OVERVIEW

The City of Hardy, Arkansas is a municipality situated in the northern portion of Sharp County and a slight portion of southern Fulton County. The City spans some 5.4 square miles of land in the valley along the emerald green Spring River. Area lakes and streams makes up .26 square miles of the city area. The Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) Railroad, the largest freight railway in the United States, and Arkansas Highway 63 bisects the city. The 2010 Census finds the population to be 778 residents, however the summer seasonal population grows to an estimated 5,000 given the number of vacation homes in the city and surrounding area. As the population is less than 5,000 people Hardy is classified a City of the 2nd Class by the State of Arkansas.

STRATEGY

The City Council of Hardy wishes to proactively assist with future growth of the city by establishing and maintaining a documented list of initiatives they feel necessary to aid the city's growth, health, safety and quality of life. They therefore provide this document to help focus attention on the areas of growth and assist those involved in its growth.

Where necessary the City Council of Hardy shall enact or modify municipal code to assist in executing this plan. In compiling and maintaining this plan the City Council wishes to encourage public, private, and corporate participation in achieving the plan goals. The City encourages constructive and meaningful input in the plan and in no way wishes to imply the plan activity is a city exclusive effort.

Where possible <u>all</u> resources of the City of Hardy including the Hardy Advertising and Promotion Commission (HAPC), Hardy Water Works (HWW), and various committees shall be engaged in achieving the plan goals. To help the public understand the timeline of activity, each item shall have an implementation goal.

OWNERSHIP, MAINTENANCE, AND APPROVAL

It is a requirement of the City of Hardy that this plan be maintained by the Hardy Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z). It is further required that this plan be reviewed annually in an open public forum by July of each calendar year in order to be viably strategic for years to come. As part of this review, accomplishments shall be noted, initiatives postponed or remove sited, and new initiatives added.

This Strategic Plan and its yearly revisions shall be the principle driving force for future maintenance and proposed improvements for the City of Hardy at the year-end annual budget planning cycle. The Hardy City Council shall approve the plan and annual revisions during a regular meeting of the council.
