### From the Pastor's Desk

I had an interesting thought the other day..."What is our responsibility in how we manage ourselves if someone argues or disagrees strongly with us?" I don't mean the little squabbles that are inevitable in our day-to-day lives. No, I'm talking about full-on battles that lead to people glaring at each other as they walk by, talking about others behind their backs, and people who just plain avoid each other at all costs. As Christians, how are we supposed to handle situations when it comes to dealing with others when they refuse to "see it my way"?

Disagreeing with others isn't necessarily a bad thing. It's only when we let our emotions take the place of rational thinking and a heart for God that we start to run into trouble. I hope that the following points may remind all of us how to keep our disagreements in perspective.

My first thought would be to look to the Bible, as it is our guide for living. Within its pages, we can see examples of how really trying to understand someone can actually deepen empathy and understanding. By navigating disagreements with a Christ-centered perspective instead of our own, we can often gain a deeper understanding of another person's thoughts, feelings, and needs. This involves actively *listening* as the person talks instead of, as we all tend to do, preparing a "defense" in our head for when they stop talking. **Romans 12:10** tells us to "Be devoted to one another in love. Honor one another above yourselves."

My second thought would be to embrace an attitude of humbleness. This one is a little tougher, but it *doesn't* mean that you have to roll over and let someone steamroller you! It simply means acknowledging to another that you are willing to listen graciously to what they have to say and then *graciously* (and in a normal tone of voice) share your thoughts. It often helps the situation to start with "You go first and after you are done talking, I'll share my thoughts as well." As we see in **Phil. 2:3-4** "Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not

looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others."

If you don't seem to be getting anywhere with either of these attempts, then sometimes it is best, for your own mental health and to save the friendship/relationship, to "agree to disagree".

So, my final thought is this; <u>If you know that a certain topic will start fireworks</u>, then avoid it, no matter what the temptation might be to bring it up or engage in talking about it. **2 Tim. 2:23 advises**; "'Don't have anything to do with foolish and stupid arguments, because you know they produce quarrels. '

I couldn't have said it better myself.

Benches and picnic tables are there for our use, but bring lawn chairs, if desired. Com out for a fun afternoon!





- 5. Go for 0.1 mile and turn left onto Brubaker Lane.
- 6. Go approximately 0.2 mile to the park. Look for Beaver Lodge.
