





In Jewish folklore, there's a beautiful story about the place where the great temple in Jerusalem was built.

According to the legend, two brothers had adjoining farms. One older brother was married and had a family; the younger brother lived alone. When the harvest came, the younger brother said to himself, "My brother has a wife and children and many responsibilities. I'll help him by giving part of my harvest to his family." So, in the middle of the night, he slipped into his brother's house and secretly filled his brother's bins with grain from his own harvest.

Meanwhile, the married brother had a similar thought: "My brother has no wife or children and leads a very lonely life. He has no one to care for him in the winter of his days. I'll take some of my grain and add it to his harvest so he will never be in need." And so, during the night, the older brother secretly filled his brother's bin with grain from his bounty.




And on the spot where the brothers embraced, God directed that the altar of his temple be built.

We say the Rosary for all your prayer requests every Sunday at 7:30 am in the church. Please, come and join us, all are welcomed!



THE DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN BASILICA

Today marks the anniversary of the dedication of the cathedral church of Rome, on land owned by the Laterani family, by Pope St. Sylvester I (31 Dec.). 9 Nov. 324; honored as the episcopal seat of the pope as bishop of Rome; according to an inscription which Pope Clement XII (1730-1740) placed there, this church is the "mother and head of all churches of Rome and the world" ("omnium ecclesiarum Urbis et Orbis mater et caput"); residence of the popes from the 4th c. until their moving to Avignon (1309); site of five ecumenical councils; Pope Innocent X commissioned the present structure in 1646; beneath its high altar rests the remains of the small wooden table on which, according to tradition, St. Peter celebrated Mass; dedicated to the Savior, later to John the Baptist.

Why do we do that?

Question:

Can Catholics be cremated?

Answer:


As the practice of cremation becomes more and more common, it's important to know what the Church asks of families who have chosen this for a loved one who has died.


As the US Bishops observe on their website, "Ideally, if a family chooses cremation, the cremation would take place some time after the Funeral Mass, so that there can be an opportunity for the Vigil for the Deceased in the presence of the body." However, if cremation takes places before the Funeral Mass, the cremated remains can be present at the Funeral Mass and the appendix to the *Order of Christian Funerals* provides adaptations for the texts and rituals that are part of the Funeral Mass and the Committal.

The primary concern is that the cremated remains should be treated with the same respect given to any human remains. The *Order of Christian Funerals* instructs, "This includes the use of a worthy vessel to contain the ashes, the manner in which they are carried, and the care and attention to appropriate placement and transport, and the final disposition. The cremated remains should be buried in a grave or entombed in a mausoleum or columbarium. The practice of scattering cremated remains on the sea, from the air, or on the ground, or keeping cremated remains on the home of a relative or friend of the deceased are not the reverent disposition that the Church requires" (no. 417).

It is becoming more and more common for parishes or diocesesponsored cemeteries to include columbaria to house cremated remains in a way that respects Church teaching, allowing family and friends the opportunity to honor the remains of the one they have lost with dignity, reverence, and care.

Simbang Gabi, Explained!

Simbang Gabi is a Filipino tradition through which Advent expectation realizes the fulfillment of Christmas joy. During Simbang Gabi, early morning Masses are offered over a series of nine days leading up to Christmas. Celebrations follow Mass, where delicacies like baked rice cakes and breakfast rolls are enjoyed.

Traditionally, Simbang Gabi Masses are held before dawn, a practice that originated in the 17th century in the Philippines when most of the faithful had to work the rest of the day in the fields.


During Mass, the priest wears white vestments and the *Gloria* is sung, a practice for which the Holy See has given special permission. Traditionally, the nine-day sequence ends with Midnight Mass on Dec. 24.

The tradition has been adapted to fit the needs of Filipino communities throughout the world, and the Masses might not even be offered in the morning at all, but in the afternoon or evening.


