Council Highlights

- Approved the Italian Fest Parking Lot Fundraiser for Youth Ministries.
- Approved the use of our facilities for the Boy Scouts Breakfast and the SCA (Society for Creative Anachronism.)
- Approved revised job descriptions for the Facility Manager and Audio-Visual Team Leader.
- Accepted the letter of retirement from Dana Callahan, effective 12/31/2025.
- Received a \$30K grant from the Edwardsville Community Foundation to be used towards the purchase and installation of an emergency generator.

Financial update

In May, our church's financial situation was much better than expected—thanks to your generosity and strong community support. We ended the month with a net surplus of \$5,624, which is a big improvement over the \$20,301 shortfall we had anticipated. While regular giving through envelopes came in at \$26,512, which was \$1,843 less than expected, we received a very generous donation to support the HHH program and saw great participation in a community fundraiser walk. We also received payments from our preschool and cemetery ministries that helped cover shared expenses. Although we spent slightly more than budgeted, the overall result was very encouraging.

Looking at the year so far, we're still running behind where we'd like to be, with the General Fund showing a net deficit of \$25,793, which is \$9,824 worse than expected. Most of this gap is due to lower regular envelope giving, which totaled \$168,134, falling \$23,166 short of our goal. However, special gifts and successful events have helped make up some of the difference. We've also had some increased staffing costs in our facilities team, which will slightly raise expenses for the rest of the year. On a positive note, the HHH program is doing very well, with donations \$12,425 above expectations and expenses right on budget, leaving us with a surplus of \$1,325 so far this year. We're grateful for all the ways you support the mission of our church—through your gifts, your time, and your prayers.

HHH Summer Camp

The last day of HHH Summer Camp was July 24. Look for the full report in next month's Informer. Take a look at the HHH-After School Tutoring and Summer Camp Program Facebook page to see pictures!

This summer, the HHH Staff was asked to jot down their feelings or an experience from camp or a "feel good" story that could be shared with the congregation. These will be shared over the next few issues of the Informer.

Pastor Lisa Hart drives from Ferguson, MO to be a Reading Buddy for us; this is her second year at camp! Here is her observation about this part of our program:

As a Reading Buddy, I found variety and delight in every session. The children and the books they choose range from "One Fish, Two Fish, Three Fish, Blue Fish" to Everything about Animals. Some are very good readers, going through several books in the half hour session. Some struggle to sound out words, but enjoy sharing the pictures with me. One girl was able to read level 3 books, but also liked to hear me read about the Monster under the Bed. But just in case it would go to my head, just in case I would think it was about me, the comfort dogs came to the room. Reading to a Buddy is good, but reading to Jordan or Esther was their delight. Books, dogs and children – what could be better?

Sue Meadows, a life-long Collinsville resident who heard about us through the First United Methodist Church, has been volunteering for HHH as a tutor and as a camp counselor since 2022. She writes:

I have made many new friends both young and old. It is so wonderful to watch our community come together to make HHH such an amazing experience for so many children and families. I have worked with some of these families for multiple years now. It's fun to watch the kids mature both physically and socially. One particular memory stands out watching so many adults and children show such community pride during the Juneteenth parade. There were 47 children and 17 adults who walked together. Everyday during lunch it warms my heart to watch so much joy in all the faces. It is a privilege to participate in HHH.

This summer, we welcomed two new awesome volunteers to our staff, sisters Deb Boylan and Pat Ryan! Deb was our Compost Captain and Pat was a Camp Counselor for the 1st & 2nd graders and a Reading Buddy.

One day, a new to camp 1st grader named Peyton was very interested when her class visited the compost pile to learn where all our food waste from camp went after the campers put it in the bucket instead of the trash can. Peyton was so excited about what she had learned that she brought her own pair of gloves the

next day so she could help Miss Deb with the compost pile. Pat also shared a story about another of her first graders, Dakari. During lunch, he brought a cup of water over to a girl in his group – totally on his own without anyone asking him to do it. He told Pat that he had noticed that the girl forgot her water when she picked up her food tray. Pat said, "I thought it was a powerful (even though small) gesture of kindness. The girl who had received the water happened to be a child that had been struggling with some feelings – being newer to the group."

Elizabeth Ellis, a second year HHH volunteer, shared the following:

My experience as a camp counselor for HHH 2025 was really great. I truly enjoyed every minute that I spent at the camp. I loved meeting and working with all the adults (I called them my friends.) The people I worked with were kind and friendly. Everyone seemed to be happy working for the good of the children. I especially enjoyed working and playing with the children. I loved the activities built into the program. I found that each activity served two different purposes. One, we have fun, and two, we learn something new. I also loved the food, family style dining, and story time. We were able to enjoy a nice meal and socialize while eating and we also were treated with a nice story each day.

Margaret Sitts was new to the camp staff this year after years of sending her foster children to HHH. She no longer fosters but wants to give back for all we did for her kids. She writes:

I have to say I really enjoyed my summer break here at HHH 2025. I got a chance to watch over the children in the 3rd/4th grade group. I watched the children's actions and interactions as they embraced each other, and I was very pleased with the way they took care of each other. On the very first day, I asked one of our campers if he could help another camper who seemed to be a little intimidated by the crowd. He put a big smile on his face and said yes and he did just that, he helped her out. He sat with her and played a couple of games. When we moved to the other rooms, he would sit next to her. For the next couple of days he stayed with her. As she got more and more comfortable, he pulled away and gave her, her space.

