# A Word from the Pastor

"The blood of the martyrs is the seed of the Church." (Quintus Septimius Tertullian)

As I write this, it is the day following the memorial service for Charlie Kirk, which took place this past Sunday in Phoenix Arizona. As I was watching the proceedings, I was reminded of a story that I had heard theologian R.C. Sproul share at various times. It was the story of two bishops from Oxford, England, Bishops Latimer and Ridley, who were burned at the stake in 1555, martyred for their Christian faith. And the story goes that as the fire raged around them, Bishop Latimer said to Bishop Ridley, "Play the man, Mr. Ridley, and by the grace of God, this flame will light a candle that will bring light to the whole of England that can never be extinguished." That phrase, "Play the man," was attributed to the early church father, Polycarp, as he was facing execution for his Christian faith by the emperor of Rome in 155 AD.

Why should these early Christian martyrs come to mind as I was watching this funeral service for Charlie Kirk? It was because, even though Charlie first became known for his involvement in politics, it was his Christian faith that was most important to him. And, he said that if he was to ever be remembered, it is also what he would want to be remembered for. As he shared once in an interview shortly before his assassination, Charlie said that what he would want to be remembered for was "the courage of his faith."

And that was what was most striking to me in watching this funeral. Attending his service and speaking about him from the podium were gathered the top of the top, the highest of the highest, of our political system. There speaking about Charlie Kirk was the President, the Vice-President, the Secretary of State, and other top members of the Cabinet. Gathered amongst the more than 100,000 people in attendance paying their respects were Senators and Representatives, the Speaker of the House and other political dignitaries. And the most amazing thing about all of this was that none of them were there to talk about Charlie and his politics.

Rather, every one of the speakers was talking about Charlie and his faith. Every one of these speakers during this over 5 hour service was talking about - Jesus Christ! What everyone listening to this service witnessed - whether there in the audience, or gathered in other stadiums around the globe broadcasting it, streaming it online (of which Charlie's organization Turning Point USA reported were over 100 million), or like myself, sitting in my own home watching on television was a continuous testimony to the power of the gospel of Jesus Christ and to the personal Christian convictions that Charlie Kirk held.

This is what Charlie talked about in his TPUSA events. As I shared with you a couple of weeks ago, right after his horrendous murder happened, he would talk about anything the audience wanted to talk about - politics, social issues, current events, international issues, gender issues. But with every response, Charlie would bring it back to the gospel, bring it back to Jesus Christ - to having a personal relationship with Jesus Christ, to knowing your eternity is secure when you know Him as your Lord and Savior.

There were speeches on doctrine, on solid Reformed teaching, similar to what I share with you every week about the substitutionary atonement of Christ, the penal understanding of the cross, justice and mercy, and Christ's double imputation where Jesus takes on our sins and we take on His righteousness which makes our forgiveness possible. And speaking of forgiveness – something of which we are commanded to do – one of the most powerful moments was when Charlie's widow, Erika Kirk, shared the words of Jesus from the cross when our Savior spoke out, 'Father, forgive them for they know not what they do.' And she, then, proceeded to forgive the assassin.

# A Word from the Pastor, Continued

So many of the speakers went on to speak of the nature of Charlie's effort as being one marked by a form of spiritual warfare. Some were saying such things as, "Charlie knew that we're in a spiritual war for the heart, soul, and future of America, and he was ultimately killed because of it." And, that Charlie was. Charlie Kirk was killed for his words. Because, whether it was his political words or others words, his words always came back to Jesus Christ. And, ultimately, Charlie was killed because he was bold in declaring his faith in Christ Jesus.

As one speaker shared, "I see now clearly that Charlie was a prophet. He confronted evil and proclaimed the truth and called us to repent and be saved. Amen." Just like Bishop Latimer and Bishop Ridley. Just like Polycarp. When it's all said and done, Charlie Kirk "Played the man."

Erika Kirk shared about what had come in the aftermath of her husband's assassination. She said, "This past week, we saw people open a Bible for the first time in a decade. We saw people pray for the first time since they were children. We saw people go to a church service for the first time in their entire lives." As it is written in Genesis 50:20, when Joseph was reunited with his brothers who had committed so many wrongs against him, even to the point of wanting to kill him, he said, "You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good, to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives."

And so it continues now with the legacy of Charlie Kirk. Which brings to mind the words of, yet, one more early father of the church, the theologian Tertullian, who said, "The blood of the martyrs is the seed of the Church." And now, praise God, because of Charlie Kirk may we see that seed continue to grow and grow into abundance.

# Scandanavian Almond Bars

~ from Jane Langvardt

# Ingredients:

- 1 3/4 cup flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1/2 tsp almond extract
- Milk for brushing
- 1/2 cup sliced almonds

#### <u>lcing:</u>

- 1 cup confectioner's sugar
- 1/4 tsp almond extract
- 3-4 tsp milk

#### Directions:

- Preheat oven to 325 degrees
- Stir together flour, baking powder and salt set aside
- In large bowl, beat butter until softened
- Add sugar and beat until fluffy
- Add egg and almond extract, and beat well
- Add flour mixture and beat until well mixed
- Divide dough into four parts, and form each section into a 12 inch roll
- Place 2 of the rolls 4-5" apart on an ungreased cookie sheet
- Flatten each roll until they are about 3 inches wide
- Repeat with the remaining rolls
- Brush each flattened roll with milk and sprinkle with about 2 Tbsp almonds
- Bake 12-14 minutes, or until lightly browned
- While still warm, cut bars crosswise on the diagonal into 1-inch strips
- Cool on wire rack
- Mix icing ingredients, and drizzle over cookies when they are completely cool

Her dad (John) is still in a nursing home facility in Salina, continuing to recover from the stroke he had a couple of years ago, he is needing a NEW BATTERY for his wheel chair, it has to be ordered from Mexico and is on backorder. Shelly had hoped to get it before she left and get it installed. Her mom (Baubee) has her own physical needs and continual health concerns – she is having some flare-ups with her autoimmune problem and is struggling with severe fatigue. Her mom's brother-in-law lives next door to her mom and is a big help to them. Pray for the need for more property to become available for the mission work in Klose, Albania.

# Fredy and Djana JAVIER - Modern Day Missions-Macedonia

Pray for the Javier's - We do not get updates on their work, but know they are working with a project they started there last year. Business as Mission is a plan that provides an opportunity of giving remote (call center) assistance to the freight sector (Like a Freight Broker Agent). They have a desire to share the Gospel message with those working with them, as they hire and give training to locals who are already very fluent in English and can do this job. Through this project they can provide jobs and have the opportunity to create a new work culture based on Biblical principles. PRAY for their children, JAVI (Shavi) and SHARON, for a good school year and the needs in their lives.

# The New Jerusalem / Children of Hope—School in Haiti

I do not have current information, but presume the school year has started. Pray for the teachers and students - safety as they go back and forth to school each day and the ability to learn in spite of things going on around them. Haiti continues to be a VERY DANGEROUS place. Pray for VOLVICK (founder and principal of the school), as he continues to live and work in Port au Prince and maintain contact and guidance for both schools – elementary out in the country and secondary in Verrettes. Each school does have an onsite principal for the school. Pray for VOLVICK'S day to

day safety in Port au Prince, everywhere there is **very dangerous**. Gangs are still very active and seem to be growing in size. **PRAY** for the safety of all of the people living in this country. I believe New Covenant is the only church helping to support the school, so **let's keep VOLVICK**, **the students and teachers in our prayers** during this very difficult and dangerous time.
