

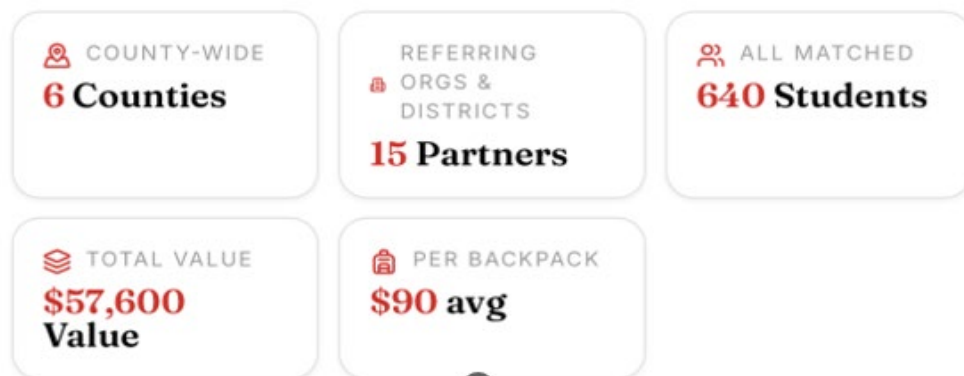


PROJECT READINESS 2026 IMPACT REPORT

640 Backpacks, 640 Fresh Starts.

Project Readiness's 2026 Backpack Drive was a success, thanks to the generosity of our individual, corporate, and congregational donors. We routed 640 filled backpacks to 15 different receiving non-profit organizations and school districts located across 6 New Jersey counties. These organizations and districts, in turn, distribute the backpacks to eager students!

Of the 640 backpacks, which have an average value of \$90 USD/backpack, 79 were provided by individual donors, 191 by corporate donors, and 215 by congregational donors, each as an in-kind contribution. Project Readiness purchased the backpacks and supplies for the remaining 155 backpacks, and assembled them for students at our Denville office. Assuming the average \$90 value/backpack, the 2026 backpack drive raised a total of \$57,600 USD in monetary and in-kind donations – **a \$57,600 USD investment in the futures of these students.**

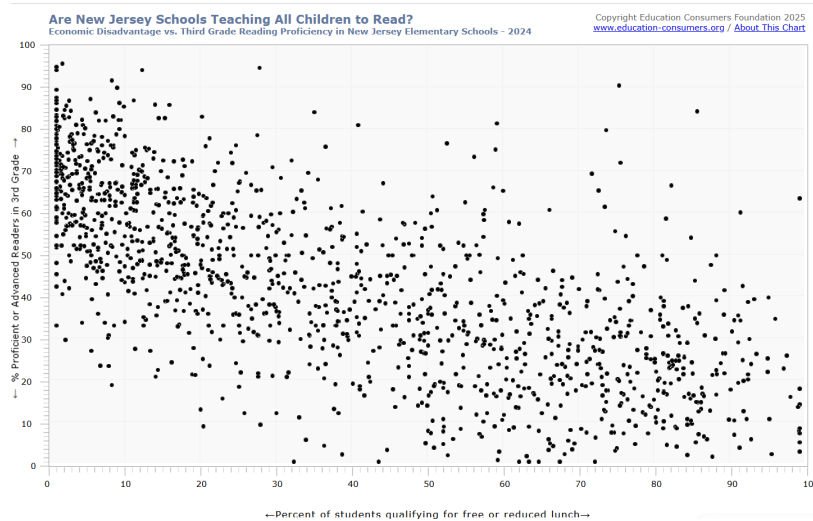

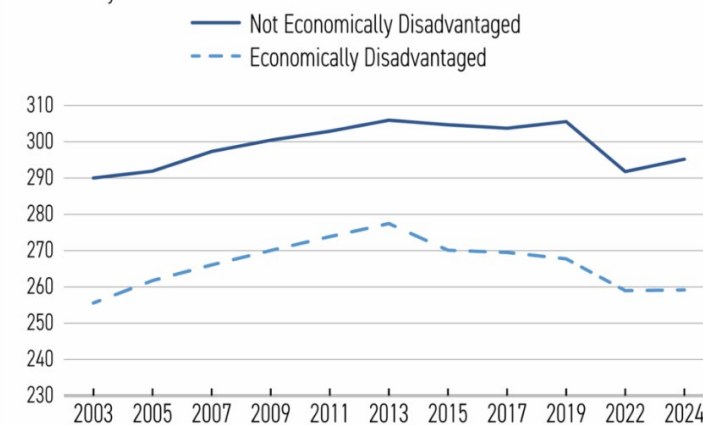
You didn't just fill a backpack. You removed a barrier.

From empty-handed to ready on day one.

The data is clear: free school supplies work to improve student experience in myriad ways:

Kids In Need Foundation surveyed more than 7,400 educators nationwide about students receiving free classroom supplies. Among teachers using its resource centers:

Reported student outcome	Teachers reporting an impact
Class preparedness	99%
Interest in learning	99%
Class participation	97%
Confidence	97%
Self-esteem	96%
Social engagement	96%

Educators also reported that supplies helped them:

- Create a more equitable learning environment: 99%
- Meet students' needs through daily instruction: 99%
- Expand the variety and scope of classroom projects: 98%

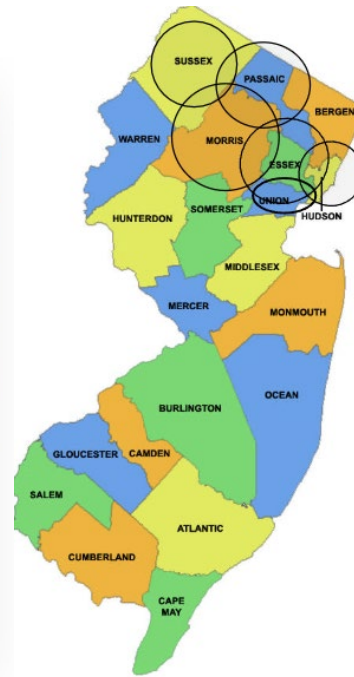

Our Referring Partners:

Each Project Readiness student comes to us from a via a referring partner, as Project Readiness is not a vetting organization. Our referring partners are split between area non-profits such as Nourish.NJ and Sparrow House Outreach, state school districts and schools such as East Side High School in Newark, and government entities such as Head Start of Morris County. This year, Project Readiness was proud to add partnerships with Mary's Hands, Eagle Academy for Young Men of Newark, the Dover School District, and Thomas A. Edison Career and Technical Academy to our roster, enlarging our statewide coverage to **six counties**. **This keeps Project Readiness on pace to meet its goal of adding one NJ county per year, with the ultimate goal of statewide coverage.**

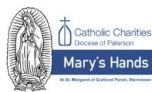
