Doxologies are short expressions of praise to God, often sung to the Holy Trinity. Written by the 17th-century Anglican bishop and hymnist Thomas Ken, our metrical VU 541 is the best-known English doxology and is a variation on the Latin "Gloria Patri." It is sung by the American Christian vocal quartet Anthem Lights and contemporary Christian vocal trio Selah, both originating from Nashville, Tennessee.
