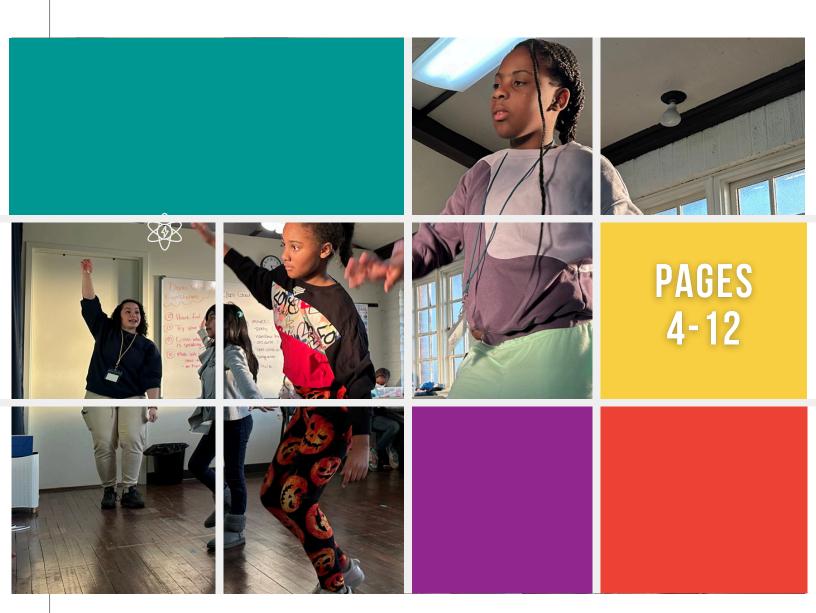

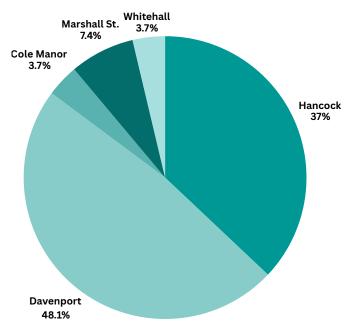


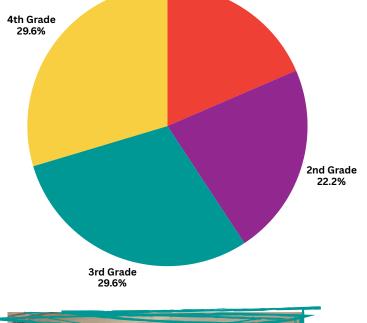

#### **2024-25 Program Participants by Grade**

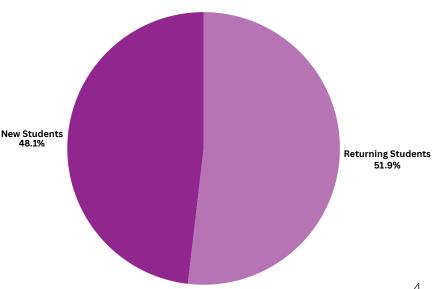

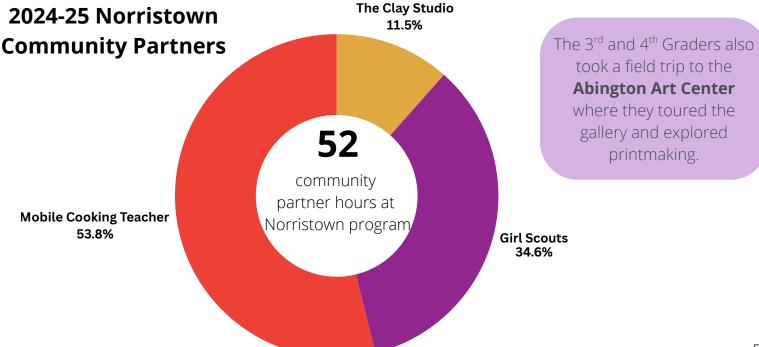
Two Girls First alumni, now currently in 5<sup>th</sup> Grade, also volunteered **39 hours** of their time to help the younger students.

