

### Reflections



### My dear friends in Christ,

First, I want to express my heartfelt gratitude for your prayers for the people of the Philippines. As I shared last Sunday, our thoughts and prayers have been with them during this incredibly difficult time. Though we are separated by thousands of miles, we have shown them our love and concern. As St. Paul reminds us: "If one member of the body suffers, all the members suffer with it" (1 Cor 12:26). We are one body in Christ, and so we share in their pain.

The Super Typhoon has passed, but the devastation it left behind is beyond words. Many buildings, homes, and highways were destroyed, and countless people have been displaced. In some places, the flooding was so severe that entire villages were submerged. Watching the news has been heartbreaking, but what has truly inspired me is the extraordinary faith of the Filipino people. Even in the midst of such disaster, they have found strength in their faith. When I told my brother we had been praying for them, he simply replied, "Thank you." Tragically, last week, the Philippines was hit by another typhoon, killing hundreds and leaving many still missing. Our hearts ache for them in their grief and loss.

This coming Sunday, we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King—the last Sunday before the season of Advent begins. In a world filled with violence, division, despair, and suffering, this feast offers us a critical moment to reflect on the true meaning of Christ's kingship. Pope Pius XI established this solemnity in 1925 through his encyclical Quas primas in response to the rise of secularism and nationalism in Europe. In those years, many people—Catholics included—began to doubt Christ's authority and the Church's power to continue His mission. The world was changing rapidly, and earthly rulers were rising up, asserting their control over not just nations, but over the very hearts of the people. Secular ideologies were gaining strength, and Catholic faith was under threat. Christ the King was instituted to remind the world that no matter how powerful earthly rulers or ideologies may seem, Christ remains the true King of all.

When we reflect on the world of 1925, we can see that, unfortunately, many of the struggles of that time—secularism, materialism, and the rise of dangerous nationalism—are still with us today. It is easy to become distracted by the noise of our time, by all the ideologies and forces that seek to pull us away from Christ's teachings. But the feast of Christ the King reminds us that we cannot return to that world—the world that was losing its way, that thought power and authority could come from anything other than love and truth.

This feast calls us to examine our own convictions. In Christ, we have a King who rules with compassion, mercy, and love. In the Gospel of Luke, we hear of a King who shows extraordinary mercy, saying to the repentant thief, "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in paradise." Our King does not rule through force, but through the power of love.

In a world still struggling with division and violence, we need a King who understands our deepest struggles, a King who speaks to our hearts and not just our minds. We long for a leader who seeks not to dominate, but to serve. As we prepare to celebrate Christ the King, we are invited to reflect on His heart and His Kingdom—not a kingdom of power and earthly glory, but a Kingdom of love, truth, and peace.

At the final judgment, Christ will come as King to separate those who have loved as He loved from those who have turned away from His message. The basis of this judgment will be love. "For I was hungry, did you give me food? I was thirsty, did you give me drink? I was a stranger, did you welcome me? I was naked, did you clothe me? I was in prison, did you visit me?"

Let us ask ourselves: Are we living as citizens of Christ's Kingdom? Are we answering the call to love? In a world filled with hatred, division, and fear, we are called to be witnesses of the Kingdom of Christ—a Kingdom where love conquers all.



### WHY DO WE DO THAT? - CATHOLIC LIFE EXPLAINED

One of the common objections evangelical Christians have to

Catholics is our practice of calling priests by the title Father.

They will often cite a passage in Matthew's Gospel in which

### Calling Priests Father

Question:

Why do Catholics call priests Father?

