This could be an overview that includes major initiatives and highlights that were proposed and executed throughout the program year.

The City of Euclid's FY 2025-2029 Five-Year Consolidated Plan addresses four (4) main strategic objectives. These objectives are as follows and are listed in order of priority.

Objective 1: Improve, Maintain, and Expand Affordable Housing: In continuing to address this objective, the City of Euclid funds several programs directed specifically toward single-family houses. The programs are designed to aid income-qualifying households to live in a house that complies with the City's Housing Code, energy-efficient, safe, and accessible. There have been noticeable shifts in the City of Euclid's administration and implementation of housing rehabilitation programs through the Euclid Development Corporation (EDCOR) and the City of Euclid's Health, Safety, and Well-being (HSW) program. In 2025, EDCOR completed 18 low-interest home improvement loans. Additionally, EDCOR assisted 22 first-time homebuyers with HOME-funded Down Payment Assistance. Also, the HSW program assisted 33 total low- and moderate- income homeowners with improvements. These services include:

- **Exterior Paint Program**, mitigating deteriorated, faded, peeling, and presumed lead-based paint;
- **Furnace Safety Program**, providing one-time safety inspections, which may lead to substantial repairs or replacement, and hot water tank replacement on an emergency basis;
- **Deteriorated Siding Program**, installing vinyl siding on homes with severely deteriorated wood siding;
- **Roof Replacement Program**, re-roofing severely deteriorated roofs that were violated by the City of Euclid Department of Building and Housing

In FY 2025, the City of Euclid designed a new matching grant program for income-qualifying homeowners. The program will be fully implemented in FY 2026.

Objective 2: Increase Economic Opportunities: This objective provides the City with a mechanism to revitalize its commercial and industrial areas by providing incentives to the private sector to encourage commercial rehabilitation and reinvestment. In 2025, one (1) Storefront Renovation Program project was complete. Into 2026, three (3) Storefront Renovation projects are underway, with expected completion in later 2026. The City of Euclid demolished one (1) vacant and blighted office building opening the property for potential future development.

Objective 3: Municipal Beautification Projects: This objective allows the City of Euclid to upgrade public facilities by way of the Municipal Beautification Program. In 2025, three (3) major projects were completed. The City of Euclid upgraded 15 crosswalk ramps for compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), and improved the sidewalks on two (2) residential streets. The City of Euclid partnered with the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority to assist with the construction of three (3) new bus stop shelters. The City replaced wayfinding signage at seven (7) of its small neighborhood parks. Finally, the City also made improvements to one (1) playground at a neighborhood park.

Objective 4: Provide Needed Public Services: Senior Citizens compose about 20% of the City’s population. This aging sector of the population requires far more than programs geared to the physical rehabilitation and maintenance of their residences. Euclid has developed a Senior Service Program that addresses nutritional, social, and emotional needs. Services include transportation, activities, health screenings, counseling, and nutrition (meals). In 2025, a total of 40,561 (congregate, pick-up, or delivered meals) served 431 seniors. Furthermore, the Cleveland-based Fair Housing Center for Rights and Research conducted nine (9) Rental Audits, investigated 11 Fair Housing Complaints, and provided training for Landlords and Residents on Fair Housing Rights.

Assess how the jurisdiction’s use of funds, particularly CDBG, addresses the priorities and specific objectives identified in the plan, giving special attention to the highest priority activities identified.

In 2025, the City of Euclid expended a total of \$1,181,697.38 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds; and expended a total of \$88,335.53 in its remaining CDBG-CV funds.

In 2025, the City of Euclid continued to fund, support, and implement important municipal projects, housing programs, and economic development initiatives. Price increases in labor and building materials continue to be a challenge, which prompted Euclid to design a new housing rehabilitation program. Euclid also expanded its Public Services to provide additional reach, as per the goals the FY 2025-2029 Consolidated Plan. This was Euclid’s first year under the current Consolidated Plan.

Programs that fulfill the Improve, Maintain, and Expand Affordable Housing objective incurred expenses of \$487,144.75 in combined CDBG Revolving Loan Funds and HOME Investment Partnership funds. EDCOR's Low-Interest Home Improvement Loan Program loaned a total of \$267,144.75 to 18 income-qualifying homeowners. Additionally, EDCOR expended \$220,000.00, completing 22 Down Payment Assistance Loans in 2025, funded through the HOME funds by way of the Cuyahoga HOME Consortium. The Health, Safety, and Well-Being (HSW) Program expended \$134,963.20, home improvement projects for 33 income-qualifying homeowners.

Programs that fulfill the Increase Economic Opportunities objective incurred expenses of \$50,000.00 in 2025. The Storefront Renovation Program completed one (1) project. The City of Euclid expended \$100,660.00 to demolish one (1) blighted office building for site clearance.

