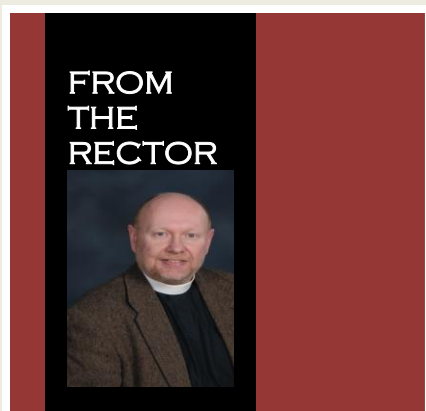

The month of February presents all of us in the Church with the coming of the Lenten season. This is our annual season where to are encouraged to ‘take stock’ of where we think we are in our walk with Christ, and to reinforce our spiritual strengths as well as admit and work on our spiritual weaknesses.

Our own Episcopal Book of Common Prayer calls us into this season far better than my own words could ever describe:



“Dear People of God: The first Christians observed with great devotion the days of our Lord’s passion and resurrection, and it became the custom of the Church to prepare for them by a season of penitence and fasting. This season of Lent provided a time in which converts to the faith were prepared for Holy Baptism. It was also a time when those who, because of notorious sins, had been separated from the body of the faithful were reconciled by penitence and forgiveness, and restored to the fellowship of the Church. Thereby, the whole congregation was put in mind of the message of pardon and absolution set forth in the Gospel of our Savior, and of the need which all Christians have to renew their repentance and faith.

I invite you therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a Holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God’s holy Word.” (Book of Common Prayer: Ash Wednesday Liturgy, pg. 264)

I underlined some of those words and phrases which always stand out for me this time of year. Repentance reminds us that we are to literally turn around and go in a different direction when we know that we have sinned. Repentance is admitting

that sin, and then taking steps to move away from that and closer to Jesus. Then we claim the forgiveness and restoration that is already ours by virtue of our baptisms and faith. Lent is then a time of holy observance, of getting serious about our spiritual lives. It's marked by prayer, fasting, and self-denial. And that 'fasting' can be something more than just food. We can decide to take a 'fast' from negativity, from social media, from over-indulgence, etc. And we then move closer to Christ by actively taking the Bible and reading devotional portions and meditating on what those passages mean to us and how they affect us in the here and now. May we all live in to this reality during Lent 2026, and below are some important dates as we take this journey together:

Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper.

***February 18th, 7pm:**

Ash Wednesday service of Holy Eucharist/Imposition of Ashes.

***February 26 -March 26 (Each Thursday at 6pm):**

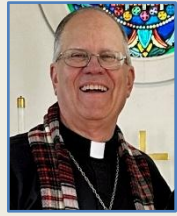

Lake Reflections

from Fr. Nick



As On February 24th, we'll celebrate the feast of Saint Matthias. If you don't remember him from The Chosen series, don't feel too bad. You might recall that after the defection and death of Judas Iscariot, "The Twelve" had a vacancy. In the nine days between Jesus' Ascension and the Day of Pentecost, two men were nominated i.e., Joseph Barsabbas a.k.a. "Justus" and Matthias. After prayer, the eleven disciples cast lots and the count favored Matthias.

If you find this election troubling, you're in good company. And what do we make of the calling of bishops by receiving ballots from the clergy and laity of a diocese? Since all of the other disciples had been chosen by Jesus, who did the disciples think they were to hold an election for Judas' successor? Had Simon Peter finally taken his leadership role to heart or was he uncertain that he'd ever have a chance to ask Jesus what His will was in the matter?

Being observant Jews, there's a good possibility that they were just using a time-honored technique to solve a problem: *"The lot is cast into the lap, but its every decision is from the LORD"* (Proverbs 16:33). In some Jewish circles, it was believed that God put "the divine finger on the scales" and could control dice, lots, and other games of chance. In other circles, that explanation seemed to emphasize God's authority at the expense of human autonomy.

What might have been going on among the disciples as they prepared to cast lots? As scripture recalls, the disciples were looking at two candidates who had “accompanied [them] during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us,” from the Baptism of John through Jesus’ Ascension. Peter put it succinctly: *“One of these men must become with us a witness to His resurrection.”* (Acts 1:21-22).

Both men filled the ministry description. Both men were qualified to join the Eleven. But no disciple was ready to proclaim by fiat that Justus or Matthias would be the Twelfth. All must have agreed that they would never question the outcome through “Monday-morning quarterbacking.”

In fact, after the Day of Pentecost, the disciples never again turned to chance or divination to discern God’s will. As Dr. Leighton Flowers writes, “The wise make decisions, not based on the fatalistic assumptions of philosophy, but based on prayer, fasting, seeking Godly counsel, and waiting on the peace that passes all understanding, which can only come by the guidance of the Holy Spirit within.” So, if this still-new year or the season of Lent provides you with choices of consequence, know that the season and our church community also provide the resources for actively discerning the will of God.

Music Notes



Lent is just around the corner - 40 days set aside for reflection, quiet, and reconnecting with God. Lenten hymns set a tone that is vastly different from the joyous songs of Easter. They guide us into the wilderness with Christ, helping us to slow down and enter fully into this season of self-examination and renewal. The music of Lent reminds us of our frailty, our dependence on God's mercy, and the great love of Christ who bore our sins on the cross.

O Sacred Head, Now Wounded, is a profound 12th century Lenten hymn focusing on the suffering, humiliation, and physical agony of Jesus Christ during his crucifixion. It portrays Christ's wounded, thorn-crowned head as a symbol of sacrificial love, emphasizing that his pain endured for human transgression, inviting personal reflection on redemption.

*O sacred Head, now wounded, with grief and shame weighed down,
Now scornfully surrounded with thorns, thine only crown;
How pale thou art with anguish with sore abuse and scorn!
How does that visage languish, which once was bright as morn!*

When I Survey the Wondrous Cross, written by Isaac Watts in 1707, is based on Galatians 6:14 – "But God forbid that I should boast, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ." It calls for a personal, deep contemplation of the cross, where the "Prince of Glory" died, leading to a shift in perspective where worldly pride and gains are abandoned for devotion to Christ's love.

*When I survey the wondrous cross
On which the Prince of glory died,
My richest gain I count but loss
And pour contempt on all my pride.*

*Forbid it, Lord, that I should boast,
Save in the death of Christ, my Lord;
All the vain things that charm me most
I sacrifice them to his blood.*

*See from his head, his hands, his feet,
Sorrow and love flow mingled down;
Did e'er such love and sorrow meet,
Or thorns compose so rich a crown?*

*Were the whole realm of nature mine,
That were a present far too small;
Love so amazing, so divine,
Demands my soul, my life, my all.*

Lenten music does not leave us in despair; it draws us deeper into the mystery of Christ's love, preparing us for the triumph of Easter morning. Just as the world rushes past Advent straight into Christmas, it often skips over Lent in favor of the celebration of Easter. There is something deeply transformative about allowing ourselves to dwell in the music of Lent, to sit in the tension, fully engaging with the reality of Christ's suffering, and to prepare our hearts for the full joy of the Resurrection.

2026 Budget and Stewardship: (Jim Heil)

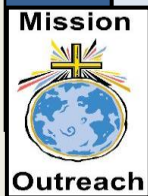
- The 2026 final pledge budget of \$377,429 was put forward for approval. It was approved, motioned, and seconded by vestry members.