### **Answer:**

Jesus tells his followers: "Call no one on earth your father; you have but one Father in heaven" (23:19). It seems pretty straightforward, but when we put this verse in context, we see that Jesus is speaking out against religious leaders who had forgotten what their proper role was and who were bad examples through their own hypocrisy and elitist attitudes. In other Gospels, we find Jesus himself using the title father for different characters, such as in the Parable of Lazarus and the Rich Man (Luke 16:19-31]) and the Parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32). If we put the verse from Matthew into the full scope of Jesus' teachings, he isn't saying that we can't use words like "father," "rabbi," or "master." Rather, he is telling us that we should be mindful of the full meaning of those titles and not to misuse them. To call a priest "Father" is more than a sign of respect for the office of the priesthood. It goes all the way back to the way St. Paul understood his own work as a missionary and evangelizer. Paul wrote, "I am writing you in this way not to shame you but to admonish you as my beloved children ... It was I who begot you in Christ Jesus through my preaching of the Gospel. I beg you, then, be imitators of me. This is why I have sent you Timothy, my beloved

and faithful son in the Lord" (1 Corinthians 4:14-17). Yes, we

have God alone as our heavenly Father, but there are also those here with us who nurture and nourish our faith through their teaching and care. This is why the title of Father has been applied to the church's pastors in different ways since the earliest days of the Church, including monks and nuns using the title "abbot" and "abbess" (from abba) for their spiritual leaders and Christians around the world recognizing the "Holy Father" or "pope" (from papa) as the head of the family that is the Church. The title Father is a reminder that priests have a special responsibility to care for, protect, feed, listen to, and nourish those who have been entrusted to them, all after the example of our Father in heaven who never ceases to give us what we truly need.

### ¿POR QUÉ HACEMOS ESO? - VIDA CATÓLICA EX-PLICADA

# Llamando a los Sacerdotes Padre Pregunta:

¿Por qué los católicos llaman a los sacerdotes Padre?

Respuesta:

Una de las objeciones comunes que los cristianos evangélicos tienen hacia los católicos es nuestra práctica de llamar a los sacerdotes por el título de Padre. A menudo citan un pasaje del Evangelio de Mateo en el que Jesús dice a sus seguidores: "A nadie en la tierra llames padre tuyo; no tenéis más que un Padre en los cielos" (23:19). Parece bastante sencillo, pero cuando ponemos este versículo en contexto, vemos que Jesús está hablando en contra de los líderes religiosos que habían olvidado cuál era su papel apropiado y que eran malos ejemplos a través de su propia hipocresía y actitudes elitistas. En otros Evangelios, encontramos a Jesús mismo usando el título de padre para diferentes personajes, como en la parábola de Lázaro y el hombre rico (Lucas 16:19-31]) y la parábola del hijo pródigo (Lucas 15:11-32). Si ponemos el versículo de Mateo en el alcance completo de las enseñanzas de Jesús, él no está diciendo que no podemos usar palabras como "padre", "rabino" o "maestro". Más bien, nos está diciendo que debemos ser conscientes del significado completo de esos títulos y no hacer un mal uso de ellos. Llamar "Padre" a un sacerdote es más que un signo de respeto por el oficio del sacerdocio. Se remonta a la forma en que San Pablo entendió su propio trabajo como misionero y evangelizador. Pablo escribió: "Os escribo de esta manera, no para avergonzarlos, sino para amonestarlos como a mis hijos amados... Yo os engendré en Cristo Jesús mediante mi predicación del Evangelio. Os ruego, pues, que me imitéis. Por eso les he enviado a Timoteo, mi hijo amado y fiel en el Señor" (1 Corintios 4:14-17). Sí, solo tenemos a Dios como nuestro Padre celestial, pero también hay quienes están aquí con nosotros y nutren nuestra fe a través de sus enseñanzas y cuidados. Esta es la razón por la que el título de Padre se ha aplicado a los pastores de la iglesia de diferentes maneras desde los primeros días de la Iglesia, incluidos los monjes y monjas que usan el título de "abad" y "abadesa" (de abba) para sus líderes espirituales y los cristianos de todo el mundo que reconocen al "Santo Padre" o "papa" (de papa) como la cabeza de la familia que es la Iglesia. El título de Padre es un recordatorio de que los sacerdotes tienen una responsabilidad especial de cuidar, proteger, alimentar, escuchar y nutrir a aquellos que les han sido confiados, todo siguiendo el ejemplo de nuestro Padre celestial que nunca deja de darnos lo que realmente necesitamos.