In 2025, the Municipal Beautification Program incurred expenses of \$66,000, completing a park signage replacement project. Additionally, the City completed one significant Neighborhood Facilities Improvements project, expending a total of \$284,013.81. The City made improvements to existing pedestrian ramps and new sidewalk blocks, and assisted with the construction of three (3) new bus shelters in partnership with the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority. The goal was to improve the slope of the ramps with warning pads, and to provide safe access to public transit. The City of Euclid is committed to improving Parks and Playgrounds at neighborhood parks in low- to moderate- income areas. In 2025, the City of Euclid expended \$56,749.78, to make safety improvements to an existing playground, and the replacement of a pedestrian pathway.

In 2025, Public Services incurred expenses of \$175,843.95 in 2025. Euclid’s Public Services activities expanded beyond the City’s traditional

funding of its Senior Programs. Senior Programs serviced 239 unduplicated clients. Special attention was placed on assisting seniors who are food insecure and lacked transportation by providing and delivering meals. Additional services have been provided such as senior adult day services. Fair Housing activities experienced changes in 2025, marked by a significant increase in rental audits over arms-length sales audits. However, Fair Housing continued to implement community outreach, and training. The City partnered with two additional organizations in FY 2025, including the HELP Foundation to provide support toward providing services to 14 adults with developmental disabilities; and Breadwinners Academy to provided financial literacy to 38 qualifying students enrolled at Euclid High School.

In 2025, the City of Euclid continued implementing a new program utilizing its remaining CDBG-CV funding that begun in FY 2024 - the Emergency Lock Box Program for income-qualifying and vulnerable senior citizens and individuals with disabilities. Additionally, CDBG-CV funding is still being utilized for improvements to neighborhood parks to encourage physical outdoor activity.

Narrative

The families assisted in 2025 were indicative of the community as a whole. Outcomes categorized by race may be skewed by characteristics of senior subgroups and populations served.

Participation held steady in Euclid’s senior programs in 2025. However, activities to affirmatively further fair housing changed in 2025 as there was an increase in Rental Audits and Housing Complaints from mostly rental properties. The largest challenge necessitating the increase in rental audits was a settlement in 2024 with the National Association of Realtors, which impacted Euclid's partner, the Cleveland-based Fair Housing Center for Rights and Research's ability to conduct housing sales audits.

Deliverables within the the Health, Safety, and Well-being (HSW) program decreased in FY 2025 compared to FY 2024, providing housing rehab assistance to 33 homes compared to 42 in FY 2024. Despite the reduction, Euclid was able to continue assisting additional low- to moderate- income homeowners address issues that threaten the quality of their housing, thus making a meaningful impact. However, EDCOR experienced an unprecedented increase in the number of Low-Interest Home Improvement Loans, leading to a completion of 18 home improvement projects compared to 16 in FY 2024.

The City of Euclid does not discriminate on the basis of race, ethnicity, religious beliefs, disability, age, sex, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, national origin, or military status. All programs, with the exception of the Municipal Beautification Program, Neighborhood Facilities Improvements, and Parks and Playgrounds, are operated on a first come/first serve basis. The Municipal Beautification Program, Neighborhood Facilities Improvements, and Parks and Playgrounds generally target traditionally

underserved low- to moderate- income areas. In some cases, improvement projects under these three programs leverage private and/or non-federal investment.

Narrative

In 2025, the City of Euclid expended \$1,270,032.91 in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funded activities, which included unspent CDBG Program Funds remaining in the Line of Credit going back to FY 2020. There were several projects where funds were to be expended, but due to planning and engineering work, caused significant delays in the implementation of these projects.

Narrative

The City of Euclid experienced delays in projects which had portions of their funding supported with CDBG. This was due to engineering, delays with other funding sources, and scaling back of original projects. However, these projects are expected to be implemented in the summer of 2026 and early 2027.

In 2025, the City of Euclid committed \$101,329.07 of its remaining balance in CDBG-CV funds for improvements to two neighborhood parks, each meeting the appropriate tiebacks of CDBG-CV, providing safe outdoor activities for park visitors. The projects began in FY 2025 and are expected to be complete in FY 2026.

Leveraging

Most program beneficiaries qualify for assistance due to the limited clientele / presumed benefit population of Senior Citizens under the "Provide Needed Public Services" objective. For 2025, these beneficiaries were evenly distributed throughout the City. The next largest form of the beneficiary are populations in low- and moderate- income areas or improvement target areas under the "Increase Economic Opportunities" and "Municipal Beautification Projects" objectives.

Discuss the difference between goals and outcomes and problems encountered in meeting these goals.

The City of Euclid's CDBG-funded affordable housing programs are targeted toward owner-occupied housing units. Most of the City's apartments and rental units are at or below HUD's fair market rent levels, and accept Housing Choice Voucher Programs, or Section 8 certificates.

The City of Euclid's Health, Safety, and Well-Being (HSW) Program continued to implement housing programs that were popular among qualifying homeowners since 2022. These programs are: One-time

furnace safety program; a vinyl siding program targeting houses with deteriorated wood siding; an exterior paint program to arrest deteriorated exterior paint and to mitigate the presence of presumed lead paint; a roof replacement program targeting houses that were violated by the City of Euclid's Department of Building and Housing; and a wheelchair ramp program for homeowners with physical disabilities and other mobility challenges.

