Words: Eleanor Farjeon 1928; Music: French folk melody; harm. Martin Fallas Shaw 1928 Eleanor Farjeon's Advent carol is performed by the Deller Consort, an ensemble dedicated to historically informed performance who recorded music from as early as the 13th century. The group was formed in 1948 by Alfred Deller (1912-1979), an English countertenor known for his performance of English Renaissance and Baroque music.

Angels, announce with shouts of mirth Christ who brings new life to earth.
Set every peak and valley humming with the word, the Lord is coming.
People, look east and sing today:
Love the Lord is on the way.

Advent Candle Lighting:

Minister: Advent is a season of waiting: waiting for the hope, peace, joy, and love of God to break into our lives anew through the story of the birth of Jesus and through acts of hope, peace, joy, and love. Advent is a season of lighting candles: lighting candles for the hope, peace, joy, and love for which we wait. Today we light the first candle, the candle of hope.

Voice 1: We wait.

We wait

not because we do not know the story of Jesus, and not because you are not already and always here. We wait because to wait is to expect something more.

To wait is to expect that the story might enter our hearts and our world in new ways, to bring the change for which we long.

First reader or a third person lights a purple Advent candle.

Voice 2: As we light the candle of hope, we remember the stories of God with us, when life has been hard, and not what we expected. We can trust that God is with us, as we wait for hope to be born, anew, in us.

Light a candle bright and tall For the Hope within our world; Hope that heard the ages' call As the stars and planets whirled. Shine within our hearts today. Come, O Hope, to us, we pray.

Opening Prayer:

Every second we exist is a gift.
Gone in a whisper,
it will not come again ... So, God of us all,
we come to you and ask that you
help us unwrap it, and teach us to share it,
and call us to cherish it —
this precious life we've been given. Amen.

Hymn: VU 2 – Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus

This 18th-century Advent and Christmas carol was penned in 1744 by hymnwriting powerhouse Charles Wesley and has been set to several different tunes, in our case the 1715 tune STUTTGART from *Psalmodia Sacra*. In the following recording, however, the Scottish ensemble Celtic Worship, founded in 2016, use HYFRYDOL, a 19th-century Welsh tune composed by Rowland Prichard. Readings from Our Christian Tradition

Epistle: Romans 13:11-14 – *Salvation is near; wake from sleep*

13:11 Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is already the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; 13:12 the night is far gone; the day is near. Let us then throw off the works of darkness and put on the armour of light;

13:13 let us walk decently as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in illicit sex and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy.

13:14 Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Gospel: Matthew 24:36-44 – *The sudden coming of salvation*

24:36 "But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father.

24:37 For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man.

24:38 For as in the days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark,

24:39 and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so, too, will be the coming of the Son of Man.

24:40 Then two will be in the field; one will be taken, and one will be left.

24:41 Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken, and one will be left.

24:42 Keep awake, therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. 24:43 But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into.

24:44 Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.

Reflection: In the Darkness, Waiting

Hymn/Carol: VU 5 – All Earth Is Waiting

Words: Catalonian, Alberto Taulé 1972; English translation, Gertrude C. Suppe 1987, alt.; Music: Alberto Taulé 1972

Known as "Toda la Tierra," this Advent hymn was originally composed in Catalonian, the official language of Andorra and of three autonomous communities in Spain. A recording of it appears on the album Flor y Canto third edition, disc 8 (2011), which is part of a collection recorded to accompany the hymnal of the same name that was published by Oregon Catholic Press (first edition in 1989), a hymnal typically utilized by the Hispanic Catholic community for worship services.

Toda la Tierra

- All earth is waiting to see the Promised One, 1 and open furrows await the seed of God. All the world, bound and struggling, seeks true liberty; it cries out for justice and searches for the truth.
- Thus says the prophet to those of Israel, 2 'A virgin mother will bear Emmanuel.' One whose name is 'God with us', our Saviour shall be, through whom hope will blossom once more within our hearts.
- Mountains and valleys will have to be made plain, 3 open new highways, new highways for our God, who is now coming closer, so come all and see, and open the doorways as wide as wide can be.
- In lowly stable the Promised One appeared. 4 Yet, feel that presence throughout the earth today, for Christ lives in all Christians and is with us now; again, on arriving, Christ brings us liberty.

Words: Philip Doddridge 1738, alt.; Music: Thomas Haweis 1792

Bert Polman writes that English Non-conformist pastor Philip Doddridge (1702-1751) wrote some 400 hymn texts, often to accompany his sermons, although not many of them are still in use today. However, his Advent text "Hark the Glad Sound" is still popular and was set to music by Thomas Haweis (1734-1820), a scholar and an ordained minister in the Church of England. This hymn was recorded by the St Olaf Choirs and Orchestra in an arrangement by John Ferguson for inclusion on their 2002 Christmas album *Ris'n with Healing in His Wings*.