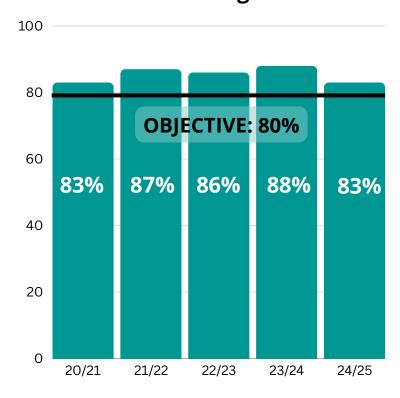

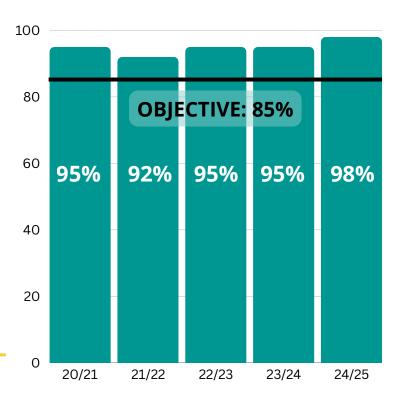

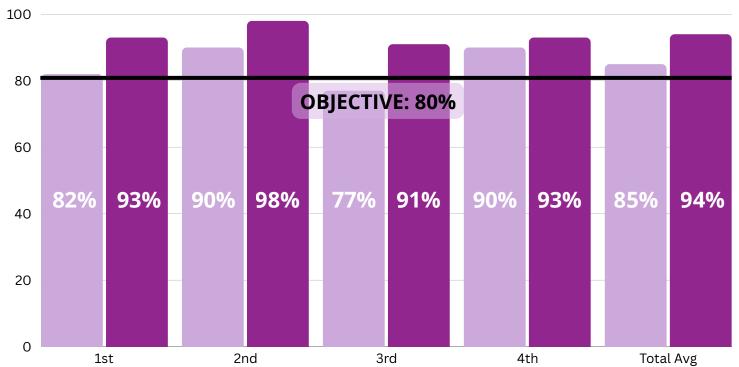

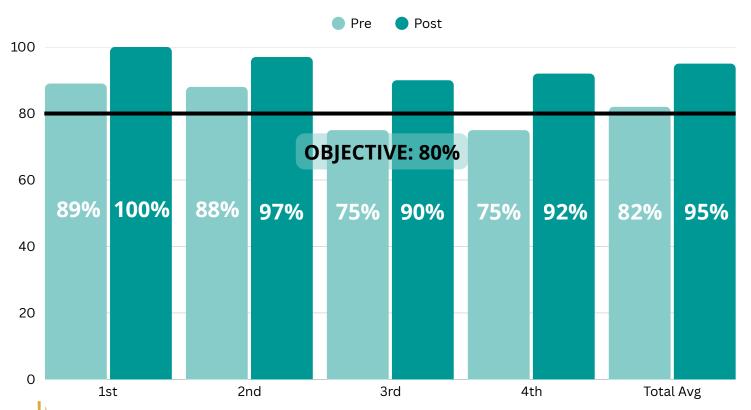

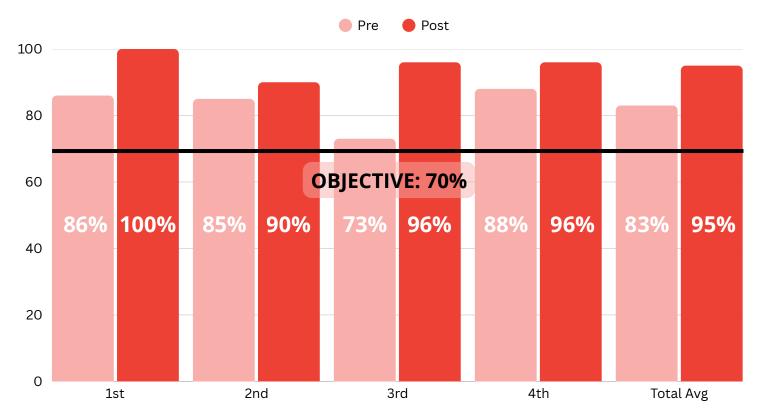

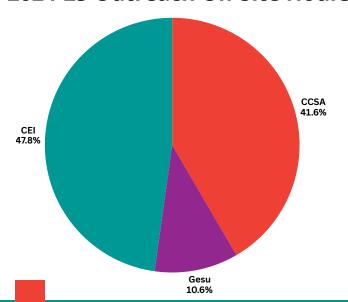

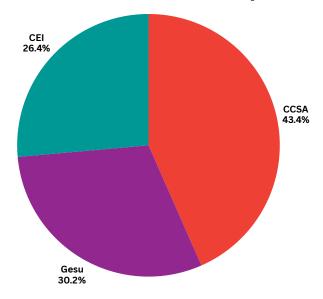

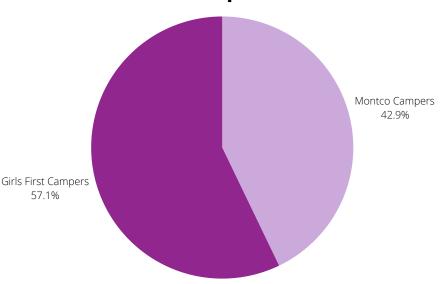

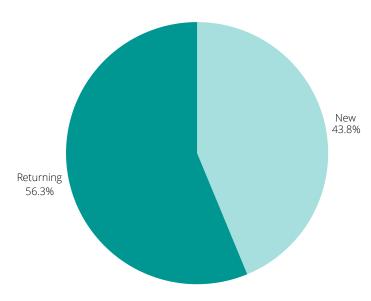

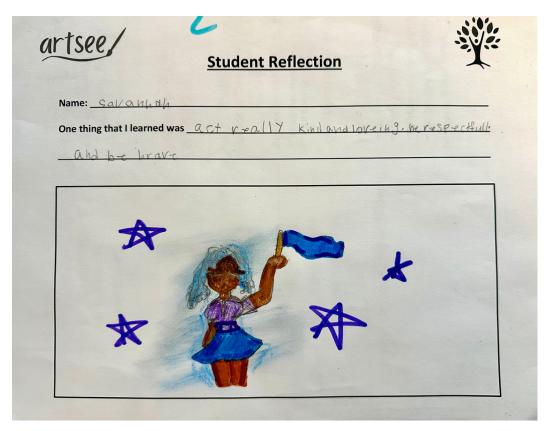


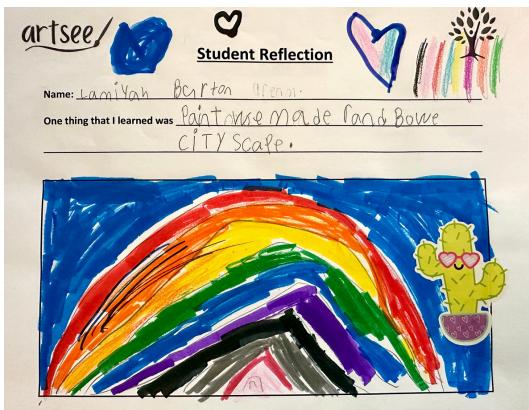
#### 2024 New vs. Returning **Camp Participants**

#### Report Notes



- 1. Girls First Norristown started the 2024-25 program year with 26 students. Over the course of the year, Girls First Norristown served 27 unique students, including 6 students who had to leave the program due to various reasons (*scheduling conflicts, transportation challenges, etc*), as well as 1 student who was recruited to the program during the school year.
- 2. Attendance at Girls First Norristown slightly dipped below our goal level in January and February 2025 due to weather and challenges in the community, however, for the program year we exceeded our attendance objective of students attending 80% of program days.
- 3. Through analysis of the pre and post student self-assessments average by grade, it is evident that most groups made gains this program year in social and emotional skills. Each grade was evaluated based on a specific self-assessment per their content area: 1<sup>st</sup> Grade students were assessed on self-determination and personal agency; 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade students were assessed on self-efficacy; 4<sup>th</sup> Grade students were assessed on empathy. This data reflects the pre and post self-assessments from the 18 students at Girls First Norristown who completed the entire program year and had consistent attendance. Data was limited for the 1<sup>st</sup> Grade group as only one student completed the entire program year.
- 4. Due to incomplete data from Fall 2024 at CEI, student progress for this particular Outreach program was calculated using assessments from the full 2024-25 program year and is not broken down per semester.
- 5. We fell just below our targeted goal for Summer Camp Attendance due to illness, a family emergency, and a transportation issue.
