An Advent Letter

Hello Dear Friends,

In the early church, the faithful gathered in the weeks coming up to the great feasts of the church and wondered, was this the year that He would return? Over the years, the urgency of our expectation has dulled. But we are waiting, with a longing, an urgency that has not dulled. Along with the whole wide world, not just those who follow the creed of Christ, we are waiting. Waiting to be able to gather in our Happy Holidays in the coming weeks for the 14 faith groups who celebrate different types of gatherings. Longing to embrace old friends from church. Longing to embrace children, grandchildren, mothers, fathers and friends. Longing for touch. Longing for freedom. Longing to be unmasked, for us to uncover our faces, as we long for God to uncover Her face to us.

This sense of urgency gives us lens into the longing and purpose of the church. In the months that we have been apart, we have had another kind of pandemic in our pastoral community. I have had 20 funerals (not all connected to this pastoral charge) since August. It has reminded me, in a somewhat exhausting way, that we people of faith have one foot in faith in this world, striving to bring the kin-dom of God to the world around us, and another one promising the kin-dom of God, in eternity, in a world or worlds to come.

I hope that we are able to gather meaningfully this Advent. I look forward to Advent wreaths and Christmas candles, to carols and songs, to the Bethlehem Experience – an outdoor walk through the Christmas Story. I look forward to our Blue Christmas service and to the relief of proclaiming His birth and the expectation that this will come. I hope that we can gather together. That we can at least bow and wish each other well across the social distance. I hope that you can gather with those you love, as I gather with Larry and my girls this Christmas with the grandchildren. But we do not know, so we hope and wait, hope and wait. And as I think about the funerals, those who have gone elsewhere, whom we hold in our hearts, I hope and wait, hope and wait.

This confession of my faith is, I know, a collective confession of our faith. I am blessed to be amongst you. This has been a challenging time to start a new pastoral relationship, where we have hoped and waited together and I want to take this opportunity to thank you for how we have hoped and waited together, for your grace and caring. It is what one needs as one hopes and waits – comfort, caring and kindness. May we reflect these gifts that we have amongst each other to our broader communities, regardless of their creed and may we create a space in our hoping and waiting for Their Coming in this place.

Our first paper shredding event was a big success. Held on Saturday October 2 from 10 to 1, we welcomed many vehicles with large and small loads of items for shredding. The Papersavers organization did a fine job of moving folks through. Thanks to the volunteers who looked after traffic directing, collecting funds, unloading containers for shredding and collapsing boxes. Special mention should be made of the younger volunteers whose boundless energy made our work so much easier. Profit for the event was approximately \$2,100. We are keen to offer another shredding event early next Fall.

Drive Thru Chicken Dinner

Our first drive thru chicken dinner was held on Saturday September 18 from 4:30 to 6:30. It was a total sell-out, with 306 dinners preordered on the website or by phone. Profit for the event was approximately \$3,700. Some leftovers were sold and others were donated to the Flamborough Food Bank. Huge thanks to the many volunteers who prepared food, assembled dinners, coordinated advertising, ticket sales and parking lot traffic, and the many other behind-the-scenes jobs that ensured the success of this fund-raiser. We were particularly proud that all of our packaging was biodegradable!



Bethlehem Experience!

The Christmas story will come to life at Carlisle United Church on Sunday December 19 from 2 to 4 pm. Several local churches were in conversation last year about joining forces to organize this outdoor installation, but plans were halted due to pandemic restrictions. This year, however, preparations have resumed!

You will be invited to contact the Church to book a time slot for your family to visit the installation. Expect to park your vehicle in the lot and walk around to five different stations set up in the field behind the Church. Each carload will be personally led by a Church volunteer who will guide your journey to Bethlehem and maintain social distancing between groups. There will be volunteers in costume, constructed sets, acting, music, cookies... and you are likely to meet angels and shepherds, wise ones, and even the Holy Family along the path.

We are so excited to be able to join with other local churches to offer this joyful community event this December, in accordance with government health and safety guidelines, and to share the wonder of the Christmas story in an engaging and interactive way. This year the Artisan & Vendor sale will be in the Christian Education room and will be offering milk bag purses, scrimshaw work, quilted items, stained glass, painted items, jewellery, hand creatures and lavender products. This is only a partial list and can change at any time.

The U.C.W. Christmas Bazaar will be in the Gathering Room. This year we have both Deli and craft items. Our Deli items include pies, light & dark Christmas cakes, Christmas puddings, two kinds of quiche, cabbage rolls (4 or 2 per package), two varieties of tarts, chocolate-coated caramel corn, squares, cookies and tea biscuits. So far, we have 20 kinds of jams & jellies and 9 varieties of pickles & relishes. Last year your generous support of the Wesley Christmas Store enabled 2,764 Holiday Hampers and 5,000 emergency meals a week to be provided for those in the community who required this support, and also shelter from the cold for many.

