# A Word from the Pastor

*"Now all has been heard; here is the conclusion of the matter: Fear God and keep His commandments, for this is the whole duty of man." (Ecclesiastes 12:13)*

Beloved,

Happy New Year! With the new year often comes the desire for a fresh start. And the way to that fresh start is by getting back to the basics; getting back to the core essentials of life. Our lives can get so filled up with the non-essentials that it's easy to lose sight of what is truly important. That's why I've always appreciated so the very first words of both the Larger and the Shorter Catechisms of the Westminster Confession of Faith.

A Catechism is a tool for young people to teach them the basics of the Christian faith. But, sometimes, even those who have been believers for a long time need a reminder of what those basics are. Enter the Catechisms which present these basics in a question and answer format. And, as mentioned, with both of the Catechisms of the Westminster Confession of Faith the very first question asked is "What is the chief end of man?" That is, "Why are we here?" "What is our purpose?" Or, another way of looking at it is, "What is the most important thing for us to know and do in life?" And the answer, from the Shorter Catechism is "To glorify God and to enjoy Him forever." It doesn't get more basic or to the point than that.

And, so it is, with the Word of God, and in particular, the book of Ecclesiastes. The book of Ecclesiastes, written by the son of King David, Solomon, is a book whose purpose is to instruct us on what is most important in life.

Ecclesiastes is a fascinating work that is often ignored in the Christian community today. Perhaps it is because the book has somewhat of a reputation for being depressing. After all, the very first words from Solomon are, *"Meaningless! Meaningless! Utterly meaningless! Everything is meaningless." (Eccl. 1:2)*

However, Ecclesiastes is not teaching us that life is meaningless. Rather, it is emphasizing the transitory nature, the impermanence, of life in the present order. And God, through the words of Solomon, is calling us to live in light of that reality. We are, in fact, to enjoy the earthly gifts that the Lord has given us, including such things as loving spouses, worthwhile labor, and good food (9:7–11). However, we must do this with reference to God, recognizing that the best things of this life will pass away but that only He endures forever. We go astray when we make the good, but temporary, things of this life the ultimate things to which we aspire.

Consequently we must ask this question: Since the meaning of life is the glory of God and to enjoy Him forever, how do we accomplish that goal? That is the conclusion Solomon comes to in the closing words of Ecclesiastes. As seen at the top of this article, Solomon ends his book with his profound closing argument: *"Now all has been heard; here is the conclusion of the matter: Fear God (love, adore and worship God) and keep His commandments, for this is the whole duty of man." (12:13)*

God made us in His image to reflect His glory and to enter His glorious presence, which He has made possible through Jesus Christ. In light of God's purpose for us in creation, redemption, and worship, then, we should have as our ultimate aim and core essential of life to live our lives to the glory of God. If we want to bring ourselves in line with our Creator's loving purpose for us, then seeking His glory is the way to do it.

And, I can think of no better way to get a fresh start on the new year than to get back to that which is truly important – and living our lives for the glory of God, that we may enjoy Him forever.

Have a most blessed, productive and glory-filled new year!

## *A Note From Janet*

In many churches, the first Sunday of the year wouldn't be complete without singing Frances Havergal's hymn "*Another Year Is Dawning*." Frances considered every New Year's Day a never-to-be-missed opportunity of rededication to Christ. This song was originally written as a prayer for the beginning of 1874 that she included in her greeting cards sent to family and friends.

She needed that prayer herself, because later that month she suffered a huge disappointment. She was hoping to be launched as an author in America. A letter came, not bearing royalty checks, but the news that her publisher had gone bankrupt in the Stock Market crash of 1873.

Frances turned all her financial affairs over to the Lord, and kept her written promise to sign only with that publishing company, so she did not publish anything in America. She waited for God's will to be done, and she continued to write poems and hymns. Among the many hymns she wrote was another prayer, "*Take My Life and Let It Be*." She died of peritonitis at age 42 in Wales. Frances' sisters had much of her work published posthumously, and a private girls school in Toronto, Canada, *Havergal College*, is named after her.

