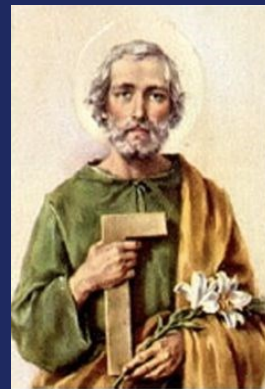

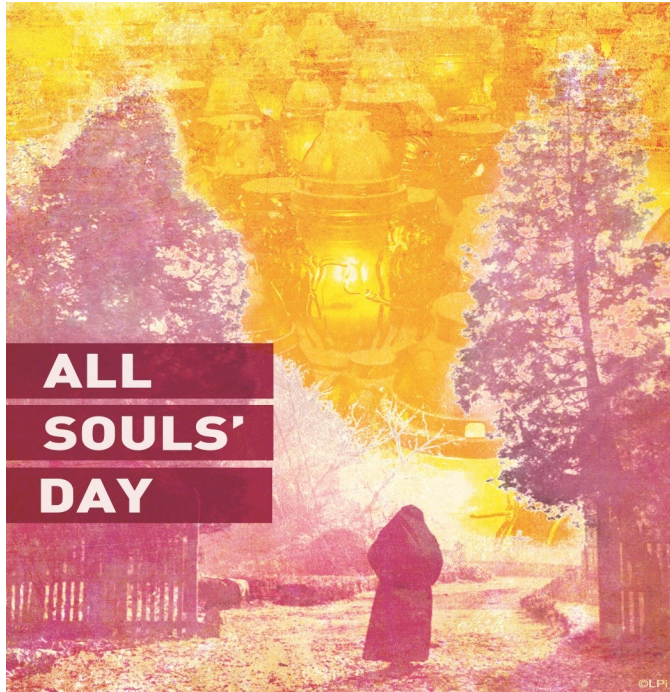

A gift never lost

An 18th century gravestone in an old Maine cemetery is engraved with this prayer:

*We seem to give him back to thee, dear Lord,
[you] who gavest him to us.
Yet as Thou didst not lose him in giving,
so too, we have not lost him
by his return to you.*

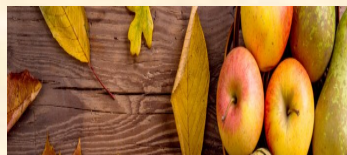
Those who erected that stone to their departed loved one grasped two important understandings of the Christian perspective of death: that in every life, God reveals his love to all humanity, and for the good of every life we give thanks; and that despite the loss of those we love, the good they did in their time among us lives on in the good they inspire us to do. The words on that gravestone were composed by the great seventh century English theologian and historian Saint Bede. This is the rest of Saint Bede's prayer:

*Not as the world gives do you give, O God.
What you give you do not take away.
For what is yours is also ours.
We are yours and life is eternal.
And love is immortal,
and death is only a horizon,
and a horizon is but the limit of our sight.*

Our lives are a gift, given not only to us but to those whose lives we touch. We are the manifestation of God's love: God makes his love present to all in our love for one another. In death, we give back to God what God has given to us with the hope that what we have made of our lives is a fitting expression of gratitude to our Maker. Today's commemoration of All Souls confronts us with the sobering inevitability of death and the pain of taking leave of this life and those we love — but we know that we live always in the promise of Easter's empty tomb, that every step we walk on this earth is guided by the light of the Risen One. Today we remember the souls of our loved ones who have gone before us to the dwelling place of God. As we hold tightly to our memories of them on this All Souls Day, may we seek for one another what they were for us: the "immortal" love and compassion of God in our midst — the God who lives "beyond the horizon."

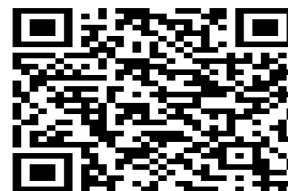

support the administration and ministries of the
Diocese.
2. Our parish is assessed a 15.67% of the church's yearly
income which is paid monthly to the Diocese of San

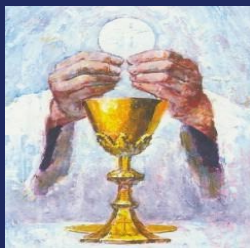

Liturgical Life

(PRACTICING) CATHOLIC

Mini Reflection: I imagine the hand of God writing me into existence — *she lived, she died* — using for ink the very dirt that fills my grave. The dust from which I was created.

The Semicolon

My grave is in the corner of a cemetery in rural southeastern Wisconsin. For at least a mile in every direction, all you can see is farmland — cows, barns and quiet country roads. It's beautiful, serene. I imagine the hand of God writing me into existence — *she lived, she died* — using for ink the very dirt that fills this grave. The dust from which I was created.

Surrounding my grave are the burial plots of other family members — Rachel, Georgiana, Julian, Josephine. I visit the cemetery to pray for them, knowing they are there, but also not there. And when I visit their graves, I stand on my own. I look out at the tree-lined horizon and the farmland. I think of how, in a thousand years, none of this will be here. But I will be here, God's hand paused against the page, preparing to write the rest of the story not in dirt but in his own blood. For Christ does not lose anything of what the Father has given him.

Not a soul. Not a bone. Not a lock of hair.

She lived, she died; she lived again. No longer is there a period after the words *she died* but instead a semicolon. And the semicolon is the grave, that mystical place where the Blood mixes with the dust of the earth, where life meets death, and then meets life again. And the story continues.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

What do Catholics believe about the resurrection of the dead?

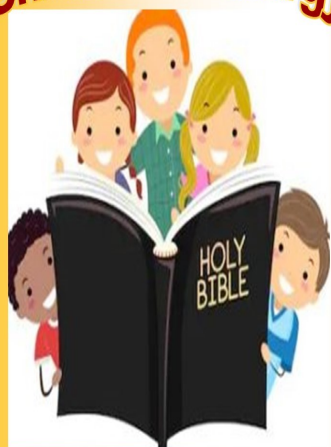
Answer:

Every Sunday, we proclaim in the Creed that we believe “in the resurrection of the body.” Does that mean Christ's resurrection or our own? Both! Jesus' resurrection is part of the work of salvation, but it's also a sign of what's to come. While death separates our bodies and our souls, this was not the intention of God when He first created us. It's an effect of original sin. At the end of time, our bodies and our souls will be reunited.

Scientifically, we may have questions about this, since bodies decompose over the course of centuries. Or what about the saints, whose relics are spread around the earth? How the resurrection will happen is a mystery. But we know that our resurrected body will be our body. If we are in heaven, our body will be in a glorified state. Some theologians speculate what this glorification will be like based on Jesus' resurrected body. Will we be able to walk through walls? Will we eat, since Jesus broke bread with his disciples? We don't really know the answers to these questions. We do know, however, that we will be free from the effects of the fall (such as sickness and pain) and physical defects that occurred in life. Christ redeems us as whole persons, body and soul!

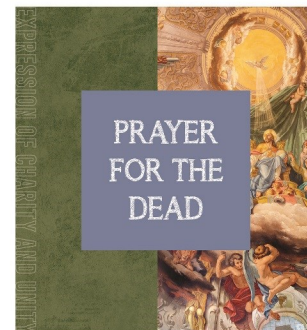
