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** A LITTLE MORE ABOUT "MARDI GRAS"

- *Mardi Gras* is actually French for "Fat Tuesday." It marks the last day of "Carnival" season which is characterized by the practice of the last night of eating rich, fatty foods before the fasting of the Lenten season begins the next day, Ash Wednesday.
- Mardi Gras has its roots in pagan spring holidays like Saturnalia. Once Christianity came to Rome, religious leaders tried to blend pagan traditions with Christian traditions for an easier transition. Despite the tons of parties, decadence, and debauchery that is modern day Mardi Gras with no scriptural ties, the event marks the time after Advent and before Lent.
- It's hard not to notice that during Mardi Gras everything is decked out in the colors purple, green and gold. They actually mean something! Purple stands for justice. Green stands for faith. Gold stands for power. In 1872 they became the season's official colors.
- You'll hear 'laissez les bon temps rouler' (pronounced lay-say le bon tom roo-lay) over and over again at Mardi Gras celebrations. It means "let the good times roll" in Cajun French.
- King Cake takes its name from the Bible's three kings. And the plastic baby, buried in the cake, stands for baby Jesus. It celebrates Epiphany, a Christian holiday that reflects on the kings visiting Jesus. It is good fortune to find the little plastic baby in your piece of cake!
- Mardi Gras isn't just a New Orleans thing. Carnival is celebrated throughout the Gulf Coast and internationally in Brazil, Germany, Italy, Colombia, Trinidad, Mexico, and more.
- Pope Gregory XIII made Mardi Gras an official Christian holiday in 1582, but it didn't make its way to New Orleans until the 17th century.
- It's illegal to ride on a parade float without wearing a mask. This was a law put in place to break down social barriers and allow everyone participating to associate with whomever they want.