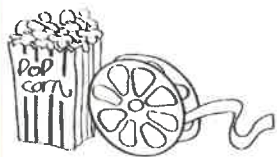

# January 2026 Recipes

## Trash Can Crackers

### Ingredients:

- 16 oz popcorn oil
- 1 Tbsp garlic powder
- 1 Tbsp onion powder
- 1 Tbsp dry ranch dressing mix
- 1 Tbsp creole or cajun seasoning
- LOTS of crackers, cereal, snacks

### Directions:

- Mix all crackers, cereal, etc together in LARGE container
- Drizzle oil over cracker mixture and stir to coat
- Mix all dry ingredients together and sprinkle over cracker mixture, stirring well to coat

### Suggestions:

- The recipe says to mix in a food safe trash bag, but any LARGE container will do
- Cracker options: oyster crackers, Cheez Nips, Ritz Crisps
- Cereal options: Chex, Cheerios, Shredded Wheat, Corn Pops
- Snack options: pretzels, Bugles, tortilla chips

## Cranberry Tea

### Ingredients:

- 6 cups water, divided
- 2 family size or 8 regular tea bags
- 1 tsp. whole cloves
- 2—2 1/2 cinnamon sticks
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups cranberry juice, cocktail
- 1 cup orange juice
- 1/4 cup lemon juice

### Directions:

- In a large pot, bring 4 cups of water to a boil
- Add teabags, cloves, and cinnamon sticks; cover and steep for 5 minutes.
- Strain, discarding the teabags and spices
- Stir in the remaining water and other ingredients
- Stir until sugar is dissolved
- Serve warm or over ice

Makes 4 quarts.

## Not to Needle, But You Should Get Hooked on a New Hobby

If you don't have a "grandma hobby," now would be the perfect time to pick one up. Although if you're reading this, you're probably one of the people who still believe in and consume print journalism, which means there's a good chance that you have one already. However, in case you don't, allow me to plead my case.

So, what constitutes a grandma hobby? Sewing, knitting, crocheting, baking, gardening, bird-watching or even reading would fall into the category, although that list is by no means comprehensive. Personally, I find the term a bit condescending, as it seems to reduce centuries of skills and traditions into some sort of supposedly uncool caricature. On the other hand, my grandmas are/were pretty cool, so I consider it a compliment to be compared to either of them. Additionally, the culture surrounding these hobbies is changing, so I don't expect the grandma association to last too much longer.

As one might be able to discern from the title, my purpose here is to advocate specifically for the fiber arts, knitting and crochet, especially.

Aside from the obvious ego boost that comes with turning a ball of yarn into an object that can actually be used in day-to-day life, there has also been a recent surge of research into the measurable positive effects of these hobbies on mental and physical health. This could be attributed to COVID, as people picked up new skills in an effort to fill all of the new time they found themselves in possession of.

What has been found is that people who take up new skills experience improvements in memory and a reduced risk of cognitive decline, as they often need to problem-solve. The meditative nature of these practices has also been proven to lower stress, anxiety and cortisol, and increase serotonin.

Some have even noticed increased attention span, counteracting the effects of the digital age. Crafting forces a person to focus on one thing at a time, completely focusing on where they are in the moment, immersed in the act of creation.

Finally, there's the social impact. People tend to form connections based on shared interests, be that in person or online. I personally have experienced all of these improvements in my own life – and many more – but this one is perhaps the most significant. I've forged more friendships in yarn stores than I have anywhere else, and having a shared passion at the center makes it even more special.

This fall would be an excellent time to start learning something new. By the time winter comes, you could have a new hat, scarf or even something larger if you're particularly ambitious. Or, you could perfect a recipe for your new favorite comfort food, do a puzzle or read a good book. Get lost in something; it'll be fun.

## The New Jerusalem / Children of Hope—School in Haiti



Haiti continues to be a very dangerous place. **PRAY** that there will be an end to the gang activity there. Correction on the damage caused by the gangs in October. It was the elementary school and the church next to it, outside of Verrettes, that was destroyed, not the secondary school in town. **PRAY** for wisdom and God's guidance and protection for the teachers and others who work at the schools. There is an uncertainty for us as to what is happening at these schools, and with the students, both the elementary out in the country school and for the junior high and secondary at the school in Verrettes, since the gang attacks and destruction in October. **PRAY** for **VOLVICK**, one of the founders of the school and also the Principal of the schools, elementary and secondary. He continues to live in Port au Prince and work to support himself, so that the money that we send helps support this school, it is all used for the school and its needs. **PRAY** for his safety as he works in Port au Prince.

**FOOD BANK - THANK YOU** for your generous giving to the Food Bank, both putting food items in the basket in the hallway and your generous donations of food items for **LEAVE THE LIGHTS ON**, which was delivered to the food bank.
