
A Message from the **District Governor**



MASS EYEGLASS SCREENING IN JACKSONVILLE District 35 O Clubs assist the effort.

Photos are attached of the event in Jacksonville promoted by Johnson & Johnson, Jacksonville Jaguars, Boys and Girls Clubs of Duval County, Everbank Stadium, and Multiple District 35 Lions.

Photos are of Lions from Port Orange-Volusia Lions Club, South Daytona Lions Club, and Ponce Inlet Lions Club partnering together to provide the initial screening with our 2 Welch-Allyn Spot Vision Screeners. Kids were given a white band if their eyes were OK, a red band if they needed further screening. Red band kids went to a separate area and were examined by an optometrist or ophthalmologist. Prescriptions were written and glasses will be mailed to each child in approximately two weeks. Lions came from all over Florida, as far away as Miami from the south and Crestview from the west.

The total UNOFFICIAL count was 649 children screened! GO LIONS! Thank you J & J!!

Program Spotlights: Making a Difference

As the charitable arm of LWVI, we restore vision locally and globally via core programs like the Vision Health Program, which provides crucial vision screenings for children, and the Gratis Tissue Program, offering free or reduced-fee corneal tissue to underinsured individuals. Our Surgeon Training Program educates ophthalmologists worldwide on advanced cornea transplantation techniques, and our Research Center advances treatments for blinding eye diseases. Additionally, we maintain our historic 114-year-old building in Ybor City, ensuring it remains a vital part of our community and identity.





Mission Moment: A Special Sunday to Remember

This past Sunday, the LWVI Vision Health Department's **Glazer Mobile Vision Clinic** had the honor of participating in a very special, last-minute event at the AdventHealth Training Center at 1 Buccaneer Place. With just three days notice, it was no small feat to pull everything together but thanks to the dedication and teamwork of our Vision Health Program team, the day became one we will never forget.

Our team had the privilege of serving a remarkable group of children from the **Jackson Heights NFL YET/Tampa Parks & Recreation Center**. The children received vision screenings, eye exams, and even walked away with glasses on-site. For many of these children, this was their very first pair of glasses, a gift that will impact their learning, confidence, and everyday life in ways both big and small.

But the day held an even bigger surprise. After the clinic, the LWVI crew — **Dr. Matt Helsing, Steve Casto, Layla Righoff & Nicole Opritza** — were invited to join the children at the **Tampa Bay Buccaneers' 50th Anniversary Home Opener** against the New York Jets. And this wasn't just any game-day experience. The group had the rare privilege of sitting right alongside the very children they had just served, sharing in the magic of their first Bucs game.

"It's always heartwarming to see the joy on a child's face when they put on their new glasses for the first time," said Steve Casto, Vision Health Program Manager. "But watching those same children cheer, clap, and jump with excitement as they recognized their favorite players and read jersey numbers across the field was something extraordinary. Their shouts of *'I can see everything now!'* and the endless stream of high-fives reminded us, in the most joyful way, just how powerful the gift of sight truly is."

The game itself was a nail-biter, with the Bucs pulling out a win in the final seconds, but the real victory was seeing those smiles light up the stadium. The afternoon was less about football and more about connection: sharing laughter, cheers, and unforgettable memories with the children whose lives had been touched by our mission earlier that same day.

Steve recounts how their hearts were as full as the stands that afternoon. "This game easily became my favorite I've ever had the privilege to attend, not just because of the amazing win in the final seconds of the game, but because **those children** reminded all of us why we do what we do."







Floyd emphasized what this opportunity means for his students. "This is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for our students," Floyd said. "For many of them, it will be their first time leaving Florida. They'll stand on the stage at Carnegie Hall and see what can happen when talent, discipline, and community support come together. It is more than just music for these students. It is an opportunity to show them the limitless future that lies ahead if they are willing to work for their dreams."

The invitation itself represents a unique legacy moment for Leesburg. The choir was personally invited by alumnus Carlton Kilpatrick, a former chorus student who is now a conductor leading the very concert they'll be part of at Carnegie Hall. His invitation shows the deep roots of the program and the way former students continue to give back.

Currently, 78 students are enrolled in the program, up from just 30 the year prior. Of those, 14 students will travel to New York March 11–15 to perform. The total cost of the trip is \$52,400. Through fundraising and early donations, the program has made progress, but \$42,734 is still needed to ensure all expenses for the students are covered.




