Ministry Description

RTS Missions was founded in 2006 by Greg and Maria Shepherd. For eight years RTS led teams from churches all over the country into Haiti. RTS quickly became a trusted leader in facilitating trips into the country of Haiti. The Shepherds moved to Haiti full time in October of 2014. Over the next five years God grew the organization from a missionary family to a registered Foundation in Haiti with over 80 national employees. They started two schools educating just under 800 children, a food distribution ministry providing 40,000 meals a month, an elderly ministry, and six Haitian churches within their network. God used RTS, its staff, volunteers, and the wonderful teams from the United States to witness thousands come to Christ.

In 2020, God provided an opportunity for RTS Missions to expand into the Dominican Republic. RTS now operates a twenty plus acre ministry compound in Jimani, Dominican Republic. The ministry compound is minutes from the border of Haiti giving us access to continue ministering to Haitians as well as nationals in the DR. Our ministry in the DR has a guest house that will accommodate over fifty people at a time. It has a fully functional medical hospital, an open-air chapel with inground baptistry, a mission's house and two-story missions training center with three apartments and thirteen large classrooms.

Our priority is spiritual sustainability (Discipleship). We follow three avenues in which to make our ministry decisions: education, spiritual development, and physical and emotional needs. Our heart is to reach the next generation for Christ.

Location Information

The Dominican Republic shares an island called Hispaniola with the country of Haiti and is surrounded by the Atlantic Ocean and Caribbean Sea. Nearly 80 percent of the country's 49,000 sq. km is covered with mountains, but some 20 distinct topographical areas exist in Dominican Republic. About half of the nearly eleven million residents live in rural areas, and more than two-thirds of the island's people live in substandard conditions. Roman Catholicism is the country's official religion and about 90 percent profess this. About half of the population are believed to be involved in occult practices. Only five percent claim to be Christian.

The Dominican Republic is the second largest Caribbean nation by size and third by population. Despite improvements in recent years, there is still significant poverty throughout the Dominican Republic. Large communities of Haitian people have moved to the Dominican Republic in hopes of a better life, but they have instead been met with challenges.

What We Do

RTS Missions is an all-inclusive mission sending organization. From the moment God places a trip on your heart, RTS will help you every step of the way to bring this trip to fruition and magnify His glory. Once a team has begun to form RTS will:

- Meet with team leaders via video call or in person (if possible) to discuss the trip and
 offer any suggestions pertaining to your future team meetings that will prepare them
 for the experience God has called them to.
- Schedule a full team orientation via video call or in person (if possible) explaining every facet of the trip they will be part of.
- Excluding airfare, RTS will oversee all logistics of the trip including lodging, meals, in-country transportation, and day-to-day itinerary.
- Offer suggestions for team devotions and daily scripture meditation. This is an excellent way of preparing the team's hearts for their trip. A favorite pre-trip daily devotion is "Before You Go" by Jack Hempfling.
- RTS Team will guide your team through the entire mission trip
- Hold an exit debriefing the night before we fly out. This is very important as these
 missionaries will have seen things they have never imagined and will need time to
 talk about it before coming back to the states.







Travel Instructions to and from the Dominican Republic

Before you leave:

- 1. We strongly recommend that every team travel with emergency extraction medical coverage. There are many that provide this, but RTS Missions recommends www.missionarytravelassociation.com. We have used them for years and consider them one of the best. You can purchase for your team directly from their site. The insurance is roughly \$28 per person for eight days.
- 2. You will need a current passport. Check with local officials: in some locations you can get the application at a post office and in other places you will find it in the "Clerk of Courts" office. Please verify immediately that your passport does not expire until at least 6 months after your scheduled return home.
- 3. Although not required, the CDC recommends various vaccinations for people traveling to the Dominican Republic. Please visit the CDC website for more information. Please contact us with any questions you may have.

When packing for the Dominican Republic, keep these things in mind:

- 1. It is hot. Pack light-colored, loose-fitting but covering, modest clothes. As a ministry organization, we must maintain decency and modesty standards as we serve our community, so as not to detract from our message. Your attire should reflect your mindset of serving in the name of Christ Jesus and appropriate to the ministry you represent think mid-thigh or longer shorts, lightweight pants, short-sleeved shirts, longer skirts and short-sleeved sundresses. Please, no tight-fitting or revealing clothing. Bring extra undergarments and socks. Be prepared to sweat.
- 2. The sun is bright. Bring sunglasses, sunblock, and a hat.
- 3. You will be on your feet. Bring comfortable shoes, at least one pair with hard soles.
- 4. You will be expected to dress modestly and nicely for all church services, especially if you have a part in the worship service. Dress for ladies. Khaki pants or nice jeans and dress shirt or polo for guys. If you choose jeans, please no tears or holes, and still wear a nice shirt. Please, no shorts in church.
- 5. Be sure to pack all your toiletries since shopping is not a real option. Women need to pay attention to their personal hygiene items and be sure they have an adequate supply.