Due to COVID, the program will again not operate as a store this season. Clients will be submitting wish lists with help from Wesley staff and their community partners. Hampers will be delivered in accordance with COVID rules.

Students and the staff at Kilbride Public School are looking forward to their Wesley food drive where math skills of graphing, calculating and weighing are applied in a real-life assistance endeavour. The classes work diligently and enthusiastically with parents' assistance to "weigh in".

Carlisle's Mitten Tree will be ready on **November 21** for your contributions of warm mitts, gloves, hats and scarves. Your generous donations have filled the front pews beside the tree for many years now. These will be delivered to Pioneer United Church on

December 12 after Church, for inclusion in the hampers. Please consider contributing again as the Farmer's Almanac has predicted a stormy December and January!

Finance Update

This year has been very difficult for all of us. Due to COVID, we have missed gathering with friends, family and our church family. Its also taken a toll on our church finances.

Our Givings to the end of October are \$54,270, down \$13,400 or 20% compared to last year. This decline was partially offset by our various fundraising events which netted \$11,300 profit and by the Government wage subsidy programs. Our expenses are comparable to last year and in-line with budget. The deficit at October 31 is \$25,000, about \$4,000 greater than last year. On a positive note, Mission & Service donations are 16% greater than last year.

Looking ahead to the remainder of our fiscal year, to achieve our annual Givings budget of \$97,000 we need to receive a total of \$42,700 in November and December – a significant goal. The wage subsidy programs have now ended, so we can't count on that income to offset our Givings shortfall.

As we enter Advent and the season of giving, we ask you to consider a year end top-up of your offerings to help close the gap to our budget.

THANK YOU for your support in 2021 and I trust you will continue your generosity in 2022.

History Is Alive in Carlisle and Kilbride

Carlisle received a treat this Remembrance Sunday (November 7) when, following Rev. Allison Playfair's beautiful litany calling for and committing to nurturing peace, Arlene Munro took to the microphone to share a wartime story of personal significance. She told the story of Arthur Penfold, an English "home child" who immigrated to Canada at the age of nine in order to learn and work as a farm labourer, having been placed with Arlene's family in Carlisle. Arthur, whose name appears on a commemorative plaque here at Carlisle United, later returned to Europe to serve in WWI after enlisting as a soldier at age seventeen.

I'd like to thank Arlene for her storytelling ministry, which not only gave listeners the opportunity to reflect on the sacrifices many have made and are currently making to uphold human rights and to nurture peace, but also gave us the opportunity to explore our own church and community history. Arlene's carefully crafted presentation was accompanied by a series of photographs demonstrating the depth of her research and her passion for history. This generous gift of story was so engaging and meaningful, reminding us that the Roll Call of Honour is not simply a list of names, but a tribute to that small but significant group of community members who put their lives on hold to help bring about peace in the world.

This memorable Remembrance Sunday comes on the heels of several other significant historical projects in Carlisle and Kilbride. As unveiled in the last newsletter, Arlene's and Cathy Moulder's publication *Carlisle United Church: Memorial Stained Glass Windows* has been released from the printer, and I am so happy I put my order in for a copy! The book celebrates the sanctuary's wealth of stained glass in a series of stunning photographs accompanied by details about the windows' religious symbolism and information about the people being remembered. Congregation members generously shared family

photographs and memories, helping to make the stories even more intimate and meaningful. It is a joy to learn so many new and interesting things about the sanctuary I visit and the people I see each week.

Community history also continues to be collected, valued and shared by the Kilbride History Group, which was founded in 2019 and meets monthly at Kilbride United Church. If you have a moment or three, check out their webpage at kilbridehistory.com - I've been enjoying reading everything from recollections of long-time residents to information on wool processing in the nineteenth century and, more recently, articles on the dedication bench for Marianne Schuett and on Kilbride United's 161st anniversary, which was celebrated just last month. In addition, on August 8 the Kilbride History Group organized a guided historic walking tour of the village as part of Heritage Week for the City of Burlington. I remain hopeful that similar events might be organized in the future – I will be an eager attendee!

This November, as we remember and honour those who have served, sacrificed, and continue to work for justice and peace, we also remember and celebrate the richness of our own church and community heritage. Expanding our knowledge of our past will only continue to increase our understanding of our present, and will allow us to better strive for right relations with all.

Logistics Committee



Carlisle United Church Memorial Stained Glass Windows