In order to help renters become homeowners, the City of Euclid sponsors first-time homebuyer seminars, first-time homebuyer down payment assistance, and promotes programs on Fair Housing compliance and education to aid in the process of Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing Choice. These programs are carried out through the Euclid Development Corporation (EDCOR), and through Euclid's various regional partners, including the Cleveland-based Fair Housing Center for Rights and Research, and CHN Housing Partners.

At the end of 2023 and through the first half of 2024, the City of Euclid partnered with the Cleveland-based Western Reserve Land Conservancy to conduct a citywide Property Survey. Community Development staff, as well as staff from the City's Department of Building and Housing, surveyed every commercial and residential parcel throughout the City, taking note of conditions, violations, and signs of deterioration. The City of Euclid is actively utilizing the data and results from this Property Survey to affirmatively market housing rehabilitation and home improvement programs

At the end of FY 2025, the City of Euclid finished designing a new matching grant program for income-qualifying homeowners, allowing homeowners matching funds from the City to homeowners' private funds, to make necessary structural, health, and safety improvements to their homes. Accomplishments under this program are expected in FY 2026.

Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.

Euclid is rigorously evaluating common housing violations and conditions of its existing housing stock. Depending on common housing violations identified through the City's Department of Building and Housing, Community Development staff, Euclid Municipal Court, and community feedback, the City will develop new programs to meet the needs of low- to moderate- income homeowners.

Furthermore, Euclid continues to evaluate the possibility of expending CDBG-supported housing programs to include rental properties, as Euclid's housing stock is greater than 50% renter-occupied. However, at the moment, Euclid is still focused on assisting low- to moderate-income homeowners. A new matching grant program which was designed in FY 2025 will be fully implemented in FY 2026.

The final results of the 2024 Citywide Property Survey completed in partnership with the Western Reserve Land Conservancy, will assist the City of Euclid in implementing new home improvement programs for qualifying low- to moderate-income homeowners. This will be emphasized in the next Consolidated Plan.

Narrative Information

The Number of Households Served are a combination of the 33 households assisted through the City of Euclid's HSW Program, and 22 households assisted through the Low-Interest Home Improvement Loan program through EDCOR. Of the homeowners assisted through EDCOR, four (4) of them were with loans originated at the end of FY 2024, and 18 were with loans originated in FY 2025.

The City of Euclid, as a member of the Cuyahoga Housing Consortium, is under a three-year renewable Consortium Agreement. The City, along with the other member municipalities, submits a Consolidated Plan that deals with affordable housing needs under the HOME Investment Partnership and the Continuum of Care (CoC) under various countywide programs. For all five participating jurisdictions of the Cuyahoga Housing Consortium, the number of households served through the HOME program are aggregated and reported to HUD in the CAPER prepared by the Cuyahoga County Department of Development, which is the lead entity for the Consortium.

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The City of Euclid is in its sixth 5-year contractual commitment with the Cuyahoga Housing Consortium which provides services and funding through the HOME Investment Partnership. The City of Euclid renewed its contractual commitment in 2023 for an additional five years ending in 2028. Euclid participates in the planning, funding, and evaluation of agencies throughout Cuyahoga County. The County Continuum of Care (CoC) addresses the needs of the area's homeless population. The City of Euclid is involved by way of the Cuyahoga Housing Consortium. According to the 2010 and 2020 decennial censuses, Euclid did not have any homeless persons, but through the Continuum of Care, has resources available.

In FY 2023, the Cuyahoga HOME Consortium provided \$839,744.00 in HOME-ARP funds to the City of Euclid to implement a Tenant-Based Rent Assistance program for specific populations that would be on the verge of homelessness. The City has partnered with Cleveland-based Community Housing Solutions to implement this program in December 2024 with its agreement ending in June 2026. Community Housing Solutions has assisted 35 tenants who meet the Qualifying Populations (QPs) of HOME-ARP. However, there have been compliance challenges and technical assistance which has hindered the City's and our partner's ability to implement the program fully.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City of Euclid can provide linkage to the emergency shelter system through the countywide Continuum of Care. Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) funds, also available through the County, help homeless families with children and chronically mentally ill persons meet needs by providing shelter space, making repairs to shelter facilities, and offering supportive services at existing facilities. While in shelter, homeless persons have access to case management at the facility. The assistance ranges from multiple services including finding employment, mental health care, or helping families locate schools and childcare.

Additionally, with an allocation of HOME-ARP funds through the Cuyahoga County HOME Consortium, the City of Euclid partnered with Community Housing Solutions, based in Cleveland, to provide Tenant-Based Rent Assistance to vulnerable populations facing homelessness, allowing Euclid tenants to stay in their homes, or to enter into new leases during instances of financial hardship or domestic violence. The City partnered with Community Housing Solutions at the end of FY 2024 with the agreement ending in June 2026. Although 35 Euclid tenants have been assisted in this program, compliance and technical challenges have arisen during the course of the program's implementation.

