The Future's So Bright, You'll Need To Wear Shades

Does anyone remember Y2K? It was predicted that on Dec 31st 1999, all the world's computers would reset to year 1900 and global



computerised systems would shut down, or go berserk, or something. Some people predicted doom, others gloom, and some started hoarding. It didn't happen though, and somewhere in somebody's cellar, there is still a 26 year-old tin of beans awaiting the next apocalypse.

I say this because I saw a headline in a Cumbrian business newsletter saying: "Robot farmers, AI and a tourism boom - a vision of Cumbria in 2050".

To some, that headline will sound like a nightmare, and may start a supermarket run on beans again, and toilet paper - an inevitable alliance. Others though, might think it rather exciting. New challenges, interesting developments and ways of making farming less arduous and more productive. The thing is, when you are long in the tooth like your correspondent here, you can also recall visions of the future as both troubling and fearsome - think Fritz Lang's "Metropolis" - or thrilling, like images of futuristic, happy, toothsome, besuited families zipping along the aerohighways, in airborne cars. However, some things don't quite come to pass as anticipated or dreaded. Boomers and the 60s generation may recall eager chatter some 50 years ago, about the forthcoming "leisured society", where we were expecting to

work about 5 hours a week for 100 times the salary, and have robo-butlers attend to domestic matters, while we all played space golf. Still waiting for that one.

The point is, predictions of the future may happen, but on the other hand, they might not.

It's widely acknowledged that technology is evolving faster than societies can really cope with it, and there is evidence of pushback. It starts with the re-emergence of vinyl records as a desirable media format, and moves onto the return of physical buttons in cars and other appliances. 50 to 100 years ago, futurologists and soothsayers were most likely imagining a population in PVC jumpsuits spending Christmas on Mars, chomping on technoturkey. The reality is that by the time you read this, the local populace will have celebrated the dawn of the festive season watching gigantic farm machinery decked in fairy lights, in procession past their windows, beeping their klaxons. You couldn't make it up, and nobody did. However, it happened.

So short term, have a reflective, celebratory and anxiety-free Christmas, and try to extend that into 2026.

This Month's Cover Story

Intrigued by the cover? For many years Twelfth Night was celebrated in Brough by a brass band leading a procession carrying a burning holly bush. The custom lapsed sometime in the mid-Nineteenth Century, probably just as well - can you imagine the field day the health and safety people would have today??

Fire festivals have their feet in Pagan symbolism: Warding off evil spirits during the long dark winter's nights, evoking the return of the sun, light, warmth, growth and fertility. Imagine Winter as a time to be endured: cold wet and windy, huddled around a fire in an effort to keep warm. Winds howling through trees and the cracking, crashing sounds of falling timber. A time for story telling, the shared comfort and warmth of fire and friendship.

Modern fire festivals, such as the "Up Helly Aa" in Shetland, are inspired by these Pagan and later Viking traditions and feature torch-lit processions which make Brough's historic effort seem rather feeble before Lerwick's blazing Longboat example. Maps show Cumbria was well settled by Vikings. Fell is a Viking word as are dell, dale, beck, thwaite and stang and there are many more I'm sure you could add to the list. In a study conducted by University College London, a large-scale DNA project, "Blood of the Vikings" (2001), found that of all English test sites, only Penrith had clear and significant evidence of Norwegian influence.

Now these (Cumbrian) Vikings were not just raiders, they were settlers and farmers. It is possible they introduced the Herdwick sheep to The Lake District. And yes, of course, there was aptly named Eric Bloodaxe who killed his brothers when they got in the way of him being made king of Norway. He migrated to our shores, becoming the last Viking King of York and Northumbria. He was killed in 954 AD in an ambush on Stainmore. His fall is commemorated by Rey Cross on Stainmore. For many years this stone also marked the boundary between Scotland and England.

Anyone interested in re-enacting this tradition? It always culminated in a pub crawl!

2025 – Another successful but hard year gone - An exciting new venue starting in 2026

The small birds have started telling me it is time to get extra feed for them. Blue Tits, Robins, Chaffinches to name a few, and even a Nuthatch are coming right up to the patio doors and peering in. If that is not a hint, I don't know what is.

