Originally called the Builders Ministry, JOY was created more than 20 years ago to provide opportunities for connection with others in the church in the same life stage. While adults of all ages would find the ministry's activities enjoyable, they are designed for those who are retired and able to attend daytime events.

Outings and activities range from pure fun to educational and inspirational.

Among Anne's favorites is a trip to the Churchill Museum at Westminster
College in Fulton, MO, the site of Winston Churchill's famous Iron Curtain

60s and 70s, performed by an in-house band of musicians and vocalists led
