The average lifespan of an electrical panel is about 30 years. If your home is over 30 years old and the panel has never been replaced or upgraded, it's time to have it inspected. Outdated panels can lead to reliability issues, fire hazards, and difficulty supporting modern electrical demands such as EV chargers, backup generators, and solar systems.
