"Ascribe to the Lord the glory due His name. Worship the Lord in the splendor of His holiness." (Psalm 29:3b)

Beloved,

Elsewhere in this month's newsletter is an article from our Worship elder, Cheryl Canfield, expressing her thanks, on behalf of the entire congregation, to certain members of the congregation who are now stepping down after having dedicated many years assisting in the worship service. In addition, with their stepping down we are also asking for others to prayerfully consider stepping up to fill these roles.

And this got me to thinking about worship in general. Why do we gather together each week for worship? What is the purpose of worship? Who or what should be the focus of our worship? Since worship is on our minds (at least, mine), I'd like to take a little time this month focusing on that most important part of the life of the church.

Worship involves acknowledging who God is. That He is, in the words of John Calvin, "the only source of all virtue, justice, holiness, wisdom, truth, power, goodness, mercy, life, and salvation." And, so, the purpose of worship is "to ascribe and render to God the glory of all that is good, to seek all things in Him alone, and in every want to have recourse to Him alone" (from 'The Necessity of Reforming the Church'). Or, as we see in the Scripture listed above, we "Ascribe to the Lord the glory due His name." Which leads then, to "Worship the Lord in the splendor of His holiness."

The English word 'worship' derives from the Old English term weorthscipe, which means "worthiness" or "acknowledgment of worth." And so, we worship God because we acknowledge that God, alone, is worthy to be praised. We praise Him for His character and for His mighty and merciful works.

Worship is the chief priority of the people of God, and a motivating factor in our Lord's salvation of a people for Himself. Exodus 3:12 explains that God redeemed His people Israel from Egypt so that they would serve Him. And the way they were to serve God was to include feasting and sacrifice, two central elements in the act of worship. So, we can see that one of the primary purposes for God's salvation of humanity is to create a people who will worship Him.

Which leads to that all important question, then, 'Who should be the focus of our worship?' Too often in the church today, that question gets completely missed. Or, rather, misunderstood. For, in so many churches all the attention seems to be focused on the worshiper rather than on the One who is worshiped. And so, the focus goes to worship style – whether traditional or contemporary? Music style – praise songs or hymns? Instruments – guitars and drums or piano/organ? Sermon content – Scripture based or self-help? Why, with some churches it seems their greatest concerns are whether the coffee bar is stocked well enough or whether it would be more 'user friendly' to call the place where people gather the Auditorium rather than the Sanctuary.

What I'm getting at is that in many churches worship has become solely self-focused rather than God focused. Where the most important consideration when it comes to worship is the entertainment value of the proceedings, or 'What am I getting out of this?' Rather than asking the question 'Are we giving proper reverence and honor to God? Are we worshiping the Lord in the splendor of His holiness?'

Truly, this is the question we need to be asking – 'What does God want?' That's the very first question we should ask, isn't it? Because we're not worshiping worship. We're not worshiping one another. We're not worshiping ourselves. We're worshiping God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. And so, our worship should be – must be – shaped according to who He is and what He wants.

That's why you will always hear four particular words proclaimed every Sunday at the start of our time together in the sanctuary. We say them because they describe perfectly and exactly why we are here and what it is we intend to do. You may be wondering, 'What are these words?' Or, in light of the theme of this article, you can probably guess them already. As your pastor I am committed to always upholding these words whenever we are gathered together as a body of Christ. And, praise God, I know Cheryl, and the rest of the Worship team, and everybody who takes part each Sunday in our worship service are just as committed to upholding those words, as well. And, beloved, may the same also be said of each and every person who enters into our sanctuary every Sunday. For they are the words that truly describe why we are here and what we are here to do. They are those powerful and mighty and lovely words: "Let us worship God!"

As always, see you in Church. And, once again, let us worship God! Amen.

The Importance of Church Choirs—Part 3

According to the National Congregational Study only 37 % of mainline churches and 35 % of evangelical churches use choirs during worship. But there are still a lot of folks who believe in the critical importance of a church choir during their worship service. Here are some more reasons that a choir can be vital to churches.

7. Choirs can encourage musical diversity.

Choir members are often more musically diverse in their appreciation of different styles of music due to their music experiences. It's possible that they are fans of music from several centuries and not just music of a certain decade. Also, the church-at-large is bigger than one style of music, and most congregation members want to hear and to participate in singing different styles of songs.

8. Choirs teach the art and discipline of music.

Research shows that musical training helps children with their cognitive and social growth. However many schools have cut the funding for the arts and music programs. One place where younger and older people can learn the discipline of music without having to pay for lessons is in a church where there is music by individuals, choirs, and everyone willing to participate.

There is a spiritual richness in diversity of music in worship. Celebrate your choir every time they sing. Enjoy and be enriched by hymns, instrumental music and congregational singing.

August Recipe

Upside Down Brownies

Ingredients:

- 2/3 c flour
- 1 ½ c oatmeal
- 2/3 c brown sugar
- 1 c nuts, chopped
- ½ butter, melted
- 1 pkg brownie mix (for a 9x13 pan) or your favorite recipe

Directions:

- Grease a jelly roll pan
- Preheat oven to 375°
- Mix flour, oatmeal, sugar and nuts
- Pour butter over dry ingredients and blend well
- Pack evenly in bottom of pan
- Mix brownies according to package directions.
- Spread evenly over oatmeal mixture
- Bake 35-40 minutes
- Turn upside down immediately (this works best in another jelly roll pan)
- Cool completely
- Cut into squares or rectangles and serve

For this, we give thanks, and welcome anyone who is interested in substituting for them or playing music for the Introit to contact a member of the worship team. As always, anyone interested in joining the choir or providing special music may contact Janet Mathews.

