Featuring energetic piano and percussion accompaniment, this track can be found on the 2011 album *One in Christ: Hymns of the Month* released by Concordia Publishing House. The hymn itself is a traditional Tanzanian folk song translated by Howard

Olson (1922-2010), a longtime missionary and teacher in Africa who compiled a collection of African songs in *Set Free*, many of which were folk tunes to which Christian Swahili texts were later added. Olson noted that these pieces were sung with "uninhibited improvisation" . . . although we'll be singing just the refrain!

## **Sung Response:** VU 343 – I Love to Tell the Story (v. 1)

Please use the bulletin for this hymn's lyrics, as subsequent verses come from a different source. This text bears striking similarities to "Tell Me the Old, Old Story," since in 1866 Kate Hankey wrote the long poem that serves as the basis of both hymns. William G. Fischer later set the text to music, adding a refrain and publishing the completed hymn in Joyful Songs (1869). The first and last verses are performed by American country music singer-songwriter Alan Jackson on Gaither Music TV. Alan Jackson - I Love To Tell The Story (Live)

<u>Favourite Scripture #1</u>: Luke 18:1-17 (Good News Bible) (shared by Arlene Munro) The Parable of the Widow and the Judge

¹Then Jesus told his disciples a parable to teach them that they should always pray and never become discouraged. ²"In a certain town there was a judge who neither feared God nor respected people. ³And there was a widow in that same town who kept coming to him and pleading for her rights, saying, 'Help me against my opponent!' ⁴For a long time the judge refused to act, but at last he said to himself, 'Even though I don't fear God or respect people, ⁵yet because of all the trouble this widow is giving me, I will see to it that she gets her rights. If I don't, she will keep on coming and finally wear me out!"

<sup>6</sup>And the Lord continued, "Listen to what that corrupt judge said. <sup>7</sup>Now, will God not judge in favour of his own people who cry to him day and night for help? Will he be slow to help them? <sup>8</sup>I tell you, he will judge in their favour and do it quickly. But will the Son of Man find faith on earth when he comes?"

The Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector

<sup>9</sup>Jesus also told this parable to people who were sure of their own goodness and despised everybody else. <sup>10</sup>"Once there were two men who went up to the Temple to pray: one was a Pharisee, the other a tax collector. <sup>11</sup>The Pharisee stood apart by himself and prayed, 'I thank you, God, that I am not greedy, dishonest, or an adulterer, like everybody else. I thank you that I am not like that tax collector over there. <sup>12</sup>I fast two days a week, and I give you one tenth of all my income.' <sup>13</sup>But the tax collector stood at a distance and would not even raise his face to heaven, but beat on his breast and said, 'God, have pity on me, a sinner!' <sup>14</sup>I tell you," said Jesus, "the tax collector, and not the Pharisee, was in the right with God when he went home. For those who make themselves great will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be made great."

### Jesus Blesses Little Children

<sup>15</sup>Some people brought their babies to Jesus for him to place his hands on them. The disciples saw them and scolded them for doing so, <sup>16</sup>but Jesus called the children to him and said, "Let the children come to me and do not stop them, because the Kingdom of God belongs to such as these. <sup>17</sup>Remember this! Whoever does not receive the Kingdom of God like a child will never enter it."

**Hymn Choice #1:** VU 110 – First-born of Mary (repeat several times) (shared by Arlene Munro)

This energetic, rhythmic hymn was composed by John L. Bell in 1998 and is performed by the Wild Goose Worship Group on the 1999 album *There Is One Among Us: Shorter Songs for Worship by John L. Bell.* The recording includes spoken scriptural examples of Jesus as a "provocative preacher" who "inspires and disarms and confuses." First Born of Mary

First-born of Mary, provocative preacher, itinerant teacher, outsider's choice; Jesus inspires and disarms and confuses whoever he chooses to hear his voice.

**Hymn Choice #1:** MV 44 – Shadow and Substance (shared by Arlene Munro) Written in 1989, this hymn can be found on composer Daniel Charles Damon's 2005 album *Like a Child: Songs and Hymns*. You can certainly hear evidence of Damon's extensive jazz performance experience in the accompaniment! This hymnist is represented by an impressive 13 works in *More Voices* alone, including today's Gathering Song and MV 161 "I Have Called You by Your Name." Shadow and Substance

# <u>Favourite Scripture #2</u>: Luke 19:1-10 (NIV) (shared by Frances Quarrington) Zacchaeus the Tax Collector

<sup>1</sup>Jesus entered Jericho and was passing through. <sup>2</sup>A man was there by the name of Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax collector and was wealthy. <sup>3</sup>He wanted to see who Jesus was, but because he was short he could not see over the crowd. <sup>4</sup>So he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore-fig tree to see him, since Jesus was coming that way.

<sup>5</sup>When Jesus reached the spot, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, come down immediately. I must stay at your house today." <sup>6</sup>So he came down at once and welcomed him gladly.

7All the people saw this and began to mutter, "He has gone to be the guest of a sinner."

**Hymn Choice #2:** VU 703 – In the Bulb There Is a Flower (shared by Frances Quarrington)

Earlier this year, Scottish-Canadian tenor John McDermott shared a new video featuring springtime photographs while he sings Natalie Sleeth's beloved 1986 hymn

accompanied by Eric Robertson on piano. McDermott gained popularity with his recording of "Danny Boy" in 1992, after which he decided to pursue a professional career in music and starting touring, first in Canada and then internationally. Hymn Choice #3: VU 232 – Joy, Joyful We Adore You (shared by Margriet Sinclair) This energetic arrangement by Mack Wilberg delivers a bright, brassy introduction to Beethoven's beloved "Ode to Joy" melody. The hymn is sung by the Tabernacle Choir at Temple Square, an ensemble based out of Salt Lake City, Utah, that was founded in 1847 and boasts 360 members. The choir actually predates the hymn's lyrics, which were composed in 1907 by Princeton professor of English literature and Presbyterian clergyman Henry van Dyke.

While the exact origins of this folk song are uncertain, the earliest known version appears in the 1867 collection *Slave Songs of the United States* with the title "The Good Old Way." The most famous recording to date is probably Alison Krauss' featured in the 2000 film *O Brother, Where Art Thou?* Emmett Franz and Katie Peterson of the American family band The Petersens created this beautiful new arrangement, filmed at the Ozark Mill at Finley Farms in Ozark, Missouri. It appears on their 2022 album *My Ozark Mountain Home*.
