Psalm 46: VU 770, refrain 2

Epistle: Romans 3:19-28

¹⁹Now we know that whatever the law says it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be stopped, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. ²⁰For by works of the law no human being will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin.

²¹But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it – ²²the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: ²³for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, ²⁴and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, ²⁵whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former sins. ²⁶It was to show his righteousness at the present time, so that he might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus.

²⁷Then what becomes of our boasting? It is excluded. By what kind of law? By a law of works? No, but by the law of faith. ²⁸For we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law.

Gospel: John 8:31–36

³¹So Jesus said to the Jews who had believed in him, "If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples, ³²and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." ³³They answered him, "We are offspring of Abraham and have never been enslaved to anyone. How is it that you say, 'You will become free'?"

³⁴Jesus answered them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. ³⁵The slave does not remain in the house forever; the son remains forever. ³⁶So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed."

Hymn: VU 716 (vv. 1, 2, & 4) – My Life Flows On

Words & Music: Robert S. Lowry 1869, alt.

The First-Plymouth Choir and congregation in Lincoln, Nebraska, sing this hymn accompanied by music director Tom Trenney. While *Voices United* attributes both music and lyrics to Robert Lowry, other sources such as Hymnary.org explain that the text first appeared in 1868 in *The New York Observer* with the title "Always Rejoicing" and attributed to "Pauline T.," and then in *The Christian Pioneer* without any attribution. A year later it was included in *Bright Jewels for the Sunday School* with "R.L." (Robert Lowry) acknowledged as composer and the spot for lyricist left blank.
