





#### TAX PACKAGE — HB 7063

- Provides \$1.7 million in tax cuts
- Provides for a 7-day Skilled Worker Tools Sales Tax Holiday for skilled trade items such as certain power tools, safety equipment and toolboxes
- Provides for two 14-day Back-to-School Sales Tax Holidays and Disaster Preparedness Sales Tax Holidays
- Provides for a 3-month Freedom Summer Sales Tax Holiday exempting sales tax on outdoor recreational items and admission to music and sporting events

#### (Continued...) TAX PACKAGE - HB 7063

- Permanent sales tax exemptions on baby and toddler products such as diapers, wipes, shoes, clothing and strollers
- Permanent sales tax exemption on hygiene products such as incontinence products, adult diapers, toothpaste, toothbrushes and floss.
- Provides for a 3-year freeze on local communications services tax rates
- A 1-year sales tax exemption on energy efficient appliances
- Reduces the business rent tax from 5.5% to 4.5%

# STATE BUDGET PROCESS FY 2023-24

#### THE STATE BUDGET PROCESS

- October 15, 2022 Agency Budgets including Legislative Budget Requests (LBRs)
- Governor's Budget Recommendations Due at least 30-days prior to Session
- House and Senate pass their appropriations bill, differences reconciled through the budget conference
- Conference report must be on the desk at least 72 hours
- Governor: 7 days during Session, or **15 days** outside of Session to take action, has line-item veto authority.
- Budget bill, implementing bill, conforming bills Effective July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024.




