This text was written by Ruth C. Duck (1947-2024), an ordained pastor in the United Church of Christ, a theology professor, and an internationally renowned hymnist. She is particularly upheld as a champion for and developer of inclusive language worship resources, adapting and editing many hymns to facilitate the use of gender inclusive language and writing over 150 of her own hymns. She collaborated with composer and musician Ron Klusmeier on "It's a Song of Praise to the Maker," inspired by Psalm 148. Klusmeier accompanies a pick-up choir during his 2012 tour in the following video — the music begins at 1:38.

Prayer of Approach and Prayer for Grace:

We have flaunted small steps which should have been first steps, preached crisis as distant when it is on our doorstep, and pretended we can still fix it as we destroy Earth of whom we are a part. **ENOUGH!** Strengthen our resolve to do better,

to take steps small and large to heal the earth

and preserve this creation we love.
Forgive our corporate sins of
carelessness and aggression.
Teach us to tell a story
of a ground that is holy!
To sing a song of wide welcome.
To create a place of healing and restoration.

Give up your possessions

14:25 Now large crowds were traveling with him, and he turned and said to them,

14:26 "Whoever comes to me and does not hate father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, yes, and even life itself, cannot be my disciple.

14:27 Whoever does not carry the cross and follow me cannot be my disciple.

14:28 For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not first sit down and estimate the cost, to see whether he has enough to complete it?

14:29 Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it will begin to ridicule him,

14:30 saying, 'This fellow began to build and was not able to finish.'
