in love with Dad! You fell in love with us kids!" Little did they know, for she also fell in love with this first generation Irish-American farm boy and would go on to add six more little rascals to the King family.

Arthur James King was a first generation Irish-American, born in 1896 in Dakota County, Minnesota. He was the youngest of eleven children born to William King (born in Ireland, 1845) and Ellen O'Leary (born in Massachusetts, 1845). He grew up on a farm near Hastings, Minnesota.

Mabel Ann Curwick is a sixth generation French Canadian (of Breton origin)-American farm girl, born on July 26, 1907 in L'Erable, Iroquois County, Illinois, who moved to Amiret Township, Lyon County, Minnesota about 1919. Her father, Joseph Napoleon Curwick (1870) was born in Kansas, the 19th child and youngest son of Hippolite Paul Curwick (GFK 00178, born 1815) and his second wife, Susan Bellegarde Bourassa Curwick (born 1832). Mabel's mother, Caroline Patnaude, born in 1876 in L'Erable, Iroquois County, Illinois, later moved to Kansas, where she married Napoleon Curwick, October 29, 1894. They soon migrated back to Illinois prior to the birth of their first-born son, Ulysses, in 1897.

How in the world could this 16 year old girl take on a ready-made family of three kids, aged four to six, and then effectively add six more to the mix? Raising them all successfully, even after losing her husband, Art King after only 22 years of marriage? By the Grace of God, no doubt and by the loving spirit of a Kirouac mother, indubitably.

Our Kirouac family history is loaded with stories of strong, stalwart, resilient Kirouac mothers. Susan Bellegarde Bourassa was a 29 year old widow, with three children aged five to nine when she remarried Mabel's grandfather, Hippolite Paul Kirouac in 1862. Hippolite Paul Kirouac (GFK 00178) was a widower whose first wife, Elizabeth Beaudoin, had born him ten children between 1841 and 1857.

When 47 year old Hippolite and 29 year old Susan combined their families in marriage, March 3, 1862, they had nine children between the ages of 5 and 19, including two aged 5. They then proceeded to produce six more progeny between 1863 and 1870, five of whom survived. Blessedly Susan had the help of Hippolite's 19 year-old daughter Marguerite, who remained unmarried until age 22, to help her for the first three years of her second marriage. During this time Hippolite's eldest son Joseph Curwack* (1845) was serving the Union Army during the Civil War between the States. (*See Greg Kyrouac's 2011 article in *Le Trésor*, #106, pp. 7-14)

Susan and Hippolite's youngest son, Joseph Napoleon Curwick, born March 28, 1870, was either born during their migration from L'Erable, Illinois to St. Joseph, Kansas or shortly thereafter. I would have to guess he was born after the migration to Kansas. The Kansas migration probably occurred in 1869, since Napoleon's next older brother Henry would have been a new-born baby during the traveling season of 1868, but one year old by 1869. So, again, blessedly, pregnant with her ninth child Susan had the help of her 14 year-old step-daughter Clophe. Clophe had to have been a huge help during this migration with her four half-siblings, aged one to six.

Mabel Ann Curwick King's grandmother Susan passed away in Kansas sometime between 1875 and 1880 based on Kansas State and U.S. Federal

Census Records. We see Susan at age 43, with Hippolite, age 60, and children Emma (11), Paul (8), Peter (7), Henry (6) and Mabel's father, Napoleon (5), in the 1875 Kansas State Census. Susan no longer appears in the family in the U.S. Federal census in 1880; however we have no recorded death document. Likewise, Mabel's grandfather, Hippolite Paul passed away sometime after 1880, but we have no precise death record.

The dominant theme I found as I traced Mabel Ann Curwick's love story back through the Kirouac Family Tree was that there were always strong, loving, caring young women who stepped forward to help care for the children who were left dependent on them during a family tragedy. This first occurred with Marie and Marguerite Kirouac. who were respectively 18 and 16 years old when their mother, Elizabeth Beaudoin, passed away in June 1859, just two short years after the birth of her tenth child, Clophe. These young women helped their widowed father and their five siblings through three difficult years before his second marriage to Susan Bellegarde Bourassa in 1862. Later 13 yearold Clophe Kirouac stepped forward to provide loving support to her father, step-mother and five half-siblings during their treacherous relocation from L'Erable, IL to St. Joseph, KS in 1870.

In the 1880 census we see a sixteen year-old Emma Curwick Deslaunais caring for the farm household, with her 65 year old widowed father, Hippolite Paul (GFK 00174), her 21 year old husband from a neighboring farm, Joel, and her four brothers, Paul (14), Peter (12), Henry (11) and Napoleon (9). This was shortly after the death of their 48 year old mother Susan Bellegarde Bourassa Curwick early in 1880. Imagine the indomitable spirits of these pioneering Kirouac women to care and nurture their families at such young age and under such trying times. Thank God for their strength, spirit, and commitment.

After her first husband left to seek his fortune out west, never to return, Emma Curwick remarried Andrew Jackson Terhune becoming the matriarch of a very large Trahoon/Curwick family, Kirouac descendants in Kansas.

This slight digression into the Kirouac family history of the 1800's leads us back to our heroine, Mabel Ann Curwick King. Her mother, Caroline Patnaude, married Napoleon Curwick in 1894, patiently followed her "on-theroad-again" intrepid husband from Kansas, back to L'Erable,

Illinois. There she bore him seven children, six of whom survived. She followed him on the road again in 1919 by ox cart from Illinois to Lyon County, Minnesota and then finally up to Northwest Wisconsin, which is why both Mabel Ann and her daughter Sister Laura Ann King CSJ became "cheese-heads" and "Green Bay Packers" fans*. (*Wisconsinites are famous for their cheese-making and for their loyalty to the NFL American Football team, the Green Bay Packers. The fans are known as "cheese-heads" and wear a ridiculous wedge of plastic cheese on their heads during home and away football games. Sister Laura King was a very loyal Green Bay Packer fan.)

After their marriage early in 1924, as Mabel opened her heart in caring for three young step-children, she bore Arthur King six more children, James Francis (1925), Laura Ann (1927), Helen Mary (1930), Kenneth Orval (1932), Stephen Gilbert (1934), and Lenora Madeline (1937). Jim and Laura lived together with their mother and father and three half-siblings in St. Paul, Minnesota until 1929, when they moved to a farm near Webster, Wisconsin.