Once families are in shelter, transitional housing units are available to provide additional assistance and an opportunity for more case management. Educational opportunities may be offered, including GED classes, job readiness assessment and job training. Transitional housing programs are to promote self-sufficiency among clients and help them gain stability once out of the shelter. Cuyahoga County receives funding to participate in transitional housing demonstration projects involving the operation of a transitional housing facility.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

The resources used are tactics to keep individuals and families from becoming homeless. The goal is to step in and provide linkage to assistance before shelter is needed. Through the Cuyahoga Housing Consortium, members receive funding through the Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Act for funding projects anywhere within Cuyahoga County and can be used to assist Euclid residents.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

Permanent Housing is the last component of the Continuum of Care. Permanent housing is available for some homeless persons including those affected by a disability. Shelter Plus Care Grants are awarded by Cuyahoga County and the Shelter Plus Care Advisory Board to meet the needs of this population. Cuyahoga County has received many Shelter Plus Care grants from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The grants are accessible to homeless persons with a disability in the form of a rental subsidy. This subsidy is available to persons with mental health disabilities, chemical addiction and/or HIV/AIDS. The City of Euclid Supports the Cleveland/Cuyahoga County Office of Homeless Services and their implementation of aiding and will continue to work with them unless the City's position needs reviewed.

CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

To keep the demand on public housing to a minimum, low- to moderate- income houses must remain affordable. Through multiple programs, the City of Euclid has created programs based around housing affordability and keeping residents in their homes.

Euclid Senior programs provides daily congregate and home-delivered meals , transportation, and adult day services to all seniors living in Euclid regardless of whether they rent or own their home. Seniors living in subsidized housing can be assisted with all public services offered by the program.

The HELP Foundation provides job-readiness programming for individuals with disabilities services in Euclid regardless of whether they rent or own their home. This provides individuals with unique challenges to pursue careers with economic mobility that can lead to affording adequate housing.

Breadwinners Academy provides Euclid's high school students with financial literacy, ensuring that students learn about money management and budgeting, and financial self-sufficiency that are essential to homeownership and household management.

The Storefront Renovation Program can repair and revitalize commercial buildings that have a direct economic impact on the surrounding neighborhoods. Businesses that provide services to low- to moderate- income households, especially businesses located in low- to moderate- income census tracts and block groups, are given priority in the program.

Site Clearance can provide opportunity for future development, including new and affordable housing. This activity is done occasionally by the City of Euclid, where a vacant and blighted structure is identified, the building is cleared, and prepared for future development opportunities.

The Municipal Beautification Program and Neighborhood Facilities Program provide improvements to public facilities and public land which benefit all residents in Euclid. Like the Storefront program, priority is given to low- to moderate- income census tracts and block groups that have a greater number of subsidized housing units.

The Parks and Playgrounds Program provides improvements to public neighborhood parks, which benefit all residents in Euclid. Improvements include adding and enhancing park amenities; replacement of old and/or deteriorated park amenities like playgrounds, benches, basketball courts, and pavilions. Priority is given to low- to moderate- income census tract and block group areas that have a greater number of subsidized housing units. By doing this, renewing Euclid's neighborhood parks increases the overall quality of life for residents and visitors, and provides new and safe facilities for children to play and visitors to utilize.

The Health, Safety and Wellbeing (HSW) program is only offered to owner-occupied housing units in the

City of Euclid. However, exceptions may be made in extraordinary cases, such as for accessibility improvements. The program can benefit public housing by keeping housing costs affordable and lowering demands on public housing due to seniors aging in place, and assisting low- to moderate-income homeowners with critical home improvements that are difficult for homeowners with limited means to afford.

Euclid Development Corporation (EDCOR) provides services like the HSW program in that it is offered only to owner-occupied households within the City. Additionally, this program can also benefit public housing by keeping housing affordable and lowering demands on public housing due to seniors aging in place. Further, providing affordable lending options for first-time homebuyers using HOME funds, and allowing homeowners to make needed physical improvements where the HSW program may be limited in scope.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

All CDBG-funded programs are reviewed and evaluated through the City of Euclid's Community Development Citizens Advisory Committee annually, which comprises of residents who represent a diverse cross-section of interests, age groups, races, and socioeconomic statuses. Residents of the City of Euclid are invited and encouraged to submit proposals, attend public meetings, and comment on proposed initiatives, programs, and projects.

Euclid's Seniors Programs allows residents to age in place by providing resources through the Euclid Senior Center and its various activities. This helps maintain long term homeownership, community residency, and reduces residential vacancies in Euclid neighborhoods.

The Storefront Renovation Program gives priority to areas that may be underserved, which strengthens communities and neighborhood engagement among residents. It further helps attract more businesses to underserved neighborhoods, and assists existing businesses with retention and/or expansion.

