

Advent is a holy season of the Catholic Church that is about watching, waiting and preparing for Christmas. Our annual journey through this holy season gives us the opportunity to walk with Jesus to prepare ourselves for His glorious "second coming" as well as to celebrate His birth more than 2000 years ago.

Advent means the arrival of or the beginning of something. During this holy season we are invited to meditate on Jesus' first coming in history as a baby in Bethlehem; His daily coming into our lives in mystery through the Sacraments and Sacred Scripture and finally; and His Second Coming. We see the traditional signs of Advent in our parish: violet vestments, linens and banners, as well as flowers and our Advent wreath. These signs remind us that we need to prepare for Jesus' rebirth in our hearts and lives, and enabling Him to radiate His love, mercy, compassion, and forgiveness around us.

Our Scripture readings during Advent tell us that we should prepare for Jesus' Second Coming. These readings remind us that all too often we allow ourselves to let the worldly issues and concerns control our lives, especially during this time of year, just like the people did when Jesus was born. If we listen to the Gospel passages during Advent, we will hear Jesus remind us that there is something more important than our worldly cares and concerns. He tells us that the Son of Man will come at a time we least expect. Since the Son of Man will show up without an appointment, we must always be prepared.

Jesus also reminds us that we need to be alert and watchful while spiritually preparing for Christmas. He invites us to begin each day by praying for the strength and power of the Holy Spirit to prepare ourselves for His rebirth in our lives. He invites us to pray for our family, friends, parishioners and people we may not even know who are grieving or suffering through mental, physical, emotional or financial hardships. He reminds us to offer our daily work to God for His glory and to practice more self-control by resisting our bad habits.

Throughout Advent we have the opportunity to seek God's forgiveness and reconcile ourselves with Him and with one another. Jesus invites us to extend our unconditional forgiveness to those who have hurt us, just as we ask for His forgiveness. He also invites us to see His face in everyone and share His sacrificial love, mercy, forgiveness and service with everyone we meet.

On Monday (December 8th) we have the opportunity to pray to our Blessed Mother as we celebrate the Solemnity of her Immaculate Conception. Although it was only declared a dogma of the Church in 1854, the Church celebrated the feast of the Immaculate Conception of Mary in the seventh century in Palestine on December 9th. This was known as the "Conception by St. Anne of the Theotokos (God-Bearer)." When observance of this feast day spread to the west, the feast date was changed to December 8th , which is nine months before Our Blessed Lady's birthday of September 8th.

In his Apostolic Constitution, Ineffabilis Deus (issued in 1854) Pope Pius IX declared the Dogma of the Immaculate Conception, when he said:

"The Most Holy Virgin Mary was, in the very first moment of her conception, by a unique gift of grace and privilege of Almighty God and in view of the merits of Jesus Christ the Redeemer of mankind, preserved free from all stains of original sin."

Why then do we celebrate this special day for Mary while we are watching and waiting for Christmas? The answer is because Mary's heart was fully disposed to the fulfilment of the divine will. Mary is the model of Christian expectation and hope. There is no selfishness in her heart. She desires nothing for herself except God's glory and human salvation.

Mary is the role model for us this Advent season to help us prepare to celebrate Jesus' birth on Christmas as we watch and wait in joyful expectation for Emmanuel. Advent teaches us to prepare with expectation for God who reveals to us the important gift on Jesus' incarnation as He says: "for unto us a Child will be born, a Savior, who is Christ and Lord."

This Advent let us take time and pray to Mary, the Theotokos, asking her to intervene with her son on our behalf. Ask her to help us prepare to celebrate Christmas and give Jesus all the glory, praise and honor for which He is due as we joyfully sing "O Come, O come Emanuel."
