MD 35 Celebrates 100th Anniversary in Orlando

The Multiple District 35 of Florida, the Bahamas, Aruba, Bonaire, and Curacao celebrated its 100th anniversary in May at the Florida Convention Hotel and Convention Center in Orlando, coinciding with the 100th anniversary of Helen Keller's speaker to Lions at their 9th 1925 convention in Cedar Point, Ohio. To top it all off, the first all female Council of Governors was installed. The occasion was marked with an outstanding Friday evening program, multiple session opportunities, well-prepared food, and an excellent International Director, the Honorable Anthony Paradiso.

Thursday, May 1, the Council of Governors met with the visiting ID for dinner concluding a day of organization and interviews by the incoming FVDGs seeking a Council Chair for their team.





On Friday morning, May 2, registration opened at 7:30 A.M. Breakfast was sponsored by Lions Saving Sight [formerly *Florida Lions Foundation for the Blind*]. The meeting was called to order by Board of Director President Lion Joel Levenson, PVDG, who welcomed everyone and then introduced the Head Table and the Council of Governors.

Following breakfast, Board Secretary Lion Greg Evans PCC called roll and presented the minutes from the previous meeting. Executive Secretary/ Treasurer Lion Anita McHenry gave the financial report. The KEERL Report was delivered by Lion Beverly Flynn FVDGE.

The First General Session began at 9:30 P.M. Council Chair Lion Adita Vazquez called the meeting to order and the turned it over to the Presiding Officer, Lion Jane Colona District Governor 35 N. Following standard protocol, numerous reports were given.

What Peace Means By: Jimmy Lopez-Perez

Peace is the ability of human beings to live in harmony with a healthy coexistence, that is, without violence and discrimination. Peace is important and if we put it into practice, we can have a world with less violence and wars between countries. If we talk about how to start promoting peace, we must start in the family, putting into practice how to stand together, avoid conflicts, and respect the rights of people. We must educate children with love, respect, equality, and without underestimating anyone for their physical condition or disability. In the world, there are many children that have different disabilities and we deserve to live with dignity and respect and without violence and fear.

Since I am given the opportunity, I want us to reflect a little on the countries that at war. For example, Russia, Iraq, and Ukraine are countries that are not thinking about the people and children who die because of the combat they have among themselves. They do not realize that the children who are suffering that attack should be in a school learning our values as human beings, and they deserve to live in peace and harmony. I want to tell you a little about my country, which is Guatemala. It is a country where gangs and drug trafficking and kidnapping are very ugly situations that have stolen the tranquility of all of us, especially us children who suffer the consequences because at any moment we can be forced to be part of them or we can be attacked by them. Also, for instance, Mexico is also a country where there is a lot of violence and drug trafficking that dominates the country. Now we live in a world full of violence and war.

I think we need to take a minute and ask what peace really means. In my little definition peace is that people live in harmony and educate children with love and respect in schools, that teachers teach with love and that we promote in each heart the values of our cultures and tomorrow we are better citizens and say not to drugs. No to delinquency. Let us not be intimidated by the enormity of the pain of the world, do justice now and sow peace and love in hearts.

I leave you with this small thought. If we don't have peace, it's because we've forgotten that we belong to each other. Not everyone can do big things but we can do small things with love. Every time you smile at someone it is an act of love and also a gift to that person.

100th Anniversary of Helen Keller's 1925 Address

Dear Lions,

I suppose you have heard the poetic legend which represents Opportunity as a capricious lady who knocks at every door but once, and if the door isn't opened quickly, she passes on never to return. And that is as it should be. Lovely, desirable ladies won't wait, you have to go out and grab 'em. I am your Opportunity, clothed in visibility. I am knocking at your door. I want to be adopted. The legend doesn't say what you are to do when several beautiful Opportunities present themselves at the same door. I guess you are to choose the one you love the best. I hope you will choose me. I am the youngest, and the opportunity I offer you is full of splendid possibilities of service.

The American Foundation for the Blind is only four years old. It grew out of the imperative needs of the blind and was called into being by the sightless themselves. It is national and international in scope and importance. It represents the best and most enlightened thought on our problems that has been reached so far. It embodies a new idea in our work, unity of effort, which is scientific and modern. It will render impartial assistance to all classes of the blind. It will make the efforts of local

organizations more effective, more fruitful in results.

The time has come to regard the work for the sightless as a whole, in which the kindergarten, the school, the library, the workshop, the home for the aged blind and prevention are seen to be parts of a great movement with one end in view, namely making life more worth living for the blind everywhere. Beside the young blind, for whom existing institutions are supposed to provide, there is a large class of men and women who lose their sight when it is too late for them to go to school. Those who are in the dark from childhood are hard pressed to find their place in the work of the world; but the man suddenly stricken blind is another Samson, bound, helpless, dependent, until a way is found to unchain him.

Try to imagine how you would feel if you lost your sight tomorrow. Picture yourself stumbling and groping at noonday as in the night, your work, your independence gone! In that dark hour wouldn't your heart cry out for a friend to teach you how to live in the dark?

That is just the kind of friend the American Foundation for the Blind will be to all the blind if people with sight will only give it the support it must have. Adequately financed, it will help the blind in every emergency of their lives.

You have heard how I was taught—how a little word from the fingers of another, a ray of light from another soul touched the darkness of my mind, and I found myself, found the world, and found God! It is because my teacher cared about me and broke through the dark, silent imprisonment which held me that I am able to work for myself and for others. If you care, if we can make the people of this great country care, the blind will triumph over blindness.

This is the opportunity I offer you, Lions—to foster and sponsor the work of the American Foundation for the Blind. Will you not help me hasten the day when there shall be no preventable blindness, no little deaf blind child untaught, no blind man or woman unaided? I appeal to you, Lions—you who have your sight, your hearing, you who are strong and brave and kind—will you not constitute yourselves Knights of the Blind in my crusade against darkness?




