Faithful Reflections

Advent begins on Sunday. Just as our nights get longer and the sky gets grayer, our gospel story captures a brooding cosmology in which our fortunes can change without notice. To paraphrase Isaiah, we long for a Savior who can make life's crazy pathways straight (and the sooner, the better).

That's followed by two weeks of eccentric John the Baptist calling us a brood of vipers and commanding that we change our ways. Only on the Fourth Sunday of Advent do we hear the great Annunciation story foretelling Jesus' birth.

In a season full of Jingle Bells, Advent reminds us that God sends Jesus into a chaotic world—our chaotic world—in hope of redemption and transformation.

In this spirit, our Sunday Forum explores Advent, Apocalypse and Turbulent Times. As we conclude a turbulent cultural year, we connect the dots on scripture and spirituality in today's world.

On three Wednesday mornings starting December 3, we'll explore in detail the two very different nativity stories in Matthew and Luke, the only two biblical writers that give us any details regarding Jesus' birth. Join us to deepen your Advent preparation in a deep read of these short stories as prelude to a glorious Christmas celebration.

A Call for Help for Our Immigrant Community

As Christians, we follow Jesus and the Biblical mandates and examples: "You shall not oppress the stranger for you know the heart of the stranger, having been strangers in the land of Egypt" (Exodus 23:9) and the words of Jesus, "for I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in" (Matthew 25:35). And as Episcopalians, our Baptismal Covenant implores us to commit to "seeking and serving Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves" and "striving for justice and peace among all people, and respecting the dignity of every human being," including by "welcoming the stranger." There are three bills to protect the rights of our immigrant community that have moved to committees to be discussed Tuesday, November 25. Two of these bills will be discussed at the Massachusetts Joint Committee on Judiciary*. They are Dignity Not Deportation (H.1588/S.1122); and The Immigrant Defense Fund (H.1954/S.1127). The third bill, The Safe Communities Act (H.2580/S1681)—will be heard before the Joint Committee on Public Safety and Homeland Security**. (The text of all 3 bills using this linked document.)

This Monday, November 24, The Social Justice Committee will be making phone calls

and sending emails on our own, to our local state legislators and senators, asking them to support these bills. The Social Justice Committee is encouraging all to join this effort, and help protect our neighbors.

The linked document is a phone/email script that one might find helpful, as well as the phone numbers and email addresses of our local state representatives and state senators. A link to the contents of each bill is included as well.

- * The Massachusetts Joint Committee on Judiciary is a joint committee of the Massachusetts General Court responsible for considering all matters related to crimes, penalties, the judiciary, and other legal and civil issues composed of both state senators and representatives from the state legislature.
- ** The Massachusetts Joint Committee on Public Safety and Homeland Security is a standing committee of the Massachusetts General Court that considers legislation and matters related to public safety, homeland security, firearms, motor vehicle laws, and the correction system. It is composed of both state senators and representatives.

THE INFANCY NARRATIVES IN MATTHEW AND LUKE

Matthew and Luke provide two chapters on Jesus' birth, each with a very different story that does little to connect with Jesus' adult ministry. (Mark and John offer no infancy stories.) Likely written in the 2nd century, they pull together historic strands while addressing hot issues of an emerging church long before any evidence of a Christmas celebration. What's going on? Join us on December 3 for the big picture of these infancy narratives, followed by a week each studying Matthew's and Luke's witness to the nativity.

SACRED GROUND

A Film-Based Dialogue Series on Race & Faith

Saint Barnabas's Memorial Episcopal Church & Church of the Messiah will host Sacred Ground Circles this January - June.

Individuals are invited to join small groups (circles) to walk through America's history of race and racism, while weaving in threads of family story, economic class, and political and regional identity.

The 11 session series is built around a powerful online curriculum of documentary films and readings that focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/Pacific American histories as they intersect with European American histories.

Participants are invited to peel away the layers that have contributed to the challenges and divides of the present day – all while grounded in our call to faith, hope and love.
