



From The Pastor's Desk

Member Spotlight



When speaking of Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church lineage, a few names come to mind, one of whom is **Vernell Elaine White Ellis**. Mother Ellis was born and raised in Fairfax County, living in this area all her life. The only child of Margaret and Harvey White, she began attending Mt. Pleasant as a child and was baptized in Horse Pen Creek when she was in her teens. "There was no baptismal pool at the white wooden church, so you came to church in whatever clothing you were to be baptized in, went down the road to the creek for baptism then changed to dry clothes and attended service. There was no separate room inside the church to use to change clothes. Some people lived close enough to be able to go home and put on dry clothes."

She attended Floris Elementary School, which was located on what is near property now owned by Mt. Pleasant, going on to Manassas Industrial High School for Colored Youth. After graduating, she worked at SAI (now SAIC) for 21 years, while being a wife and raising her four children. She retired fully in 1994 but continued to work at various jobs and take classes such as typing and cake decorating.

Rev. Hill was pastor when she became a member of Mt. Pleasant. She went to church every Sunday (which was on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of each month). There were no designated ministries and no organized choir. Those who wanted to sing that Sunday merely showed up – no real rehearsal. "Things really started with Rev. Winters. He organized different groups." Over the years, Mother Ellis has seen a multitude of changes with respect to the physical structures of Mt. Pleasant, from the original wooden structure to the purchase of additional land across the street and building of a Fellowship Hall with a cooking facility, to the tearing down of that structure to build the red brick church with a Baptismal Pool, and to the move into our current facility. She has always been very active, singing in the Senior Choir and the Women of Praise, chairperson of the food committee, prepared the church bulletin, member of the Seniors Ministry and worked in many other capacities over the years.

Mother Ellis has a long lineage at Mt. Pleasant. Deacon Emeritus Phillip Bush was her uncle and Deacon Emeritus Louis White is her cousin.

Mother Ellis enjoys crafting, crochet, puzzles, and painting, among other things. When asked what personal accomplishment she is most proud of she stated that she "enjoys getting around and being with people."

She has many favorite scriptures. The first to come to mind was Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me". NKJV


On Friday the church was decorated to resemble a movie theater and the movie "Ruth and Boaz" was shown. Everyone enjoyed the movie and the atmosphere.




S.E.E. Fundraisers














Seasoned Saints Weekend

The Seniors Ministry has consistently been an active, vibrant and impactful ministry here at Mount Pleasant for 29+ years. The progressive history of *The Journey of the Senior's Ministry from Vision to Legacy* was presented.

We honored **Rev. Helen Best**, the **Founder of our Seniors Ministry** and **Deacon Lester Best** who has supported Rev. Best, the Seniors Ministry, and Mount Pleasant Baptist Church for over 40+years. We are truly grateful for this loving couple who truly cares about God's people.

Seniors Ministry History – A Journey from Vision to Legacy

Sharing the history of the Seniors Ministry was a part of the overall Seasoned Saints Weekend. Our theme for the weekend, "We're All In" implies giving up one's own will and desires to align with the WILL of our AL-MIGHTY GOD, (Matthew 16:24), from conception to birth to passing the torch to future generations. We want to keep our love for GOD and deep and loving respect for our elder seasoned saints in the forefront. We want to keep them engaged, connected, and contributing members of our church family.

THE VISION

Early on, God gave Mother Helen Best a VISION which awakened in her the realization of her purpose. We all know how much she deeply loves and cares for her own family. GOD revealed that she also had a strong passion and deep desires in her heart to care for others, to care for the elders in such a way that builds them up, helps them to continue to see their own God-given purpose and potential even in their latter seasons and to reassure them they are valued. And she also used her gifts to teach and disciple others whom God puts in her path to do likewise.

Mid 1980s

In the mid 1980's Deaconess Helen Best would pick up some of the elderly ladies from time to time and take them to breakfast, to the mountains, to the shopping mall, to movie theater outings, mall walking, or sometimes just to the park to keep them from being idle with nothing to do. Some of the ladies during that time were: Mother Josiephine Corum, Mother Margaret White, Mother Frances Wilkerson, Sister Dorothy Bush, Mother Mable Newman, and Sister Lucy Coates.

