From the Minister's Desk - Finding Joy

I admit it. Sometimes I scroll through the short reels on Facebook (Meta) or YouTube to see if there is anything interesting; in particular, anything uplifting I can share with others. I came across a gem, but can I find it again? The message went something like this: spend 15 minutes on news, and 50 minutes on joy.

The person expounding the importance of joy in this short reel was addressing the current situation in the United States and its effect on the population, leaders in particular. She admitted how easy it is to become anxious and depressed.

When we are worried and anxious, when the things before us seem unknown or out of control, it is difficult to know what the right decision or the right action might be. How do we relax into the moment? How do we let our faith nourish us? How do we trust that God is at work in a world that is full of chaos?

But hasn't the world always, in some place or another, always been a place of chaos and uncertainty, as well as a source of love and joy? The world Jesus lived in was full of political uncertainty and danger – and yet Jesus advises: ²⁵ "Therefore I tell you, do not worry...²⁷ Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life?" And yet, how can we help it? We have work to do, we have responsibilities. How do we balance our concerns and difficulties so that our faith, our spirit, remains strong? How do we live from day to day?

That is the secret really – live from day to day. Take pleasure in accomplishing the little things. Notice what gives you joy. As a matter of fact, seek out what gives you joy. Spend 15 minutes on news and 50 minutes on joy. In other words, be intentional, nourishing your spirit with the gifts in your life, with joy and love.

Joy is listed in Galatians 5:22 as one of the gifts of the Spirit. Joy is not the same is fun (which can be enjoyable). Joy is deeper than that. It is the deep knowing that there is more to life that world events; that what we do every day in the ordinariness of living matters. Joy comes from the faith that somehow, somewhere, someway, things will work for good, even if we can't see it now.

So, practice joy. Practice taking time for what restores and nourishes your spirit, what heals your hearts, what gives you hope. Doing this will give you resilience in difficult times. Doing this will give you the strength and compassion to help those for whom joy is fading.

Spend 15 minutes on news and 50 minutes on joy. To quote C.S. Lewis may you be "surprised by joy."

Throughout August, much of the team's effort was spent in preparing a detailed Request For

Quote/Proposal to these two consultants, which included the history, background and recent undertakings of both churches.

In parallel, work continued on researching, refining and determining the impact of each of the three options (previously explained), to enable the Joint Board to make the best choice that will lead our churches towards discerning and fulfilling our path forward.

We have now received proposals from both consultants and are in the process of evaluating them for completeness, value and potential to meet our requirements. It is expected that the completed presentation will be made to the Joint Board towards the end of September, date to be determined.

We will miss Linda Swance of Kilbride and regret that she has decided to withdraw from the team.

Since we have promised transparency, a team member will always be ready to provide clarification and answer your questions.


Thank You to Guest Musicians

Board Report

As has been the case over the past several months, the Board has been working towards developing a plan for the future of Carlisle United Church. as well as finding common ground between the two churches of the Pastoral Charge.

We had identified four possible options:

- Realignment of the Pastoral Charge. This will involve a separation of the two churches in the Pastoral Charge, with each church going its separate way.
- 2. Hiring a minister to meet the spiritual needs of the two churches as each church deems fit
- 3. Hiring an Interim Intentional Minister.
- 4. Hiring a consulting firm to help us map our path forward

A Transition Team, comprised of members from both churches as well as Region Representatives, has been tasked with exploring these options in terms of the details of each as well as their pros and cons. The Transition Team will be presenting the results of their work to the Joint Board in late September. The two Boards will then make a decision as to how they feel we should proceed and will be making a recommendation to the congregations who will ultimately decide.

The process has been long and not without some set backs, however all of those involved have been solely focused on what they deem to be the best interest of each congregation. We are very fortunate to have had a very talented and dedicated Transition Team who devoted have much time and effort on this. On behalf of the Boards and congregations Thank you!!!!

Flamborough Food Bank

The food bank is supporting more than 400 families. We have made strides this summer to offer more fresh food while reducing the amount of less-than-healthy non-perishable food. This has been a positive change for the food bank and the families who are relying on it for food support.

Our programs were very successful this summer. Our community garden grew beautifully, thanks to our wonderful group of volunteers and Mother Nature. Our "Back to School" program provided 107 Flamborough children with school backpacks and supplies.

We look forward to fall and its change of season. Our Thanksgiving hampers will be given out on **October 1 and 8**. We will begin

registration for our Secret Santa programs on **November 1**.

We are excited about the many food drives happening in our community. Our most needed items are:

Finance Comments

A BIG THANK YOU to our volunteers from the church and community for their help with our several fundraising events. Fundraising receipts to date are \$30,500, generating a net profit of \$15,200. The Chicken Dinner at the end of May was a great success again this year. We have three more events this fall. The church donated \$200 to the Flamborough Food Bank from the net proceeds of the Heeley and the Mothballs concert. Earlier in the year we donated \$450 from the net proceeds of our fertilizer sale.

To the end of August, envelope and PAR givings were \$46,442, a 4.8% increase over last year. The increase is primarily a result of donations made by the Freed family, including financial support for the Butterfly Habitat. Mission and Service donations were \$5,391, down 1.4%. Rental income is \$18,375 which is \$1,200 greater than last year, thanks to two elections. For the first eight months of the year, total revenue was \$116,000. Total expenses were \$132,700 which is much less than last year due to lower staff compensation and property maintenance costs. The net result is a deficit of \$16,700.

Our mutual fund investments have performed very well (so far) during these uncertain times. The \$7,500 grant received from Ontario's Anti-Hate and Protection fund is being spent on three projects: 3 new surveillance cameras, motion sensor lights facing the cemetery and a cyber-security assessment with installation of advanced wireless network. These projects need to be completed before October 31, 2025.

Looking ahead, to achieve our 2025 givings budget of \$88,000, we need an additional \$41,500 donated in the remaining four months of the year. It's the United Church of Canada's 100th Anniversary, so let's try to achieve 100% of our budget givings. Also, please keep our church in mind when considering "Legacy Giving". Thank you.

World War I Memorial Plaques

In June, the Church received a call about the deteriorating condition of the WWI plaques on our Cemetery gates. The caller, John (Jake) Ireland, is a descendant of (Samuel) Harry Green, one of the nearly illegible names on the worst plaque. Mr. Ireland kindly offered to assist with the cost of restoring these stones.

The Trustees engaged Al Ernest, a local historical monument specialist, to see what could be done. These plaques display lead letters on a granite background. Al suggested that they have been treated with inappropriate chemicals at various times in the past. The letter "R" was missing from the name Warner, a very tricky restoration involving creation by hand of a new lead letter, and the stones were very discoloured.

Al completed the restoration of the two plaques in September. His description of the work is quite interesting:

"In addition to filling the 2 holes in the mortar I repointed a few other small areas. Replacing the "R" was challenging as it seems like someone did an acid wash on the tablet at some point (this would explain why the granite is so rough and pitted). The holes which the lead gets hammered into were too rounded for the normal process so I had to improvise - not ideal but better than the missing R I think. I was not happy with the initial cleaning, so I did another treatment with a different product today, which improved the results. There is still a bit of yellowish staining on the top part of the left hand tablet, which may be a remnant of some kind of sealant that was applied at some point. None of the approved products for historic monuments (I used 3) are able to remove this completely. I noticed some similar staining on the marble tablets located on each side of the front door to the church. I also cleaned these (No charge) and they have brightened up, although not perfect."
