FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

As we look ahead to America 250, we are reminded that our nation's story is built in communities like Hornell. Our city has always played a proud role in America's history of hard work, progress, and connection, especially through its deep railroad roots dating back to the 1800s. Rail has long been part of Hornell's identity, shaping our growth and linking us to the rest of the country.

It is fitting, then, that one of the most exciting moments this summer will be the arrival of the legendary Union Pacific Big Boy #4014, which is making a cross-country journey. This historic locomotive will stop in Hornell on Thursday, June 11, 2026, from 2:00 to 2:30 pm at the Erie Depot on Loder Street. This rare visit is a powerful reminder of the rail heritage that helped build both our city and our nation.

As we continue our summer celebrations, I invite everyone to join us for the City's Independence Day parade, followed by a full day of festivities at Veterans Memorial Park. The park will come alive with music, food, family activities, and community spirit as we gather together to celebrate.

We will close the day with the largest fireworks display Hornell has ever seen, lighting up the sky in honor of our nation's independence and the people who make our community strong.

Together, as we mark America 250, we celebrate not only our nation's history, but also the strength, pride, and spirit that continue to define Hornell.





From the Fire Department

The Fire Department had a very busy year in 2025, responding to 400 calls for fire service and over 4,300 emergency medical service (EMS) calls. For fire calls, this included 31 calls for fires, 61 medical assists, 249 service calls, and 40 carbon monoxide calls.

Meanwhile, on the ambulance side, the most frequent calls included breathing problems (245), chest pain (140), fall victims (496), psychiatric concerns (128), and over 600 calls for sick folks in need of support.

The department also recently completed its Annual Training in May. Frequent updates and yearly training for fire and EMS are essential for our first responders to continue providing high-quality service to residents. Fire trainings included search and rescue, fire suppression, ventilation, ladder training, and forcible entry, while EMS training consisted of both Basic and Advanced Life Support, along with specialized pediatric training. We also want to extend a huge congratulations to Firefighters Jordan Emo and Dale McMichael, who built on this department-wide focus on training by graduating from the New York State Fire Academy with their national certifications this past May.

The department recently acquired a new gear drying unit through a grant from PERMA. This specialized equipment allows firefighters to quickly wash and dry their turn-out gear right at the station, effectively removing the toxic chemicals and burning byproducts that cling to fabrics after a fire.

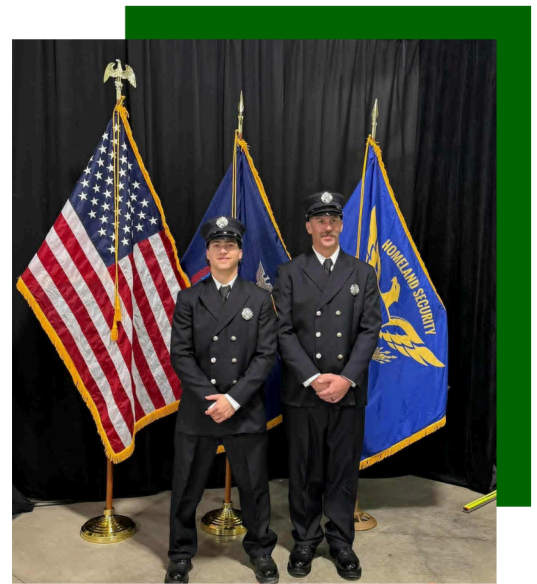

Construction Driving Tips

As construction season ramps up throughout the City of Hornell and the surrounding area, particularly with the \$64 million NYSDOT project on State Route 36, the police and fire departments would like to offer the following tips for drivers to ensure safe traffic flow and productive construction season.

- 1. Travel safely and slowly.** Please take your time through various detours and traffic pattern changes as work develops. Work zones can change, and it's important to travel safely and slowly for the protection of the utility crews as well as fellow drivers. **Leave your destination with plenty of extra time and expect delays to avoid rushing.**
- 2. Pull over only when safe to do so.** If you see lights and sirens behind you, and there is no available shoulder, don't panic; Do not slam on your brakes or stop in the middle of a live lane. **Keep moving forward safely until you can find a safe place to pull over.**
- 3. Be Patient.** Construction crews are performing improvements to keep everyone safe and upgrade our infrastructure. Please be patient, eliminate distractions inside your vehicle, and remain mindful of the workers performing these necessary repairs on our roadways.

Police Update

The Hornell Police Department would like to inform residents of a new law regarding e-bikes, e-scooters, e-skateboards, and other micromobility devices recently enacted by the Hornell Common Council. Officers have been out on patrol, including bike patrol, providing education, information, and enforcement regarding these devices throughout our community.

We encourage residents to check our Facebook page to keep up with the latest updates from the department. Our page includes daily logs, recent arrests, outstanding warrants, and various public service announcements to help keep the community informed and safe.

