#### **Faithful Reflections**

Since Labor Day, our Property Ministry has done yeoman's work to keep our campus in good repair while assessing priorities for 2026 to support our current and emerging ministries.

A major project includes replacement of our Great Hall roof in January, preceded by temporary removal of our solar panels—thanks to Steve Handy for managing this work. A smaller recent project upgraded lighting in the Great Hall, especially helpful for night meetings. Eric Kristenson repaired a large hinge on the side door of the church, preventing what could have been a dangerous failure. A new dry well was installed beside the church to drain water away from its foundation.


Another project for early 2026 will rebuild the chapel garden and crumbling walkways outside the parish office entrance. The garden was created in 1962 and has been a beautiful place of respite, but the plantings became overgrown and now block light into both adjacent buildings. More importantly, Hamilton Tree & Landscape has informed us that the four Kwanzan Cherry trees (which have a 50-60 year lifespan) are dying and put both structures at risk. Hamilton will clear the trees, walkways and overgrown bushes before regrading the garden for another generation of restful space, outdoor

weddings and similar activities. We will deputize a group of parish master gardeners to re-envision the space for Spring planting.

Concurrently, we are discussing a new vision for our parish chapel, also dedicated in 1962, for the next generation of liturgy and the arts. Much has changed in the way we worship over the last 60 years, and we hope to harness the space for new opportunities like yoga, meditation, intimate concerts and innovative worship—a frequent theme in our recent listening sessions. Please join our two-part Sunday Forum on December 7 and 14, meeting in the chapel, to join this conversation.

Our Property Committee maintains a detailed spreadsheet with other projects we hope to tackle next year. Major thanks go to John Schmidt, Sherry Bonner and Monica Quinn for leading this work.

A Call for Help for Our Immigrant Community
The next Social Justice Ministry meeting will be

Wednesday, December 17, 6-7pm in the Parish House.

As Christians, we follow Jesus and the Biblical mandates and examples: "You shall not oppress the stranger for you know the heart of the stranger, having been strangers in the land of Egypt" (Exodus 23:9) and the words of Jesus, "for I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in" (Matthew 25:35). And as Episcopalians, our Baptismal Covenant implores us to commit to "seeking and serving Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves" and "striving for justice and peace among all people, and respecting the dignity of every human being," including by "welcoming the stranger." The Social Justice Committee is encouraging parishioners to phone or email your local state legislators and senators, asking them to SUPPORT three bills aimed to protect the rights of our immigrant community. They are Dignity Not Deportation (H.1588/S.1122); The Immigrant Defense Fund (H.1954/S.1127); and The Safe Communities Act (H.2580/S1681). These bills are being discussed currently in legislative committees. There is also another bill, Act Supporting and Honoring ICE Detainments (Shield Act) (S.1096/H.2009), that would force local law enforcement to comply with ICE. We are asking our legislators to OPPOSE this bill.

This linked document is a phone/email script that one might find helpful, as well as the phone numbers and email addresses of our local state representatives and state senators. A link to the contents of each bill is included as well.

A Film-Based Dialogue Series on Race & Faith

Saint Barnabas's Memorial Episcopal Church & Church of the Messiah will host Sacred Ground Circles this January - June.

Individuals are invited to join small groups (circles) to walk through America's history of race and racism, while weaving in threads of family story, economic class, and political and regional identity.

The 11 session series is built around a powerful online curriculum of documentary films and readings that focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/Pacific American histories as they intersect with European American histories.

Participants are invited to peel away the layers that have contributed to the challenges and divides of the present day – all while grounded in our call to faith, hope and love.
