


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Past President/Founder Message

Meet the Coller family from St. Clair Shores

amille and Chris Coller from St. Clair Shores first noticed something was different about their two-year-old son, Zachary, in their daily activities at home. Zachary no longer responded to noise and was pronouncing words incorrectly that he once knew. Zachary was also experiencing other puzzling medical issues which led Camille and Chris to seek answers.

The early months were filled with medical appointments, insurance battles, and sleepless nights spent

researching. With less than 400 cases worldwide, getting a diagnosis felt lucky, but without a cure, also

just wanted our son to have every opportunity in life, but

we didn't know how to give that to him."

heartbreaking. The couple felt isolated; they were struggling to find resources and connect

with other families who understood

their journey.

After months of doctors' appointments and tests, it was revealed that he was born with Riboflavin Transporter Deficiency (RTD), a rare disease that prevents the body from properly transporting riboflavin (vitamin B2) across cell membranes. Vitamin B2 is imperative for typical growth and development. Symptoms of RTD can include respiratory compromise, facial weakness, hearing loss due to auditory neuropathy, vision loss due to optic atrophy, difficulty chewing and swallowing, muscle weakness of the arms and legs, scoliosis, and gait ataxia. Zachary subsequently developed bilateral profound hearing loss from this deficiency. The audiologist's words were clinical but devastating as Camille received the diagnosis alone in an exam room as

Everything changed when they were connected to The Holley Institute, through our community partner, Michigan Hands and Voices, a parent-led nonprofit organization. Camille was initially hesitant to reach out.

"I think part of me wasn't ready to accept that we needed help," she

admits. "But that first email

changed our lives."

Within days, the family was connected with Maria Klein, The Community Health and Literacy Program Director. For the first time since Zachary's diagnosis, Camille and Chris felt like they weren't alone.

"Maria didn't just give us information," Chris explains.
"She gave us hope. Here was someone who understood exactly what Zachary would face and was a needed example of what it means to be a Deaf adult and what Zachary could achieve."

"We had no idea where to start," Chris remembers. "The doctors talked about hearing aids, cochlear implants, sign language, speech therapy. It was overwhelming. We

felt like stepping into uncharted territory.

this was during the COVID-19 pandemic and Chris was

not able to attend. At 2 years old, Zachary was diagnosed

with auditory neuropathy and began his journey into Deaf culture. For Camille and her husband Chris, the diagnosis

The Holley Institute provided something the Coller's hadn't found anywhere else: comprehensive support for the entire family.


Zachary was paired with Deaf Mentors, Jojo Forbes and later, Chelsey Munger. "Chelsey comes over to our home once a week and mentors Zachary and our whole family including our other two hearing children, Benjamin (4) and Elliette (1), and it is amazing to watch. Jojo and Chelsey showed Zachary—and us—what was possible."

The Holley Institute also connected the Coller's with educational resources, helping them navigate the complex world of early intervention services and school district programs. But most importantly, the Institute connected the Coller's with other families on similar journeys in our programs.

"The first time we attended the Summer Family Programs, I cried," Camille remembers. "Not sad tears, but tears of relief. We watched kids with cochlear implants playing and laughing together. Parents were sharing stories and advice. For the first time in months, I felt like we belonged somewhere."

The Coller's quickly learned that deafness wasn't something to experience alone. The Holley Institute provided low cost ASL classes for Camille's sister, Danielle, ensuring that Zachary would always have family members who can communicate with them in ASL. Camille's sister, Danielle, has attended ASL story times at local community libraries with other DDBHH families, and attend Family Literacy Weekends at the village.

Today, at seven years old, Zachary is a confident, curious child who loves building Legos, nature, anything mechanical, and always wants to know how and why something works (and if he can take it apart). His family thinks he will be an engineer. His cochlear implants have given him access to sound, while ASL provides him with a rich cultural connection to the Deaf community.



As Zachary enters into first grade this fall, the Coller's feel optimistic about his future. The Holley Institute continues to be a resource, helping them plan for his educational journey and connecting them with Deaf adults in various careers who serve as mentors, counselors and supporters.

"When Zachary was first diagnosed, I worried about all the things he might not be able to do; now we focus on all the amazing things he will do. With his determination and the support system we've built around him, there are no limits" - Camille and Chris Coller
