



VAT: Video Addicted Games Group



Christmas tradition. In addition to enjoying
good food and fellowship, we will share these
stories to get to know each other and our diverse
church family in a new way!

Christiana Manyanye is planning to bring a snack called chin-chin and jollof rice. She says,

"There's no Christmas in a Cameroon household without Chin-chin. Everyone gets together for this special moment. It's usually done the eve of Christmas before going for the midnight service. It's a mixture of flour, sugar, margarine, yeast, eggs, nutmeg and orange zest. The dough is cut off in various shapes and sizes depending on every family. Then it's deep fried in vegetable oil. Delicious! Then I will also present Cameroon jollof rice. It's rice fried with tomatoes, protein and vegetables. I promise not to make it spicy the Cameroon way. It will be mild."

Ruth Smith's family has been making Grandma's Cinnamon Rolls at Christmastime for generations - large, pie-sized buns filled with cinnamon sugar. "My dad grew up eating them for Christmas breakfast as did I. My grandma made dozens for the holidays - her garage freezer was always full of them to give away to friends and church family. Now, I make them for my neighbors and always keep an extra one in the freezer to eat for my birthday breakfast in January."

We hope to see you and your Christmas traditions at the luncheon!




#### "Presbyterianism 101" Adult Class January 11 & 18

You have shown strength with your arm; you have scattered the proud in their conceit, you have deposed the mighty from their thrones and raised the lowly to high places.


Luke 1:50 (Inclusive Bible)

In 1865, William Chatterton Dix penned a poem that would become the beloved Christmas-time favorite, "What Child Is This?" During Advent, we will dive into this question that is much more complicated than the lilting lullaby tune, "Greensleeves," conveys. We will see the story of the time leading up to the birth of Christ in its historical trauma-informed fullness. The story of humanity and its recurring themes of oppression and corruption run right through history and into our own narratives. Yet, we can rely on the assurance of the carol to confirm that God is "present with us" in powerful ways that continue to be the Word of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love even and especially in the midst of hard times. The Advent season begins Sunday, Nov. 30.

To deepen your Advent experience, you may join the Adult Spiritual Formation class during the weeks of Advent as they read and discuss the book, "The First Advent in Palestine," by Kelley Nikondeha. You do not have to purchase the book to participate. Please feel free to come on Sunday mornings and share in the discussion as we explore together and find new discoveries of the Advent story in the gospel from its original context of resistance, abusive rulers, systems of oppression, and God coming to earth. One in four college students are facing food insecurity. This is twice the national average. Food insecurity is defined as the lack of access to nutritionally adequate food to support a healthy and active lifestyle. There are many reasons for the food insecurity on college campuses including lack of culturally appropriate food options, inadequate campus dining facility hours, high cost of food and food plans, and lack of support and preparation for navigating higher education particularly among first-generation or low-income students. Research has shown impacts of food insecurity including lower GPAs and overall academic performance; higher rates of depression, anxiety, and self-injurious behavior; and higher rates of overweight, obesity, and long-term chronic illness including diabetes and cardiovascular disease.

During the month of January, we will collect items to restock the Lindenwood campus food pantry, which is run by the campus chaplain, Rev. Dr. Nichole Torbitzky. Dr. Torbitzky will share a little more about this ministry in our Minute for Mission on Sunday, January 11. This is a wonderful opportunity to meet a local need and build connections with our community!

#### LEADERSHIP: PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE








## UPDATES & A BIG THANK YOU

Since beginning to nest at SCPC last March, the Forward in Faith Church has DOUBLED in size, completely outgrowing our Chapel. Beginning December 1, the church will instead be renting the Lower Level Youth Rooms, Conference room, and Java with Jesus area for worship, Bible studies and fellowship. SCPC is renting Java with Jesus to their church as a shared space, which means our Book Club and Women's Fellowship Group may continue meeting there for now. Please continue to hold in prayer these siblings in Christ, celebrating with them the growth God has given this new congregation.

#### Are we "blessed to be a blessing?"

Recently, I had an encounter with a person in our community who is unhoused and thought of that saying after my experience with them. I am hesitant to use it as its meaning can be diminished with overuse, but it has stayed with me every time I think of this encounter.

I saw "John" sitting on the street corner while driving home one day, and remembering the blessing bag I had in my back seat, I circled back and got out to speak with him. It was a pleasant encounter. We shook hands, exchanged names, and I offered the bag to him for which he was truly grateful. He asked if I would make a phone call to a "friend" who often helps him. I obliged, but when no one answered, he didn't want to leave a message. We talked a bit more, and I invited him to our church and then went on my way. A few minutes later my phone rang and I recognized the number as the one I had called for him. It was a woman and I introduced myself and told her of my encounter with "John." The woman was his mother. We talked for awhile as she recounted his story to me, thanking me and our church for the kindness, dignity, and love he received from us. It was apparent that she felt blessed by the encounter I had with her son, but I was blessed by it also. The truth is, if I hadn't remembered the blessing bag in my car, I don't think that I would have stopped. It is easy to overlook people like "John" continuing to go about our day, forgetting that they are children of God, carrying His divine imprint, and worthy of our time. Most importantly, they are capable of blessing us. My hope is that you will have a similar encounter, knowing you are blessed to be a blessing.