Before you fly:

- 1. Arrive at the airport no less than two and a half hours before departure in the U.S. We will do our best to get you to the airport three hours before departure leaving the Dominican Republic. Possible delays are ever present.
- 2. We strongly encourage you to purchase your airline tickets to arrive in Santo Domingo between 12:00pm and 4:00pm and schedule your return to leave Santo Domingo after 1:00pm or later if possible. Please contact RTS Missions to notify us if this is not possible.
- 3. There are no more customs forms to fill out on the plane to your destination. It is all done electronically now. Please visit the website below to fill out your e-ticket. This will be your customs, immigration, and health affidavit all in one.
- 4. You will need to complete this process one or two days before you board your plane. In doing so you will complete your return affidavit as well. This must be completed in order to receive your tickets at the counter. Once you have completed your form, you will receive two QR Codes, one for your arrival and one for your departure from the Dominican Republic.
- 5. If traveling with family and you want to include those traveling with you, please select "Yes" to the question "Are you traveling with someone else?" Please note: Give the number of people traveling with you, do not include yourself. If your spouse and child are going with you, the answer would be 2 to the question "How many are traveling with you?"

We will send a video explaining how to fill out the form to the team leader during the week of your trip. The form is to be filled out within 72 hours of your departure date.

When you arrive in the Dominican Republic

- 1. Basically, follow the crowd. You will enter the terminal and proceed through immigration. You will need your passport, and your luggage claim ticket readily available. You will see two lines forming. One for nationals and one for visiting foreigners (Most of the time, not always). Just follow the crowd.
- 2. It is possible that the immigration agent will ask you where you are going and the address. Tell them you are going to Jimani (Him-a-knee). The address is Gaspar Polanco 120, but they do not normally ask for the address.
- 3. You will then move to the luggage area to claim your luggage. Just follow the crowd. Once you receive your luggage, once again follow the crowd to the exit. You will come to another station, and they will ask for your QR Code and luggage tag (Maybe, this is always changing). After that, you're home free. Just continue to follow the



- crowd to the exit and walk out the door. As you exit, an RTS Missions representative will be waiting for you.
- 4. As you exit the building area, there is usually a large crowd and will seem very chaotic, but our team will be there to meet you. If for some reason our team does not find you as you come out of the building, go to the right and wait in front of the restrooms and we will be with you shortly. Never leave with anyone other than RTS Missions personnel. Do not go with anyone who says, "I know the pastor. Come with me."

Accommodations

The RTS Missions' guest house is very comfortable. All rooms are set up with multiple bunk beds, bathrooms, air conditioners and fans. We supply sheets, pillows, and a towel for the week.

Keep these things in mind:

- 1. It is not the Holiday Inn. You do have a comfortable bed to sleep in, and after a day of travel or missions work you will sleep fine anywhere.
- 2. Although we have water from wells, do not drink the water or brush your teeth with it. Our guest house will have plenty of bottled water for you to drink and utilize.
- 3. Please do not flush any paper or any foreign products down the commode. Please use the trash can. (Disposable dog waste bags may be helpful to bring.)
- 4. Please limit water use to 1 shower daily, 2 in extreme circumstances.
- 5. Although we provide one towel per person for the week, we strongly suggest that you bring another towel, especially if your team chooses to go to the waterfalls and the beach on the last day.

Food

Great care is taken in food preparation. While out of the country, you must always know where your food comes from. Don't buy any food items off the street. While in the guesthouse, all meals will be prepared by staff cooks. You are welcome to bring snacks to supplement the 3 square meals a day provided by RTS. Always drink the bottled water supplied to you by RTS Missions. There will be plenty of water and drinks for the team to stay hydrated. Please let RTS Missions know of any food restrictions or allergies.

Christians in Dominican Republic

The people of Dominican Republic are very proud of their heritage. This is true of Christians in the DR also. The Christian Dominican Church differs slightly from the churches in the United States:

- 1. **Buildings** None of the churches look the same. Many look like regular buildings from the outside. They may lack electricity, furniture or even windows.
- 2. **Worship** Dominican Christians are very expressive in their worship. You will find excitement in their music and preaching. There is usually some type of service going on during the week: prayer, worship, bible study, youth, young adults. Some worship experiences can be extremely loud; you may want to bring some ear plugs.