Finally, we would like to remind everyone to travel slowly, safely, and sober this summer season. Please take your time on the roads and keep a close eye out for children playing in neighborhoods throughout the city.

Codes Office Update

As we move into residential construction season, the Codes Office would like to remind anyone performing structural improvements to their home to secure the proper permits before work begins. Please note that detailed drawings are required for structural projects like additions, decks, and garages. Drawings should include dimensions of the improvement, as well as structure support indications should be included on the drawing.

In Neighborhood Revitalization news, we would like to remind residents that trash and refuse should only be brought to the curb the day ahead of garbage pick up, and receptacles should be returned by the next day. Items should not be left at the curbside if they are not picked up. Lippincott's does a great job with pick up, but they are limited to five 30-gallon bags.

We have provided reminders with violations when we see them, but this seems to be increasing in frequency, and we want to remind violators that tickets can be issued

As we are currently in heavy mowing season, we would like to thank all of you for your cooperation with mowing and maintaining your lawns. We have seen improvements this year and appreciate all efforts to keep our City clean and safe.

Please be a good neighbor, clean up after your pet, maintain your lawn, and together we can enjoy a safe and fun summer season!

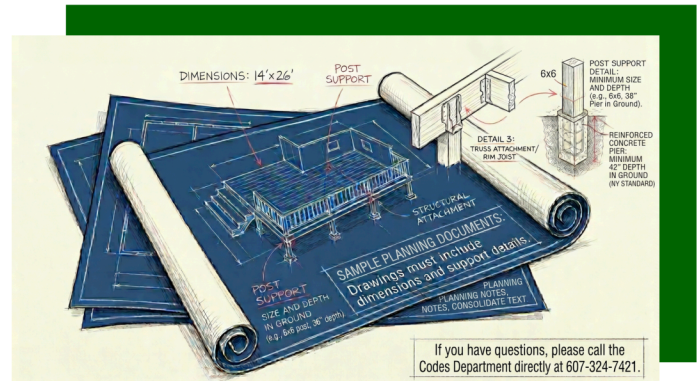
Local Law for Electronic Bicycles, Electric Scooters, and Electric Skateboards

- **Traffic Laws:** Operators shall obey all traffic control devices and applicable provisions of NY law governing bicycles. Ride in the same direction as traffic flow.
- **Operating Areas:** Devices may be operated only on public roadways with posted speed limits of 30 mph or less (*NYS Vehicle & Traffic Law Section 1242*). Devices are not permitted on any roadway where signs prohibit bicycles or pedestrian traffic.
- **Speed Limits:** Class 1 & Class 2 devices shall not exceed 20mph. Class 3 devices are permitted for law enforcement personnel only. (*NYS Vehicle & Traffic Law Section 1242*)
- **Age Requirement:** No person under the age of 16 years old shall operate an e-bike (*NYS Vehicle and Traffic Law 1242*) or micromobility device.
- **Riding on Sidewalks:** Operation of micromobility devices on sidewalks is prohibited, except to enter or exit a driveway or where expressly authorized by posted signage. (*NYS Vehicle & Traffic Law 1242.5a*)
- **Helmets:** All operators are required to wear helmets that meet Consumer Product Safety Commission standards.
- **Required Lights & Reflectors:** A white front lamp must be visible from at least 500 ft, and a rear red lamp or reflector must be visible from at least 300 ft for nighttime riding. (*NYS Vehicle & Traffic Law 1236*)
- **Rider Limit:** Only one rider shall be permitted unless the device is manufactured for multiple riders.
- **Unsafe, Reckless or Impaired Operation Prohibited:** No motorized micromobility device shall be operated in a reckless or unsafe manner, including weaving through traffic, unsafe passing, excessive speed for conditions or distracted or *impaired operation*. (*NYS Vehicle & Traffic Law 1242A*)
- ★ **Gas Powered Devices:** Gas powered micromobility devices are illegal to operate on public streets, highways, sidewalks or bike paths. Only legally registered motorcycles or vehicles are permitted. (*NYS Vehicle & Traffic 401*)

City Parks & Paths:

- Micromobility devices may be operated in City parks and on designated paths where authorized by posted signage.
- Speed shall not exceed 10 mph while operating in City parks or on designated paths.
- Operators should yield to pedestrians at all times, and slow to walking speed when passing pedestrians.

Department of Public Works

The Department of Public Works is prepared for another busy summer season! Street paving has begun, with 10 streets planned for paving this year. The first round has already been completed on Terry Street, Loder Street, Erie Avenue, and Conklin Street. Upcoming street paving includes Cameron Avenue, Collier Street, Genesee Street, East Washington Street, South Division Street, and School Street.

