The Truth about Upper Eden Rotary

Tristan Fowler busts a few myths

Rotary clubs have often been perceived as dining clubs for successful old men who give money to charity. A couple of years ago, I was asked if I would be interested in joining and I was somewhat sceptical as I held a similar opinion. Would it be a bit dreary? Would they have some obscure traditions and practices? Would they want a lot of money? I discovered enough at the few meetings that I attended as a guest, to change my outlook.

Yes, they do meet regularly for a meal which is often followed by a presentation or a quest speaker. Yes, there are quite a lot of old men but women have been part of Rotary since 1987 and recently both the national and international presidents were women. No. there were not any obscure traditions and no specific political or religious affiliations. No, they didn't want a lot of money but there is an annual membership which is to cover several costs of being a club affiliated to a larger organisation (presently, the equivalent of about £11 a month).

More importantly, I discovered that this club is about doing things rather than just fundraising. In the last two years I have helped some of the more skilled members build much needed facilities for the charity Growing Well at Tebay services; I have helped look after some of the gardens at Christian Head; I have sold raffle tickets to give out biscuits at Christmas and helped with the Westmorland Dales Festival. We have also had events to help provide equipment and a well for a girl's school in the Nairobi slums which is having a huge impact on those children and provided medical equipment for a hospital in Ukraine. And, we got to the final of the Rotary, district ten pin bowling competition! There is more but lists become boring.

So, why am I writing this article?

Because, I believe there are other people out there who might enjoy and benefit from joining us. Upper Eden club is friendly, relaxed and involved. We would like more people with the same approach. Our website has more information https://

Summer at Wilkinson House - Mary Wilson

My main achievement this summer has been the abundance of little froglets which are now roaming all over my garden. I left my grass to grow this year and will now have to leave it alone as I don't want to stand on or mow these tiny creatures especially as many small ponds and watering places dried up in Spring with the loss of frogspawn and tadpoles. So, I have a very overgrown and scruffy garden but who cares? I don't, as the pleasure of spotting them outweighs my shame.

Biggest problem I have had, especially in August, are caterpillars on my brassicas and leafy greens. The cabbages had already hearted up by the worst invasion. Even the tops of my swedes were getting eaten. So, the second thing every morning (after taking Bonny, the Jack Russell for her daily walk) is checking the leaves and picking them off. Earlier in the season I was finding the clusters of eggs, somehow as the leaves got bigger, they were able to hide the eggs better so they had hatched before I noticed them. However, other than that I have had a good harvest and made jams and chutneys and frozen lots of fruits and blanched vegetables.

Most disappointing is my tomato plants and sweet peppers; they have been very slow but, finally the fruit is ripening and I will eventually get quite a good crop.

Managed to dig up all my potatoes while the weather was not guite as hot and have a really good crop of very clean potatoes as the ground was very dry. A big difference from usual as the ground is often soddened when I am digging them up. The reason for earlier this year is that rats have been digging in my patch and eating the potatoes or bringing them up to the surface and they were going green. Luckily, they were ready and a heavy crop, so have plenty to last until next year's first earlies which I will plant under cover in late February.

The Augill Lead Mine - Jeremy Godwin

The Augill Lead Mine was up and running by 1829, and by 1847 was leased by the North Stainmore Mining Co., which asked Jacob Walton, a well-known mining engineer and consultant from Alston Moor, to write a report on the present state and prospects of Augill. He duly came, and examined the mine and its methods, and reported that it would become profitable if more money and improvements were invested in it. The strata were vertical (horizontal was usual), the engine-shaft was wrongly sited and not big enough for going deeper. Sink a new one, much bigger, and go down 30 fathoms (i.e. 180 feet) and there cross-cut to both veins, install a 30 feet waterwheel to drive the mine. Don't be half-hearted about all this but do it with spirit and vigour.

This they did, and by 1849 it was flourishing. The smelt-mill, built in 1843, was nearby. The mine was in a secluded and romantic vale, 1½ miles from Brough, run by Philip Robinson, the company's managing partner, Jacob Walton and his brother Thomas joined the company as shareholders soon after.

By 1856, the mine was losing money, and closed soon after. The Waltons owned the valley and smelt mill till the 1990s. The Augill Smelt Mill is a listed building, still there.

AUTUMN RECIPE Peasant Pudding

Thinking of this Autumn and what looks like a bumper crop of apples, we thought we'd share a childhood family favourite. This is an adaption of the Polish dish Peasant Girl with Veil.

Peel, core and slice about 1- 2lb of cooking apples into a saucepan. Depending on how juicy your apples are, (you might need to add a couple of tablespoons of water) gently stew to a thick puree. The smell of the apples is glorious! Turn the puree into your pudding bowl and chill.

Meanwhile, gently melt 4oz butter in a saucepan. Add 8oz rolled oats and 4oz Demerara sugar, stir well coating all the oats.

Cover and level the top of the stewed apples with the oat mix. Chill for a few hours before serving.

An authentic Peasant Girl with Veil would then be covered with thick whipped cream and grated chocolate. Something that didn't happen when I was a child! (and, as for butter, read marg)!!



Late Summer Butterfly Stories

We are now heading towards Autumn and you may feel the Butterfly season has ended - but no! Certainly, most species have completed their life cycle and vanished for another year, but there is a group which are at their most active at this time – our hibernators.

There are a handful of these and you can find them on any nectar source (particularly lvy late season) busily feeding up for the long winter ahead. They all have slightly different tactics – the Peacock will gorge through August then quickly hibernate in September often in hollow trees. Small Tortoiseshell leave it later and are the ones most likely to found in your garden shed alongside Commas. Unfortunately, a vast number are predated by mice, spiders and birds. If you find one, don't disturb it and try to remember to leave a window open for it to escape.

The Red Admiral does not follow the same pattern; indeed it is the subject of much debate as to exactly what it does do in Autumn. You can find hundreds nectaring on Ivy as late as October, and it seems most still migrate back to Southern France and Spain, but some appear to remain and hibernate. More studies are needed. but there are more and more sightings in February and March, which indicates hibernation.

The migration of butterflies is fascinating and will be covered in the next issue.