Travel and Security Issues

Travel

The roads in the Dominican Republic are very good, but in the cities, travel is slow and difficult. Many travel memories will be made. RTS Missions uses vans, small buses, and larger full-size bus coaches for larger teams.

Security Issues

As of this time, we have never had a problem with any type of violence or crime. We tend to be more proactive in this area. We provide security at our compound every evening. Follow all directions of the RTS Missions staff; the security; and the Dominican leadership. No one should ever wander off alone.

Money Issues and Shopping

The currency in the Dominican Republic is the Dominican Peso. They will take U.S. dollars as well. There is very little chance for you to spend money during the week. All your in-country expenses are taken care of before you arrive. The only expense you will have will be for anything you need while traveling to and from the Dominican and any snacks you may want when we stop during our travel to the guesthouse.


There will be an opportunity to purchase souvenirs if you would like. We recommend you bring \$20-\$50.

If you bring money, please bring small bills. Also, please feel free to give an offering during our church services. We will attend a service Sunday morning and a different service Sunday evening.

Contacting Home

Although RTS Missions desires everyone to do their best to unplug from the life they are accustomed to when on a mission trip, we understand that people need to hear from you. RTS Missions will post to the RTS Missions Facebook Page (www.facebook.com/rtsmissions) once you land letting people know you have arrived. Once in Jimani at our guesthouse you will have access to Wi-Fi.

Important Note: If you do not have an International Plan for data on your phone, please keep your phone on "Airplane Mode." We suggest turning off your "Cellular Data", so you do not have to worry about accidentally turning your airplane mode off. If you do not do one of these two things and do not have an international plan, you will get a surprisingly high cell phone bill the next month.





Preparing for, Working in, and Evaluating the Project

- 1. Learn some Spanish phrases. "Please" (Por favor) and "thank you" (Gracias) are a great way to bridge the language barrier (see attached list of phrases).
- 2. Build a prayer team. Begin to pray early for the project, the people of the Dominican Republic, and your team members. Being prayed up is important.
- 3. Plan several meetings / training sessions with the group before you leave. Everyone will need to know what they will be doing before you get to your country.
- 4. Always remain flexible, "Blessed are the flexible for they will not get bent out of shape." See things as opportunities, not obstacles.
- 5. Plan daily personal and group morning devotionals. At day's end, plan to have "decompressing" time to assimilate the day's activities and plan the next day.
- 6. Make sure all your flights are planned. Make sure RTS Missions knows your flight itinerary as soon as you book your flights.
- 7. All in-country expenses need to be paid in full 30 days in advance. Contact RTS Missions for balances. For cancellation policy: https://www.rtsmissions.com/cancellation-policy
- 8. BE A TEAM. Each team member should have a job assignment, i.e., devotion leader, team photographer, logistics manager, teaching, preaching, etc. PRAY with each other and PRAY for each other.
- 9. Have your church commission you as a missionary. A commissioning service could be done in the morning or evening worship service and will be very meaningful for you and your church.

Evaluation

- 1. RTS Missions will conduct a debriefing on your last night in the DR.
- 2. Celebrate your trip. Set a time during your worship service to celebrate your mission trip. Let the group give testimonies about their experiences.
- 3. Take plenty of slides, pictures, video, and souvenirs for display.

When you return home:

- 1. During the exit debriefing led by RTS Missions, they will "walk" you through the exit procedure and will be guiding you through the process. This includes filling out your e-ticket and getting your QR Code for departure if you did not complete the exit e-ticket at the same time before you left.
- 2. Plan to arrive at the airport 3 hours before departure. This may mean having to leave very early in the morning.



- 3. There is only one door that everyone enters. Follow the crowd through the door and straight up the ramp. At the top of the ramp go to your right for the American Airlines and Delta ticketing counters. Other airlines are very close by. You will need to show the agents your QR Code before you can get your tickets.
- 4. After you have your boarding pass, you will proceed to the security and customs area. (If not with RTS Personnel, please ask for directions to the security line as they have changed their process and are doing remodeling.) Once you go through security, you will come out right at the main concourse. There are only two airsides. One to the right and one to the left. Both directions have plenty of restaurants and stores. It is possible that your flight information may not be on the screens when you arrive. It will tell you when it will be available.