The DPW would also like to remind residents not to discharge or place grass and leaves into City roadways. Grass and leaves can be dangerous for bicyclists and motorcyclists, and they clog the storm sewers and water drainage systems. This practice is illegal and can result in a ticket. We appreciate your cooperation and understanding. Street sweeper season has begun, with the sweeper making weekly visits through the fall of 2026. Street sweeping maintains our roads and removes debris for optimal drainage. Residents should remove cars from the street during overnight hours preceding garbage day, unless otherwise indicated.

A round of hydrant flushing is planned for this summer. Hydrant flushing is essential to maintaining the City's water system. Stay tuned for more information!

Finally, the City's Youth and Recreation program begins on June 29 and runs through late August. Playground attendants will be stationed at the following locations: James Street, Stephens Ave Apartments, Maple City Park (High School), Columbian School, and Bryant Apartments.

A Message from the City Chamberlain

City Chamberlain's Office- Tax and Payment Information

The City Chamberlain's Office manages the collection of City, School, and County taxes, as well as water bills, solid waste bills, and other payments. Please review the following important dates and payment options to avoid penalties.

Tax Collection Dates

- The **2026-27 City Tax** bills were recently sent out in May.

Water Bills

- Metered water bills for commercial property were mailed at the end of May and are due by June 30 without penalty.

Solid Waste Bills

- Solid waste bills will be mailed by the end of June and are due by July 31, 2026 without penalty. Solid waste is billed annually and includes the pickup of recyclables. Recyclables are collected during the third full week of the month (the week that includes the 21st). You do not need to sort your recyclables.

- Use our drop box, located on the Seneca St. side of the City Hall
- Over the phone with Debit/Credit card*
- Online at cityofhornell.gov with Debit/Credit card or E-check*. Online tax payments are only available during the first month of collection before any penalties have been added. Online water and solid waste payments are available anytime.

News from the Assessor's Office

City of Hornell Expands Senior Tax Exemption Program

In response to rising costs impacting households across the community, the City of Hornell has expanded its property tax exemption program for residents aged 65 and older. The updated program moves from a flat income cap to a graduated sliding scale designed to help more seniors remain financially secure and stay in their homes.

Under the new structure, the maximum household income eligibility for the senior tax exemption increases from \$18,000 to \$25,000. Mayor John Buckley stated, "This tiered approach ensures that while the greatest assistance is directed to those with the most limited financial resources, relief is now available to a much broader group of seniors who are also feeling the effects of a higher cost of living. Previously, the program was structured as an all-or-nothing qualification. This graduated system expands eligibility and provides a proportional reduction rather than a simple cutoff."

City Chamberlain Michele Smith emphasized that the expansion was carefully structured to remain fiscally responsible. "This program is affordable and will not have a significant impact on revenue," Smith said. "It allows us to provide assistance where it is most needed while maintaining the City's financial health."

To qualify for the sliding scale exemption, residents must be at least 65 years of age, own and occupy their residence, and have lived in the home for at least one year prior to applying. For more information, residents may contact the Assessor's Office at City Hall at 607-324-7421.

HAT Update

Hornell Area Transit is ready for a busy summer season. We eagerly await the arrival of six new buses, which are anticipated to arrive in July. The bus purchases were made possible through the Federal Transit Authority's (FTA) 5311 Rural Transit grant award. The application was submitted in November of 2022, with the buses finally arriving to our facility this summer. These new buses are paid for with state and federal dollars, with no added cost to the local taxpayer. The updated fleet features full wheelchair accessibility, bike racks, and on-board Wi-Fi.

An Update from the WPCP

The Phase 1B upgrade at the Wastewater Treatment Plant is nearing completion. The \$6.2 million project began in July 2024 and includes the replacement of two return sludge pumps, three raw sewage pumps, and a return sludge meter. The new pumps utilize Variable Frequency Drives (VFDs), which allow them to run more efficiently. All of the rain received in early April was a great test for the new pumps, with flow measured at nearly 6 million gallons per day!

Along with the installation of the new pumps, several other upgrades were completed. A new generator was installed to replace the old, antiquated unit. The new generator will be able to run the entire plant in the event of a loss of power. Two boilers and several concrete areas were also restored. Additionally, a new HVAC and ventilation system was installed to remove sewer gas from the building. This upgrade is beneficial for both the operators and the equipment, as equipment will be less exposed to the corrosive atmosphere and the operators will have a safer, more pleasant environment to work in.

For staffing, Operator Trainee Mike Gibson completed the schooling required to take the state exam for his 1A license. Also, Rich Dunning has retired as Chief Operator after 45 years at the helm. Robert McLaughlin was appointed as the new Chief Operator. Josh Scialpa was appointed as Assistant Chief Operator, filling the position vacated by McLaughlin following his promotion. Congratulations to all!

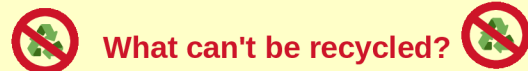