Mid 1990s

The continuous and ongoing activities with the seniors was not only noticed but formally established as the **Senior Citizen's Ministry** at Mount Pleasant Baptist Church in 1996 under the guidance of the Holy Spirit and the Pastoral Leadership of Rev Dr James L. Graham, Jr. This was some 10+ years later. Thank you Pastor Emeritus Graham for then having the wisdom to look amongst you and see who was already doing the work and for appointing Rev. Helen Best to lead the effort.

Some of the gatherings also turned into Bible Study sessions when one of our early teachers, Mother Theopolis Braxton insisted that Seniors should really study the Bible to show themselves approved unto God and to have something good to pass on to the next generation. It grew from a bible study where they went from house to house on the third Tuesday of each month with prayer, bible study and testimonies (partaking of some delicious food and fellowshipping together). It then moved to the senior's activity center and later moved into the church building, going from a once a month session to weekly bible study sessions.

2000s

In 2001 Rev. Best was led to appoint seven young ladies to assist in preparing for Senior Citizen's Day. She called them "**Precious Jewels**" based on the book of Revelations. They have faithfully continued throughout the years to support and serve this ministry.

Thank God for people like Deacon Scott Keith who had a desire to see more seniors in church, so he and Rev. Best came up with a plan to go to Cameron Glen Nursing Home and pick up seniors and bring them to church. This led to the establishment of the Bus Ministry, with Rev. Leon Todd and Deacon Scott Keith driving on Sundays to pick up the nursing home residents and bring them to church.

There were others who were not mobile and could not leave the Nursing Home, so another plan was developed to take the church to them. Cameron Glen Ministry began out of this effort. A team of Ministers and Diaconate later joined the Seniors in this effort, conducting Service on the third Sunday of each month at 2:00 PM.

Our Senior's Activity Center was dedicated on Saturday, October 29, 2005. Every Saturday morning the terrific trio Rev. Helen Best, Deaconess Judy Jackson and Rev. Mary Alice Glenn began meeting to pray. This started to catch fire and Early Morning Prayer began at the church from 6am-8am. People would stop by on their way to work.

In 2006 Brother Ezekiel Pinkney was brought on to assist Rev. Best with the Senior's Ministry. He worked tirelessly with Rev. Best in whatever capacity was needed. Later after running her leg of the race when the Lord told her it was time to step down, Rev Best passed the torch to Rev. Ezekiel Pinkney and he became the Director of the Seniors Ministry, with Rev. Best and Deacon Best transitioning to an advisory role and others coming alongside to help support the continued mission.

When Rev. Pinkney was tapped to move to a different assignment, the torch was passed on to Rev. Shirley Alexander. In 2017 she began to lead the Seniors Ministry. As a Precious Jewel herself she'd been sitting at the feet of Mother Best since 2001 gleaning every nugget she could, and assisting with the Seniors Ministry. Rev. Shirley did not realize that God was grooming her for such a time as this. Not only through assisting Mother Best but also through over 30 years of faithful and diligent service to MPBC. She's served in various ministries and capacities, including Hospitality Ministry, Beautification Ministry, Church Staff Administration, and Associate Minister. She was instrumental in establishing the Living Legacy program to ensure we recognize those individuals who have served selflessly for MPBC for 40+ years and some for lifetimes. She and her husband Raymond Alexander, Jr. helped design the Cross in the sanctuary over the baptismal pool. The Seasoned Saints are blessed recipients of her gifts and talents as she faithfully pours into this Ministry.

And the Ministry continues....After the COVID Shutdown was over and we were trying to return to a NEW NORMAL, Pastor Donalson asked the ministries conducting Bible Studies to return to the church. The Seniors Ministry was the first ones back to in-person Bible Study and have been continuing to meet weekly on Tuesday mornings.

Rev. Helen Best, because of your loving heart and faithfulness the LORD has blessed this ministry with continuity, discipled transitioned leadership, ministry support and active, engaged and caring members. Mother Best, this is your legacy – you've set the standard high. Rev. Best and Deacon Best we honor you both. Deacon Best will say it's not him, but Mother. Yes Deacon Best GOD gave the Vision to Mother Best, but you have always been there throughout, always encouraging, always being supportive, always serving and advising. You've been 100% ALL IN, every step of the way. The Vision was fulfilled, the Legacy is passing on, and thanks be unto our faithful GOD and HIS planting diligent people who catch the vision and run with it, the Ministry continues. Bless You Rev. Helen Best and Deacon Emeritus Lester Best for all you have done to serve our Seniors Ministry, the Mount Pleasant Baptist Church and the Kingdom of GOD!
