A Reading from Our Christian Tradition

Gospel: Luke 12:49-56

12:49 "I have come to cast fire upon the earth, and how I wish it were already ablaze! 12:50 I have a baptism with which to be baptized, and what constraint I am under until it is completed!

12:51 Do you think that I have come to bring peace to the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division!

12:52 From now on five in one household will be divided, three against two and two against three;

12:53 they will be divided: father against son and son against father, mother against daughter and daughter against mother, mother-in-law against her daughter-in-law and daughter-in-law against mother-in-law."

12:54 He also said to the crowds, "When you see a cloud rising in the west, you immediately say, 'It is going to rain," and so it happens.

Reflection: An Unsettling Paradox

Hymn: VU 352 - I Danced in the Morning

Words: Sydney Carter 1963; Music: Shaker melody, adapt. & harm. Sydney Carter 1963
In 1963 English poet, songwriter, and folk musician Sydney Carter wrote these words, setting them to an adapted SIMPLE GIFTS, a Shaker melody dating from the mid-1800s. This tune is generally attributed to Elder Joseph Brackett, although it became much more widely known when it was used in Aaron Copland's ballet score and orchestral work Appalachian Spring. The hymn is performed by Layne Jones and Liam Jones and is accompanied by a diversity of dance footage. Enjoy!

I danced in the morning when the world was begun, I danced in the moon and the stars and the sun, I came from heaven and I danced on the earth; at Bethlehem I had my birth.

Dance, then, wherever you may be; I am the Lord of the dance, said he, and I'll lead you all, wherever you may be, and I'll lead you all in the dance, said he.
