

EL NIDO TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

For 29 years, the El Nido Transitional Housing Program has served homeless women and children who are fleeing domestic violence. El Nido (Spanish for “The Nest”) provides a nurturing, safe environment and supportive services to help survivors reach new heights.

At El Nido, domestic violence (DV) survivors recover from trauma in a confidential location. Participants spend up to one year working on ending unhealthy family patterns while learning to become self-sufficient. They are supported in this effort by case management, mental/behavioral therapy, job readiness assistance, housing navigation, and childcare. El Nido offers the onsite Enrichment Center, which houses a computer lab, children’s art and music classes, a reading club, and space for resident support groups and volunteer meetings.

In the past year, El Nido served 12 households comprised of 12 mothers and 29 children. Of these 5 households completed the program, and 7 remained in the program. This year’s graduates:

- 100% increased their income and attended financial literacy sessions
- 100% attended individual or group therapy.
- 100% achieved the goals they set with their El Nido Case Manager

To date, El Nido has served over 301 families.

ROTATIONAL SHELTER

The Interfaith Shelter Network relies on the collaborative efforts of diverse faith communities from all across the county. These generous congregations open their doors and share their resources with the unhoused in their neighborhood. Thanks to this amazing network of more than 60 congregations, **79** guests received shelter and meals this winter. Guests also received case management and supportive services from our partners, Family Health Centers of San Diego and Lifeline Community Services.

TOTAL BED NIGHTS: 2,995

In addition to a hospitable community and a cozy bedat night, guests were provided breakfast, a sack lunch, and a hot dinner by volunteers.

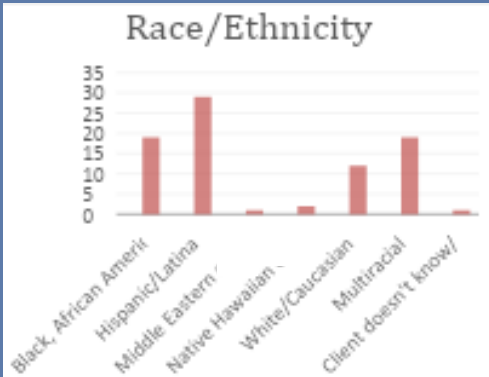
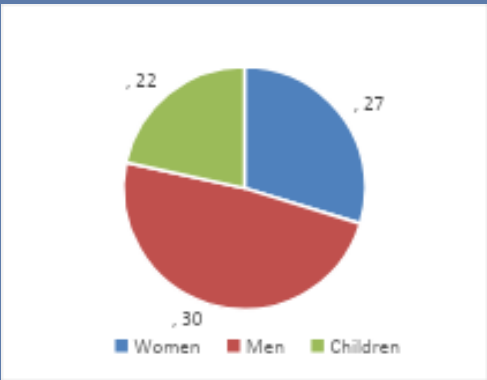
TOTAL MEALS PROVIDED: 8,985

Faith communities are organized into geographic regions so that guests can remain close to work, school, and support systems. The regional branches of the Rotational Shelter included:

- Clairemont
- North County
- San Diego Beaches
- San Diego Inland & East County
- South Bay

DEMOGRAPHICS

The Rotational Shelter follows ISN’s anti-discrimination policy and welcomes people of all backgrounds, traditions, and ages. The program is designed to serve low to low-to-moderate income individuals and families experiencing situational homelessness. Of the **79** guests: 30 were adult men, 27 were adult women, and 22 were children.



WORKSHOPS

The goal of the Rotational Shelter is to help guests move towards self-sufficiency. One way the program achieves this is through offering workshops. During the 40th season, ISN partnered with the National Conflict Resolution Center (NCRC) to provide guests with quality workshops on job development, resume building, interviewing, communication and interpersonal skills, and budgeting.

TOTAL WORKSHOPS: 12

In addition to workshops, volunteers offer support for shelter guests. Below, a member of “Fresh Start,” a UCSD student group, offers a haircut to a guest.



OUTCOMES

- 47 guests exited the shelter to stable housing
- 9 guests secured employment