Storm Claudia reminded all of us to make sure all is fastened down or removed to a safe place any items we want to survive the winter storms. So far I have been lucky and had no major damage, only one of my lanky Eucalyptus trees snapped off. However, there is some growth at the bottom so maybe all is not lost. I have left it where it has fallen as I hope the leaves will keep healthy for putting in Christmas wreathes, so not wasted.

Managed to get 3 of my Damson trees (leaving the rest at the allotment for other people) and large Rhubarb root removed from my allotment and brought home. That ends my major gathering of all my large outlying garden equipment and structures. Finally getting started on my ambitious, life long goal and dream of being (as near as can be) self sufficient in fruit and vegetables and establishing a Forest Garden for future stainability. Little did I know when I was young that it would take this long to get this far and how important this kind of life has become.

The Medical Profession has now cottoned on to what us gardeners have always known: "That getting out in the fresh air and digging and fiddling with plants etc. does you the world of good"

I was very pleased with the soil at the allotment when digging out the trees but should not have been surprised as I have taken many bags of manure there, mainly sheep and straw for 20 years. I can definitely recommend adding well-rotted farmyard manure every year to your vegetable beds and any-

where else that the soil needs a good feed. I have a lot of work to do to get my new beds at Wilkinson House up to scratch but will try my best as it is well worth it, you can tell the difference every year especially if you are on clay ground as I am.

Make sure you have all your seeds and potatoes ordered for next year so not to be disappointed if they run out of the special ones you like to grow.

oneliness and social isolation affect millions of people in the UK and numbers are on the rise. Approximately 1M older people in the UK report often feeling lonely and 41% say that the TV or pet is their main form of company. As the dark nights draw in, winter can be a particularly difficult time for some people.

Befriending has been proven to be one of the most effective ways of combatting loneliness and social isolation. A weekly one-hour visit or even a half-an-hour phone call can make all the difference to someone's quality of life. Weekly contact can help people regain confidence and find connection in their local community. Trusted, lasting friendships can have a positive impact on their physical, emotional and mental health.

Upper Eden Linking Lives is a befriending service which aims to help tackle loneliness in the Appleby and Kirkby Stephen area. So far, we have matched over 25 local people with one of our volunteers. All our volunteers are carefully selected, trained and vetted.

One of the people we have helped explained how much these visits meant to her. "Honestly and



truly, you've no idea how much I look forward to (her) coming. She's like a ray of sunshine coming through my door. It's made a big difference to my life." Jean, who recently moved into the area and can no longer go out anywhere unaided says, "I look forward to this day. The joy of a visit. We don't have to do much or go far but it brings me back the world I used to live in." And our volunteers also benefit. "It's heartwarming to know you are making a difference to someone's life. someone who looks forward to their weekly visits, and knowing I have brightened up their day."

Slightly Indulgent Christmas cake recipe INGREDIENTS



1 cup of butter

<u>Tall Ship Experience</u> <u>2025</u>

The youngest member of The Way production team took advantage of a fantastic opportunity last summer. This is the report by Eleanor Featherstone about her trip on a Tall Ship sailing from Newcastle to Aberdeen in July 2025.

The Opportunity, and Starting the Voyage

At the start of the school holidays in 2025, I was fortunate enough to be given the chance to go on a Tall Ships experience through Appleby Air Cadets. I was one of twelve cadets from different squadrons across Cumbria and Lancashire to be given this amazing opportunity.

on the Tall Ship James Cook which is owned by the Ocean Youth Trust North (England) https://oytnorth.org.uk
This is a local independent charity which has specialised in the personal development of young people through offshore sailing (adventure under sail) since 1999. Our group would be taking the ship from

We were to be part of the crew

Newcastle up to Aberdeen as a delivery leg before the ship took part in a section of the Tall Ships Race which was going to Denmark and Norway.

