In 1881, the first Buffalo Soldiers arrived in Arizona pursuing elusive Apaches. Over the following decades, African Americans from the Tenth U.S. Cavalry and Twenty-Fourth and Twenty-Fifth Infantry added to the laurels won by the Ninth U.S. Cavalrymen. For more than six decades, Black soldiers served with honor, from campaigns against determined Native Americans to facing dangers along the turbulent border as the Mexican Revolution raged. During the dark days of World War II, they prepared for combat against foes both abroad and at home. All the while, they faced an ever-present, persistent enemy: racism. Author John P. Langellier brings to life the rich history of Buffalo Soldiers in the Copper State.

## In Memoriam: Crystal Carrancho



We are truly saddened to share the news that Crystal Carrancho, who supplied the technical expertise for Camp Naco's award winning storymap, passed away on February 1, 2025. As some of you may

know, Crystal spent the last two years battling cancer. She passed away peacefully at home with her family by her side.

Crystal held a B.A. in Anthropology from the University of Arizona. Before she joined the Camp Naco team, Crystal had spent ten years with the Arizona State Land Department and had joined the Phoenix Historic Preservation Office in 2019, where she is remembered both for her technical expertise and for her good nature and kindness.

The storymap caught the eye of the National Trust in 2022, when it was chosen as one of that year's Eleven Most Endangered Historic Sites. This recognition led in turn to grants from the Mellon Foundation and from the office of Governor Doug Ducey, setting Camp Naco on its path to rehabilitation.

Those of us who worked with Crystal on the storymap remember her boundless dedication to the project. A true collaborator, she was always willing to take an extra step to ensure a perfect result. We are grateful to have been her colleagues, and we will miss her very much.