The Municipal Beautification Program and Neighborhood Facilities Improvements Program are made possible from ideas generated by resident or neighborhood organizations and serves a large population in the community, which include enhancements to the neighborhoods thus making them more desirable, safe, and improves neighborhood quality of life. The City of Euclid's Department of Planning and Development, and the City of Euclid Department of Public Service, both work together to evaluate needed infrastructure improvements to neighborhoods.

The Parks and Playgrounds Program often stem from ideas generated by residential or neighborhood organizations and serves a large population in the community, to ensure that neighborhood public parks provide updated and safe facilities for children to play and for residents to visit. The City of Euclid's Department of Planning and Development, the City of Euclid Department of Public Service, and the City of Euclid Department of Parks and Recreation, work together to evaluate needed improvements to

neighborhood parks and playgrounds.

Health, Safety and Wellbeing (HSW) Program directly benefits low- to moderate- income homeowners. The improvements done to their home keep housing affordable and reduces vacancies. The City of Euclid's Department of Planning and Development works regularly with the City's Department of Building and Housing to determine the needs of residents, and solicits feedback from homeowners about needed improvements to houses. The City of Euclid utilizes various housing studies and surveys, including one which the City partnered with the Western Reserve Land Conservancy in 2023 and 2024 to evaluate the physical conditions of residential properties.

Similarly, the Euclid Development Corporation (EDCOR) 3% Low-Interest Home Improvement Loan Program; and First-Time Homebuyer Down Payment Assistance Program, supported with HOME funds, offer income-eligible residents opportunities to secure homeownership and make modifications and updates to their homes once they have lived there for one (1) year or more. This program also helps in the reduction and prevention of housing vacancies and increases affordability in neighborhoods.

Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs

The City of Euclid is currently not aware of any troubled Public Housing Authorities.

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

The City of Euclid does not currently have barriers in terms of public policies dealing with rent controls, impact fees or growth controls. Throughout 2025, the City of Euclid continued to maintain affordable housing through EDCOR's Low Interest Home Improvement Loan Program allowing residents to make updates to their homes. The Health, Safety and Wellbeing (HSW) Program helps homeowners rehabilitate their homes which benefits the neighborhood by not only the curb appeal of the house, but the affordability and reduction of vacancies, as well as providing income-eligible homeowners with much-needed safety improvements and cost savings. In 2025, the HSW program worked to diversify its programming to provide a flexible grant to allow homeowners to afford critical home improvement projects that directly impact health, safety, structural integrity, and energy efficiency of dwelling units.

In 2025, the City of Euclid experienced a continued, but slowing increase in home sales prices, making homes unaffordable. As the prices of homes increase, the City of Euclid will continue looking to peer cities within the Cuyahoga HOME Consortium for best practices, for servicing income-qualified first-time homebuyers with assisting the purchase of homes. Despite the continued increase of housing prices, EDCOR successfully provided Down Payment Assistance to 22 qualifying homeowners.

The City of Euclid has also been utilizing housing studies and surveys. The Euclid Citywide Property Survey conducted in partnership with the Western Reserve Land Conservancy has clearly evaluated all properties, including residential properties, on their physical conditions. This has been helping the City of Euclid determine target and strategy areas for housing rehabilitation programming, and to assist homeowners where the home improvements are needed to improve safety and affordability.

The City of Euclid also works with the Cleveland-based Fair Housing Center for Rights and Research on fair lending, fair leases, foreclosure issues, and non-discrimination. The program is consistent with the charge to Affirmatively Further Fair Housing Choice. In 2025, the City of Euclid continued to work with the Fair Housing Center for Rights and Research to enhance its work in Euclid to Affirmatively Further Fair Housing Choice, beyond their usual audits of homeowners and tenants, and outreach efforts. Further, the Fair Housing Center distributed literature throughout the City detailing tenant's rights, hosted seminars for both landlords and tenants, and created ad campaigns and public service announcements for the City of Euclid to publish via its website and media sources. However, in FY 2025, there has been a heavier emphasis on rental audits than arms-length sales audits due mostly to a settlement reached with the National Association of Realtors.

The City of Euclid adopted updated zoning regulations in 2024, which eliminated the single-family exclusionary zoning that previously existed in the City. At minimum, two-family dwellings are permitted

in all residential districts, but in many areas three-family and townhouse development is now also permitted or conditionally permitted, respectively.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Euclid also applies for various grants, including through the Older Americans Act for Senior Programs. Furthermore, Euclid applies for grants to diversify the community development funding portfolio for widespread neighborhood improvements.

In 2025, Euclid utilized an Urban and Community Forestry Grant through the U.S. Department of Agriculture which was awarded in 2024, via Inflation Reduction Act funds, to assist in rebuilding the City of Euclid's Division of Urban Forestry. This is allowing the City of Euclid to focus on strategic tree planting and tree care citywide, including in low- to moderate-income neighborhoods. There was a small disruption in the City's urban forestry efforts, but the grant was reinstated, allowing Euclid to fully bring these important efforts into fruition.

