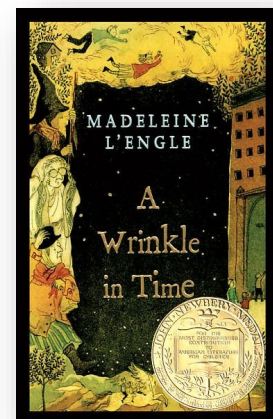
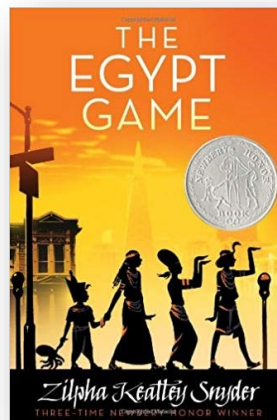
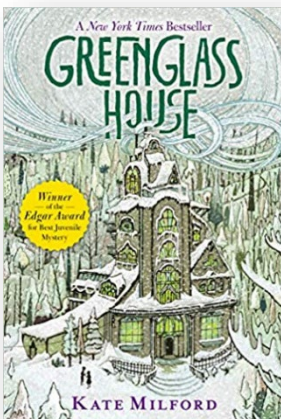
After you have finished your assigned book, you must write a brief essay of four (4) paragraphs in response to the following prompt:

The word “courage” is used to describe people who show that they are strong even when they are faced with things that are scary or difficult. Which three characters in the story show the most courage, and why? Which of those three characters changed the most from the beginning of the story to the end?

To write your essay, follow these steps:

- ✓ **Choose your three characters.**
- ✓ **Find at least one situation or event in the book that you think showed each character’s courage.**
- ✓ **Write one paragraph for each character. Begin each paragraph with a sentence that explains the character you are writing about. After the first sentence, write 4-5 sentences describing the situation or event from the book where the character showed his or her courage.**
- ✓ **In your final paragraph, pick one of your characters and explain how he/she changed from the beginning of the book to the end using details from the story.**

Your essay must be TYPED and printed out **before** the first day of school, **August 26th**. The essay will be collected during the period in which we meet for Literature Class on the first day of school.
