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


Key Differences: Reader's Theatre and Script-In-Hand

Similarities: Actors wear black, hold their scripts, and rehearse for a week with no memorization. Differences: Script-In-Hand has a "Stand-Up, Read, Sit-Down" format, with a narrator reading stage direction. Reader's Theatre includes minimal blocking, some props, a defined play area and expressive costume pieces- like hats or capes.

A Unique Opportunity

In the week leading up to the performances, the five young actors, Thomas Silva-Monroy, Randall Snow, Oliver Silva-Monroy, Ruby Sigler, and Stella Riley, put in long days working on not only their characters, but also playing theater games, developing acting skills, and stage movement. 


Looking Forward Native Gardens

Director Ruth Veselka admits the show did a little escaping of its own. "I may have bent a few of the traditional 'reader's theatre rules-especially the ones about keeping the set and lighting 'basic.' In my defense, this is basic...for me."