We now have four women who will share the task of baking Communion bread, something done for many years by Pam Knoche, for whose dedicated service we are also extremely grateful, and who is being given a well-deserved break from that particular commitment. I am especially grateful for Al Sowers, who recruits the ushers, and those currently serving, for their willingness to try something new in the way we receive the offering, as we have added a fourth person to the number needed. Volunteers are now needed to operate the sound system, and lighting the candles before each service is still an option for anyone who is interested.

As worship elder, my goal is to share responsibility among ourselves for the tasks we currently consider essential to a blessed worship experience, so that each person may have a weekly commitment for brief periods of time, much as we do now with ushers, lay leaders, and greeters. I hope that each member or person attending regularly will examine his or her spiritual gifts, experience, and confidence level, praying for God's guidance in how best to help when we gather to worship and glorify God. May none of us ever take for granted those around us who are serving the Lord, in any capacity, any aspect of life, for we are all brothers and sisters in Christ, looking forward to the ultimate service in His eternal Kingdom.

Murray & Kathy Trim— TEAM—Japan

Pray wisdom and guidance for Murray and Kathy as they go about the work the LORD has led them to do there in Japan, teaching and sharing GOD'S message of salvation with the people HE brings into their lives. Please pray for their elderly mothers, Murray's in Nebraska and Kathy's near us in Pretty Prairie, both are in their 90's. They also have four grown and married children and grandchildren, two families are here in the U.S. and two are living and working in Japan. Pray health, strength and safety as they go about the work the LORD has called and given them to do.

Shelly Zadina – Medical Ambassadors – Albania & the U.S.

Pray for Shelly as she was getting over jet lag and her busy time in Albania, she is still having some problems with jet lag and getting back into a busy work schedule here in the U.S. Pray for her mom and dad. Her dad (John) is still in a nursing home facility in Salina. Pray for the older youth in Albania, who will be going to camp in August. Shelly is raising money for this project. AND the lady who was working with the women's group in Vashtemi got her visa and has gone to Germany, so they are in need of a new group leader.

Fredy and Djana JAVIER - Modern Day Missions-Macedonia

Pray for the Javier's - We are not getting recent updates on their work, but know they are working with a project they started there last year. Business as Mission is a plan called (SKYWAY), it provides an opportunity of giving remote (call center) assistance to the freight sector (Like a Freight Broker Agent). Their desire was/is to hire and give training to locals who are very fluent in English to do this job. In this way can they provide jobs and have the opportunity to create a new work culture based on Biblical principles and ultimately share the message of the Gospel with those working with them. PRAY for their children, JAVI (Shavi) and SHARON, and the needs in their lives.

The New Jerusalem / Children of Hope—School in Haiti

They are now on summer break. Some of the families live up in the mountains and are very poor. In summer's past,



VOLVICK has purchased groceries and delivered to these families. With the impossibility of travel in Haiti now, he is unable to do that this summer. My most current information is that the gangs have moved into the area closer to the school and are VERY active. Haiti is a VERY DANGER-OUS place right now. Pray for the teachers and school staff to have a SAFE, restful, refreshing summer break, so they are ready to return to their classrooms and other responsibilities if and when school can begin again. Pray for VOLVICK (principal of the school), as he continues to live

and work in Port au Prince to support himself and help with some of the financial needs of the school and its families. (There are people who do the duties of Principal as both of the schools - elementary out in the countryside and secondary in the town called Verrettes.) Pray for his day to day safety in Port, everywhere there is very dangerous. Gangs are still very active and seem to be growing in size. PRAY for the safety of all of the people living in this country. I believe New Covenant is the only church helping to support the school, so let's keep VOLVICK, the students and teachers in our prayers during this very difficult and dangerous time.

LOCAL MINISTRIES

SOUP KITCHEN & CIRCLES OF HOPE—While we are not actually serving these organizations who minister to people and families in need in our community, we can pray for these organizations and the work they do. LOADS OF LOVE—You are encouraged to share any laundry supplies that you do not wish to use for your own laundry or personal needs. Thank you for your generosity as we use this opportunity to minister to those in need in our community. THANKS again to Carl and Jean Sidebottom and others for faithfully delivering items to the FOOD BANK for us.

YOUNG LIFE – From our Mission Budget, we help support our local YOUNG LIFE program. They work with young people in our community. They have activities and are involved with young people during the school year and have special activities for them in the summer. One of those is going to a summer camp. PRAY for those students going to camp for Summer 2025 and for the adults going with them. Pray that as God speaks to the young people that need to hear His message, whether in local activities or at camp, that they will hear and respond. Please, Pray also for the adults who help with the activities and minister to the young people in all of their activities. PRAY for all of the young people, throughout the U. S. who are attending a YOUNG LIFE, or other camp where they hear the Gospel message this summer. Camp is where kids get away from the pressures of everyday life, have fun with friends and Young Life or other leaders and hear the GOSPEL message in terms they can understand. PRAY for Grant Luttrell, the local YOUNG LIFE leader and the other adults in the Hutchinson area who work with young people and provide activities and build relationships and share the Gospel message with them.