In 2025, the Euclid Development Corporation (EDCOR) was awarded a portion of Euclid's remaining American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, allowing EDCOR to diversify its portfolio of home improvement programs and to reach more residents through grants to homeowners of up to \$7,500.00 for home improvements. Many of the homeowners assisted in EDCOR's grant program were also assisted with CDBG-supported programs through the Health, Safety, and Wellbeing (HSW) Program for items that the EDCOR grant did not cover. This was an expansion of a home improvement grant program that was implemented in 2024 using local Community Development Supplemental Grant (CDSG) funding awarded through the Cuyahoga County Department of Housing and Community Development.

In 2025, Euclid was awarded a Community Development Supplemental Grant (CDSG) through the Cuyahoga County Department of Housing and Community Development, which allowed the City of Euclid to leverage funds toward improvements and upgrades for an expanded bicycle and pedestrian trail, which is also being supported with CDBG funds. This project is expected to be completed in Spring or Summer 2026.

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Euclid has taken numerous steps toward the elimination of lead-based paint hazards by implementing procedures, including educating recipient homeowners to the dangers of lead-based paint hazards and its prevention through onsite distribution of federally approved pamphlets and brochures.

The City of Euclid's Community Development Division of the Department of Planning and Development works in partnership with the Euclid Development Corporation (EDCOR) to ensure that homes are free of peeling paint, and that such paint issues are addressed before the sale of a home to a Down Payment Assistance Program participant purchasing a home in Euclid.

The Residential Exterior Paint Program through the Health, Safety, and Wellbeing (HSW) Program seeks to address lead paint, by painting the exteriors of single-family homes sided with either wood or aluminum siding, thus preventing deteriorating housing conditions and mitigating lead paint risks for both the homeowner and the surrounding neighborhood. Each house is carefully inspected by Community Development staff to determine the extent of which painting is necessary. In the case of wood-sided homes, if the wood siding is deteriorated to the point that it can no longer hold paint, these homeowners are automatically referred to the vinyl siding program to mitigate the damage and to weatherize the home.

As the City of Euclid implements its new flexible grant program for income-qualifying homeowners, Euclid will ensure that all new contractors that either paint, or perform rehabilitation activities that will potentially disturb paint, are Renovation, Repair, and Painting (RRP) certified through the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Euclid has utilized RRP-certified paint contractors for its Exterior Paint Program. This will ensure that participants in the programs are educated about lead-based paint, and that their homes are safe and livable.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Euclid's Anti-Poverty Strategy utilizes social service organizations, Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds; HOME Investment Partnership funds, including HOME-ARP, to provide social services and safe, affordable dwelling units.

In addition to the programs, the City of Euclid has in place an Economic Development Program that helps to create jobs in the commercial sector (*which, traditionally, produces entry-level positions*) and the industrial sector.

In FY 2025, the City of Euclid partnered with Breadwinners Academy to provide financial literacy to high school students enrolled at Euclid High School, all of which are income-qualifying, or receive free or reduced-price lunch. The financial literacy will ensure students have an understanding of money and budget management, and self-sufficiency, which will alleviate poverty.

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The institutional structure through which the City of Euclid carries out its affordable and supportive housing strategy consists of public sector agencies, non-profit organizations, and the private sector.

The City of Euclid will continue to promote the leveraging HOME funds with the private sector for rental rehabilitation in conjunction with the Cuyahoga HOME Consortium.

The City will continue to complement the Euclid Development Corporation (EDCOR) that handles the City-sponsored CDBG Low Interest Home Improvement Loan Program, and by providing HOME funds for Down-Payment Assistance for income-qualifying first time homebuyers.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The Community Development Block Grant Program, as well as other federal and state funding sources, provides most of the resources. The uncertainty of the amount and timing of the aforementioned resources can and does cause obstacles and delays in addressing community needs.

Euclid City Council has recognized the importance of the various programs and has, when funding has been available, provided municipal general fund monies to supplement shortfalls. The availability of general fund monies, however, is dependent on the health of the local economy. City Council's priority is the funding of essential day-to-day city services, including police and fire protection, and solid waste disposal.

The City of Euclid applies for, and has received, several grants from the State of Ohio, Cuyahoga County, and other federal resources. Examples are the grants for Seniors from the Older Americans Act, and an Urban and Community Forestry Grant through the Inflation Reduction Act by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Additional grants include the Community Development Supplemental Grant (CDSG) through the Cuyahoga County Department of Housing and Community Development, the Cuyahoga County Planning Commission, and the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR).

The City of Euclid will continue to strengthen coordination with social service agencies and work for intergovernmental cooperation.