There were four experienced crew members on the James Cook who taught us everything we needed to know to be able to help sail the ship with no prior experience. With there being eighteen people on board, it was a little bit of a squeeze, especially at meal times when we all sat down together, but that was all part of the fun. We spent nine full days on the ship: four nights at sea and five in harbour. We started the voyage in Newcastle and finished in Aberdeen

Seasickness and Whales

After some training from the four crew members of the James Cook, we set off from Newcastle. Once we got away from the coast we hit some rough weather. Some of my crewmates were seasick but luckily for me, I was one of the few who didn't feel ill. This meant that I could help to sail the ship unlike the others who were feeling off colour. The Skipper who was watching me

steering the ship told me that he had never seen someone so happy to be on a really rocky boat and not being seasick!



This was an amazing trip. I

made some wonderful friends and was especially proud to helm the boat and sail part of the way up to Aberdeen.

PRINTING GLITCH APOLOGIES - November 2025 issue

We would like to apologise for a blip in the printing process when we were producing the November edition of The Way. It seems that of the nearly 1000 copies of The Way which were produced about 80 had 2 copies of pages 7, 8, 21 and 22 and no pages 9, 10, 19 and 20. We only realised this problem after the magazine had gone out for distribution and think that most of the faulty copies landed in Warcop. The problem resulted from a fault with the collating machine which has hopefully been fixed by now.

As to Kaber.....

Now that The Way has increased its reach to Kaber, Jeremy Godwin has kindly contributed these notes about the history of the village and surrounding area.

From its first known written mention in 1202 onwards it has always had two spellings for its placename: Caber and Kaber. It was settled by Anglian invaders, the Anglo part of Anglo-Saxons; the Saxons stayed in the South other than a group that used 'rith' for a beck, as at Stenkrith and Penrith which was their furthest North in the early 7th century. The Anglian word ca (pronounced 'cay') means a Jackdaw, and berg means a 'hill': there were trees on it full of Jackdaws. There's another Caber (spelt with a 'C') North of Kirkoswald.

Heggerscale began as Hegelstale in 1382, and Hegelscale(s) by 1402: 'ravine full of bird-cherry trees with sheiling(s) in it'. These are Old Norse, originating from the folk coming up the Eden from Ireland looking for somewhere to farm, sheilings and summer-use houses. By 1829 Heggerscales was 'the village of Higher Scales'.

Rookby first mentioned in 1178, was a Norseman's farm in a rookery (very noisy but young rooks are edible). Or it could be an Angle's called Hroca (the H is silent).

In 1663 Duckintree at the East end of Kaber Rigg was the rendezvous for die hard Cromwellians. It was a wet October evening. The Mallerstang group came, but none from the North-East. Kaber Rigg still has some of its gorse; once all over it.

By 1829 Kaber was a large village in South Stainmore, partly in Brough parish (the Bela is the boundary). It had a grocer, blacksmith, shoemaker, and small school which was founded in 1689. The rector of Dufton (Rev. Edward Heelis) had a holiday cottage at Duckintree. Kaber's pubs in 1829 were 'The Robin Hood and Little John' (Christopher Holliday, licensee) and 'The Cross Keys' (Richard Hutchinson, licensee).

By 1851 Kaber Township had a population of 170. By then the 1829's schoolmaster was also a grocer. The Township had 20 farmers. 'The Cross Keys' had become the 'The Lord Nelson' and 'The Robin Hood and Little John' was still there.

BUTTERFLIES – HOW TO SURVIVE WINTER

In a previous article I covered how several species hibernate in order to get through winter. But how do the other species survive? Well, they all exist in one of the three stages which occur before they finally emerge as a butterfly i.e. egg, caterpillar or pupa.

Every species adopts a different strategy, some of which are quite bizarre. The Whites spend the winter as a chrysalis, ready to emerge early in Spring, but whilst the Orange Tip generally follows this pattern, in certain cases it remains a chrysalis for 2 years! All Skippers over winter as hibernating caterpillars except 3: the Essex and Silver Spotted which stay as eggs and the Grizzled which forms a chrysalis. Fritillaries stay as hibernating caterpillars, burying deep into grassy clumps safe from any bad weather.

Perhaps the most bizarre species is the Speckled Wood which is rapidly becoming one of our most common butterflies. It rarely stays as an egg, but some overwinter as a caterpillar, others as a chrysalis and it is for this reason that it can be seen from the earliest Spring right through to late Autumn.

Blue butterflies adopt all of the above and usually the caterpillar enter an ant's nest to form its chrysalis as a further protective measure.
