

Gathering Song: VU 79 (v. 1 & 4) – Arise, Your Light Is Come

The chancel choir and congregation of Trinity Presbyterian Church in Atlanta, Georgia, take this hymn at an energetic pace, led by their organist, who adds interludes between each verse. Composed by William H. Walker in 1872, the tune is appropriately known as FESTAL SONG, and, echoing Isaiah 60:1, Ruth Duck penned the lyrics in 1974.

Prayer for Grace and Assurance of Grace:

We have gathered, surrounded by the light of Christ

and the waters of baptism:

we have nothing to fear from the truth which sets us free.

Let us turn with confidence to the God of grace. Let us pray:

We stand on the banks of the river with you, companion Jesus.

We look at the stream of people moving forward to accept the gift of baptism – and we wonder.

Do they truly understand how completely their lives will be disrupted?

**Are they truly aware of the challenge of living a life of faith
that changes them from the inside out?**

Do they truly welcome the call to never be the same again?

For that matter, O Christ, do we? Do I?

Yet, as we watch those who have received their baptism,

this washing away of what was in order to invite in what *will be*,

we notice the look of transformation that gushes forth in their smiles,

we become aware of the change in their posture and the light that warms their faces.

That's the kind of wholeness for which we yearn.

That's the kind of new life we seek as we share the confessions of our hearts with you, relayed silently within our hearts:

(a time of silent prayer)

Ah, here we are, wrapped within your loving arms of compassion, O Spirit, anticipating your intimate touch through the waters of life –

your cleansing, your renewing, and your equipping of us for life's vagaries.

We imagine the trickles of water over our face, down our back, and into our eyes.

Each trickle maps a path of transformation.

Each trickle becomes a web of strength and of courage.

Each trickle disrupts life as we knew it

to prepare us for the renewed life we will come to know.

As we blink away the trickles from our eyes,

our vision becomes your vision.

We understand now.

You have taken us as we are, O God.

You have summoned out what we shall be.

In baptism, you have set your seal upon our hearts.

Living Christ, do we yet know how completely our lives will continue to change through our baptism?

Perhaps, but *we do* know that you are with us each step of the way – our companion and our guide, the one who taught us to pray,

Lord's Prayer: VU 960 (sung)

This setting of the Lord's Prayer is an example of Anglican chant, where rhythmic notation is approximate, as it meant to imitate speech rhythms. It was first published

in 1774 as part of a group of twenty anonymous chants in English organist Richard Langdon's *Divine Harmony, a Collection in Score of Psalms and Anthems*. If you feel moved to sing along to John Keys' organ solo at home, note that that there is a seven-second introduction.

The Lord's Prayer (Langdon) (Instrumental Version)

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name.
Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses,
as we forgive them that trespass against us.
And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil:
for thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory,
forever and ever. Amen.

Remembering Our Baptism:

The sacrament of baptism proclaims and celebrates the grace of God. By water and the Spirit, we are called, claimed, and commissioned: we are called God's own, welcomed as children of God; we are claimed by Christ, united with Christ, united with one another and the Christian community of every time and place; we are commissioned to Christ's ministry of love, peace, and justice, and strengthened by the Holy Spirit for the work of the church in the world.

Congregational Renewal of Baptismal Faith

At various moments on the journey of our life in Christ, we have opportunity to reaffirm and renew the faith proclaimed in baptism. This is one such moment. As those who have been baptized, we gather to reaffirm the power of the Holy Spirit and to celebrate our place in the people of God. With joy and thanksgiving we celebrate the faith we all share, and rededicate ourselves to the life and work of the body of Christ.

A. Profession of Faith in the Triune God

Do you believe in God, who has created and is creating, who has come in Jesus, the Word made flesh, to reconcile and make new, and who works in us and others by the Spirit?

All: I do, by the grace of God.

B. Commitment to Seek Justice and Resist Evil

Desiring the freedom of new life in Christ, do you seek to resist evil and to live in love and justice?

All: I will, God being my helper.

C. Commitment to Follow the Way of Jesus Christ

Will you follow the way of Jesus Christ?

All: I will, God being my helper.

D. Commitment to the Mission and Ministry of the Church

Will you join with your brothers and sisters in this community of faith to celebrate God's presence, live with respect in creation, and love and serve others?

All: I will, God being my helper.

Congregational Commitment:

As a baptized and baptizing church, will you continue to support and nurture one another within a community that worships God, resists evil, and seeks justice?

All: We will, God being our helper.

Prayer:

Most Holy God, in water, renew us.

In calling, **affirm us.**

In living, **guide us.**

In proclaiming, **strengthen us.**

In faith, **encourage us.**

In trusting, **love us.**

God of power and of love, at his baptism you called Jesus your beloved son and sent your Spirit upon him.

May we, born of water and of the Spirit, know ourselves to be beloved by you. Help us to rejoice in the new life to which you call us. Amen.

Act of Remembrance: (*dip your hand in the water and make the sign of the cross on your hand or forehead*)

Let us remember that we have been marked with a sign that says we are one of Christ's own.

Hymn: VU 442 – Wash Us, God, Your Sons and Daughters (Words for Adult Baptism)

Words: Ruth Duck 1986; Music: attrib. Benjamin Franklin White 1844

Ruth Duck set her touching 1986 lyrics to the well-known hymn tune BEACH SPRING.

Although we'll be singing the words for adult baptism, Oleta Adams performs the version for children's baptism, a recording of which can be found on her 1997 album *Come Walk with Me*. Adams (b. 1953) is an American gospel and soul singer, pianist, and songwriter.

Readings from Our Christian Tradition

Hebrew Scripture: *Isaiah 42:1-9 The servant of God brings justice*

42:1 Here is my servant, whom I uphold, my chosen, in whom my soul delights; I have put my spirit upon him; he will bring forth justice to the nations.

42:2 He will not cry out or lift up his voice or make it heard in the street;

42:3 a bruised reed he will not break, and a dimly burning wick he will not quench; he will faithfully bring forth justice.

42:4 He will not grow faint or be crushed until he has established justice in the earth, and the coastlands wait for his teaching.

42:5 Thus says God, the LORD, who created the heavens and stretched them out, who spread out the earth and what comes from it, who gives breath to the people upon it and spirit to those who walk in it:

42:6 I am the LORD; I have called you in righteousness; I have taken you by the hand and kept you; I have given you as a covenant to the people, a light to the nations,

42:7 to open the eyes that are blind, to bring out the prisoners from the dungeon, from the prison those who sit in darkness.

42:8 I am the LORD; that is my name; my glory I give to no other, nor my praise to idols.

42:9 See, the former things have come to pass, and new things I now declare; before they spring forth, I tell you of them.

Gospel: Matthew 3:13-17 *Christ revealed as God's servant*

3:13 Then Jesus came from Galilee to John at the Jordan, to be baptized by him.

3:14 John would have prevented him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?"

3:15 But Jesus answered him, "Let it be so now, for it is proper for us in this way to fulfill all righteousness." Then he consented.

3:16 And when Jesus had been baptized, just as he came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to him and he saw God's Spirit descending like a dove and alighting on him.

3:17 And a voice from the heavens said, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased."

American composer and music teacher Katherine Kennicott Davis (1892-1980) wrote around 800 pieces, most of which were choral. In this case, she set her 1939 lyrics to the traditional Welsh melody known as ASH GROVE.