The City of Euclid is part of the Cuyahoga HOME Consortium that includes the entitlement communities of Cleveland Heights, Lakewood, Parma, and the Urban County of Cuyahoga. The Consortium was established to pursue HOME Investment Partnership funds. The Consortium, however, has addressed other projects unrelated to HOME such as lead-based paint, and an Impediment Study on Fair Housing whereby the Consortium members along with other local and county governments in Northeast Ohio participated in a regional analysis of impediments to fair housing choice spearheaded by the Northeast Ohio Sustainable Communities Consortium. This analysis is a road map for affirmatively further Fair Housing in Northeast Ohio as a region. Additionally, the City of Euclid, the City of Cleveland and Cuyahoga County each contracted with the Housing Research and Advocacy Center in order to amend the Regional AI to more specifically address impediments in our respective jurisdictions.

The City of Euclid's Analysis of Impediments (AI) was completed in 2025. The City will take steps to address the concerns outlined in the Analysis of Impediments study.

The Consortium also undertakes intergovernmental cooperation by utilizing the staff of the Cuyahoga County Planning Commission to research housing needs and issues, as well as develop various reports. In addition to the City of Euclid partnering with the Western Reserve Land Conservancy to conduct a citywide property survey, the City of Cleveland Heights also partnered with them to conduct the very same property survey.

Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

The City of Euclid takes an active role in Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing Choice, as defined by HUD. The following are ongoing activities:

- Real estate practices testing and complaint investigation as an enforcement tool.
- Continued neighborhood organizing with emphasis on Fair Housing and cultural diversity.
- Ongoing work relationships with area Fair Housing agencies, regional economic development commissions, public policy organizations, and participation on regional boards pertaining to these stated issues.
- Working in partnership with local banks, credit unions, and savings and loans, to provide low-cost funding for the economically disadvantaged, and to monitor Community Reinvestment Area (CRA) compliance.
- Explore continued infill home projects and economically diversified new housing projects utilizing HOME dollars to assure affordability and accessibility.
- Rental audits and/or rental complaint investigations and testing.
- Provision of brochures and other printed materials to residents regarding the process and procedures for filing a complaint in regard to fair housing law violations.
- Analysis of 2011-2013 HMDA data in order to evaluate fair lending practices in the City of Euclid.
- Working in cooperation with Organize! Ohio, Fair Housing Center for Rights and Research, Cuyahoga HOME Consortium, and the Cuyahoga First Suburbs Consortium to hold banks accountable for failure to fulfill their obligations to the CRA.

CR-40 - Monitoring 91.220 and 91.230

Describe the standards and procedures used to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and used to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements

The City of Euclid monitors its annual performance in the same manner that its individual Community Development Block Grant programs are monitored. All Community Development Block Grant-funded housing rehabilitation programs are reviewed regularly for overall program progress and performance.

The City's Low-Interest Home Improvement Loan Program, which is carried out by a subrecipient, monthly progress reports are provided to City of Euclid Community Development personnel. Additionally, a contracted Certified Public Accountant (CPA) through EDCOR performs cost analyses, prepares specifications, and inspects work as it is performed to ensure the required rehabilitation work is done in a cost-efficient and professional manner.

All nonprofit partners are monitored by the City of Euclid, to ensure that CDBG-supported programs are carried out consistent with HUD and local policies. With the HELP Foundation and Breadwinners Academy being new partners to deliver Public Services to Euclid youth and residents with disabilities, increased monitoring was performed to ensure compliance with local, state, and federal regulations governing financial and grant management. Technical Assistance is provided regularly by the City of Euclid's Community Development staff to ensure both compliance with CDBG regulations, and to ensure sound performance and delivery standards to benefit clients.

Euclid's Community Development staff performs risk assessments of Public Service applicants each year when the Public Service proposals are requested. Euclid reviews for financial management, past performance, technical assistance required, timely payments and reimbursements, deliverables, and financial health based on financial statements required of applicants. Scores are assigned based on risk level to determine who receives funding.

For Non-Housing Community Development activities, specifically Municipal Beautification, Neighborhood Facilities Improvements, and Parks and Playgrounds, Euclid monitors all projects to ensure compliant and timely expenditure and completion of projects, provides technical assistance to divisions within Euclid's Department of Planning and Development who oversee and manage these Non-Housing Community Development projects. The goal is to ensure timely completion of projects and to deliver services to residents.

The City's Health, Safety, and Wellbeing (HSW) programs are reviewed weekly for program progress, and quarterly reports are prepared by the Special Projects Supervisor that detail the work performed and beneficiaries served. All subrecipients are audited annually as part of the single audit process. This audit reviews compliance with Circular A-133.

The Plan is also reviewed as part of the City's annual Community Development Block Grant Citizens' Participation Process, as detailed in Euclid's Citizens' Participation Plan. Citizens will be provided the opportunity to comment on the City's Plan performance in conjunction with the City's annual Community Development Block Grant performance. There has been sustained increase in residents participating in the Citizen Participation Process through community meetings and CDBG Citizens Advisory Committee meetings, all of which are open to the public

Citizen Participation Plan 91.105(d); 91.115(d)

Describe the efforts to provide citizens with reasonable notice and an opportunity to comment on performance reports.