We learned every day just how amazing our campers, and our staff are!



Our book club has chosen the next book we will be reviewing: Our book club has chosen the next book we will be reviewing: Anxious People by Fredrik Backman Looking at real estate isn't usually a life-or-death situation, but an apartment open house becomes just that when a failed bank robber bursts in and takes a group of strangers hostage. The captives include a recently retired couple who relentlessly hunt down fixer-uppers to avoid the painful truth that they can't fix their own marriage. There's a wealthy bank director who has been too busy to care about anyone else and a young couple who are about to have their first child

but can't seem to agree on anything. Add to the mix an eighty-seven-year-old woman who has lived long enough not to be afraid of someone waving a gun in her face, a flustered but still-ready-to-make-a-deal real estate agent, and a mystery man who has locked himself in the apartment's only bathroom, and you've got the worst group of hostages in the world. Each of them carries a lifetime of grievances, hurts, secrets, and passions that are ready to boil over. None of them is entirely who they appear to be. And all of them—the bank robber included—desperately crave some sort of rescue. As the authorities and the media surround the premises, these reluctant allies will reveal surprising truths about themselves and set in motion a chain of events so unexpected that even they can hardly explain what happens next.

Sunday School resumes on Rally Sunday, September 7, 2025 at 9:30 am



This summer has been a busy one, as most of our summers are at St. John UCC. The last time I wrote for the Informer, we had "on our horizon" the Juneteenth Parade and Festival.

I can happily report the event was not only wonderful for our town, but it was an outstanding event for the church. First, almost the entire enrollment of HHH showed up for the parade—49 kids, youth and adults came, in yellow shirts as bright as the sun, and had a wonderful time marching. I believe we were one of the largest groups to participate—and what the public noticed was a united group of children and adults, multiage and multiracial, gathered to celebrate the freedom on which Juneteenth is established.

After the parade, a group of adult volunteers and I sat at our St. John UCC/HHH table, giving out handmade soaps and cards made by the kids. We talked to so many people, gave out flyers and information, and (I believe) were witnesses to God working in our church and community. It was a good event—worth our time and energy—and I hope you might consider joining us next year!

I was also privileged enough to attend part of our denomination's General Synod this month. I had a whirlwind weekend in Kansas City, following several of the "big" resolutions that were in discernment, celebrating with the ONA Coalition, and also squeezing in some sightseeing, learning and baseball. Oh—and barbeque!



One of the questions our denomination has wrestled with is about how we are to be a "United and Uniting" church in the world. And how this plays out in relationships with other groups (denominations) that differ in some way to our UCC policies. Often, it comes down to how important any particular point of difference is to you personally. Our denomination voted this summer to re-establish a relationship with our sister churches in Puerto Rico, a historically related group that had separated themselves years ago over a disagreement about LGBTQ inclusion.

You may be asking why this is important—especially if you (like me) have no personal point of connection here. I am neither Puerto Rican, Latina, or LGBTQ+. What would I care about this resolution?

This is what I learned: how we deal with difference and disagreement is 100% relevant to my life, my call and my commitment to the UCC. When we voted to reestablish connection, even though there is still hurt to heal (when the separation happened, it was quite painful for many), we opened a pathway for the Holy Spirit to do Her work. Now, there is an opening and opportunity for transformation, which will be beneficial for every member, not only those who have an obvious or immediate point of relation.

St. John UCC family, we are a church who believes God continues to act in the world and in our hearts to bring us together, not tear us apart. God wants us to connect, make peace, build bridges and offer healing and reconciliation. It's never easy, but it is the way in which we all can participate in building God's Kingdom (some like Kin-dom) here on earth, as it is in Heaven.

May it be so in your life and in mine. Amen. Rev. Jennifer Sowell

St. John's Community Care Celebrates its 40th Anniversary



Forty years ago, our church leaders had a vision to serve older adults and caregivers. On July 8, 1985, they founded what is now St. John's Community Care in the basement of the Collinsville church.

What began as a handful of part-time employees providing non-medical care in the homes of older people grew into who we are today - an essential service for Metro East families.

Members of the congregation built the Collinsville center with their own hands in 2001. They added on as the Adult Day Program grew and behind the building, volunteers created a courtyard with wide walking paths, large patio, and a perennial garden with beautiful flowers.

When Edwardsville families asked for Adult Day services, SJCC responded by opening a center near the university.

Today, St. John's Community Care is a proud United Way partner and receives more support from individual donors and foundations every year. They have plans to expand the Adult Day Program to Highland soon. Thanks to you, the caring never ends!

Six-Week Course for Caregivers of Older Adults Begins August 5

St. John's Community Care is hosting a series of nationally recognized courses for caregivers called Powerful Tools for Caregivers. Two new courses begin in August. Over the course of six weeks, caregivers receive tools to take care of themselves while caring for an older adult. St. John's Community Care offers the course free thanks to funding from AgeSmart Community Resources.

lowa State University of Science and Technology owns and manages the curriculum that meets the highest level of evidence-based disease prevention and health promotion. In the course, caregivers learn to communicate better with those they care for, make tough decisions about their care, and locate helpful resources.

Two experienced class leaders, Ray Gallaher and Joan Garner, will conduct the next series at St. John's Community Care – one on Zoom and the other in person. Interactive lessons, discussions, and brainstorming will help caregivers choose tools to put into action in their day-to-day lives.