The City of Euclid's FY 2025 Annual Action Plan, and its Five-Year 2025-2029 Consolidated Plan was formulated in conjunction with the City of Euclid's CDBG Citizens Advisory Committee. Most of the City of Euclid's annual programs are ongoing programs that have been developed to meet the needs of its residents as expressed throughout the five decades of Citizen Participation. Enhancements have been made, such as expanding Public Service programming, diversifying housing rehabilitation assistance options, and new public facilities projects with critical updates. The Mayor has traditionally appointed Euclid residents representing a cross-section of residents of the Euclid community to the CDBG Citizens Advisory Committee. In addition, a member Euclid City Council is a representative member and City Council Liaison.

The Citizen Advisory Committee, along with the City's Community Development personnel, act as the lead entity during the annual Citizen Participation Process. The process begins with a series of Committee meetings, which are open to the public, to inform the Committee of the potential funding amount each program year, review expenditures, program performance and accomplishments, and the balances of current and prior year grants if there are unspent funds. The Citizens Advisory Committee also provides support and feedback on ideas of how CDBG funding should be expended.

Prior to this, the City staff has already solicited proposals from the various subrecipients and organizations which have been previously funded or have expressed an interest in funding. The next step in the process is to hold a series of public hearings where City staff and all subrecipients and/or organizations review their actual expenditures and accomplishments. Those organizations, as well as City departments wishing to receive continued funding are required to make presentations providing scopes of services, goals, and potential budgets for the new program year. Also at these meetings, any person, organization, or department seeking funding for the new program year is offered the opportunity to present and submit proposals. Various groups represented are the Euclid Development

Corporation (EDCOR), nonprofit organizations such as the HELP Foundation and the Fair Housing Center for Rights and Research, City departments, and qualifying neighborhood organizations.

After the meetings, the Committee meets with Community Development staff to discuss and prioritize the proposals received, which results in a tentative budget for the upcoming program year. From these meetings, the proposed project budget is formulated which informs the forthcoming Annual Action Plan. A final public hearing is scheduled to review and solicit further comment and citizen views. The Public Hearing is advertised in the local paper along with the proposed budget, on the City's local government television station, City's website, and copies are made available to the public at Euclid City Hall.

A draft Consolidated or Annual Action Plan document is usually and released for the 30-day public comment period once the actual CDBG allocation is received. A notice of availability was published in a newspaper of general circulation and made available for public review at Euclid City Hall. Euclid City Council was also provided with the draft document for their review in preparation for presentation at a regularly scheduled Euclid City Council meeting. After the 30-day public comment period, a final document is prepared and placed on Council's agenda for final comment and legislative approval, with received public comments reviewed and considered. Following the public comment period, Euclid City Council unanimously accepted and approved the recommendations of the Citizen Advisory Committee.

In 2025, the Committee membership body held steady with 11 members.

Community Development key staff has remained steady since 2021 to this day. Although the City's programs have remained strong and performed well, significant improvements have been made between 2022 and to this day and ongoing. Improvements and proactive measures includes the review of Euclid's existing CDBG policies and procedures, and making the necessary changes to ensure that Euclid is meeting HUD National Objectives, remaining consistent with the City's Consolidated Plan and associated Annual Action Plans, ensuring compliance with HUD regulations, and providing the necessary services that benefit Euclid's low- and moderate- income residents, households, businesses, and addresses slum and blight.

The City of Euclid is currently working with other Planning and Development Department staff, staff from other City departments, Mayor's Office, and Citizens Advisory Committee, to review programs that are performing well, new programs and initiatives, and making changes to programs that are not performing as desired. By doing this, the City makes program adjustments that are reflected in forthcoming annual action plans and consolidated plans.

In the first year of its FY 2025-2029 Five-Year Consolidated Plan, there was a strong emphasis on diversifying its Public Service programming to include services to individuals with developmental disabilities, and youth programs to provide recreational and education opportunities to youth from low- to moderate-income families. Traditionally, Euclid’s Public Service program has supported senior programs and fair housing services. Euclid is taking care to implement these new services while maintaining the limitations of Public Service programs.

In a continued effort effort to reach its timeliness standard annually, the City implements housing programs that promote affordable housing, including our one-time furnace program, vinyl siding program for substandard wood siding, a residential roofing program, a Parks and Playgrounds program, and projects that improve public neighborhood facilities. Additionally, Euclid is actively diversifying its programs to ensure maximum impact and timely expenditure of CDBG funds. In 2025, the City of Euclid continued implementing a sidewalk replacement program that prioritizes unsafe and hazardous sidewalks, crosswalk ramps that are not compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), and bus stop pads for new bus shelters in partnership with the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority. Implementing these programs have led to the City achieving timeliness with CDBG for four consecutive Program Years from FY 2022 through FY 2025.

A critically important goal going forward in to 2026 is to continue to review program objectives, and to review processes and procedures to ensure timeliness of expenditures, compliance with regulations, and maximum delivery to Euclid residents and businesses. The City will check its progress against the 2025-2029 Five-Year Consolidated Plan to evaluate goals achieved, and to make adjustments when necessary.
