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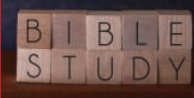

Today's readings bring out the theme of life and focus on two themes of the readings: justice and welcome.

The promised Messiah brings justice. The first reading and the psalm indicate that this involves "deciding aright for the land's afflicted." It means that the negative "judgment" imposed upon some, whereby they are deemed less worthy of protection or of other human goods, is reversed. Now, with right judgment, their dignity is recognized and they are treated accordingly. This justice is accompanied by peace. "There shall be no harm or ruin..." The obvious application to the culture of death in our day is that the coming of the Messiah, the preparing of the way of the Lord, the making straight of his paths, and the demands of repentance involve restoring the rights of all who are marginalized, most notably the unborn and the disabled.

Closely connected to this theme of justice is the theme of "welcome," stressed by St. Paul in the second reading. "Welcome one another as Christ welcomed you." Welcome means that we recognize the dignity of the other person and make room for that person whether that person was anticipated or not, planned or not, convenient or not. This stands in contrast to the concept of "wantedness." When someone is "wanted," they meet some need or expectation of somebody else, and the temptation is to think that their value rises and falls with their degree of "wantedness." Welcome, on the other hand, recognizes that their value is intrinsic to them. They are welcomed whether we want them or not. While some (like Planned Parenthood) say "Every child a wanted child," we say, "Every child (and every person) a welcome child."

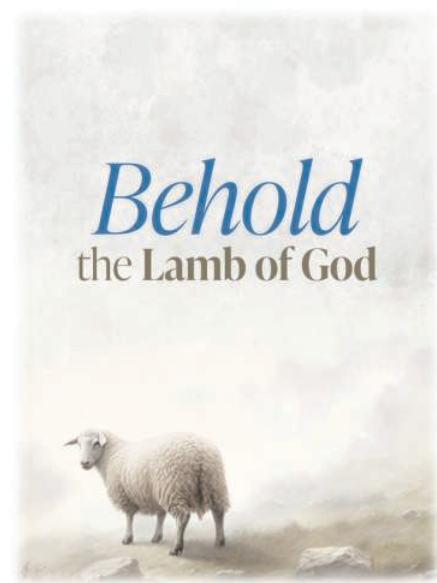

Churchill and Our Readings From Scripture

Reflection by Rev. Leonard N. Peterson

Shortly after the first Allied victory in 1942, coming after several defeats, the great Sir Winston Churchill, Prime Minister of England, analyzed the victory this way: "Now this is not the end. It is not even the beginning of the end. But it is perhaps the end of the beginning."



I have long been an admirer of the great man's clever use of the English language. This one came to mind in the light of today's Scripture choices. They are each about beginnings. That means they can provide a game plan for our spiritual lives. Here we are, very soon from the beginning of the new calendar year. A fitting time to take a turn for the better is it not?

The First Reading speaks of the God's choice of Isaiah as the leader of the twelve tribes. This came while the prophet was still in his mother's womb.

The Second Reading finds us hearing St. Paul's belief that he will inaugurate the mission to bring the gospel to the non-Jewish world.

Finally, we have in the Gospel passage what we could call Our Lord's mission inauguration, when John the Baptist publicly acknowledges Jesus as "the Lamb of God." This title clearly points to Our Lord's mission as a suffering Servant.

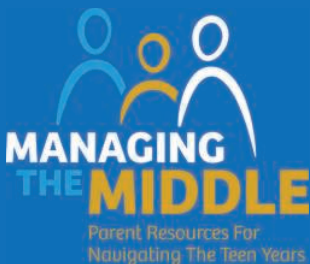
All this talk of beginnings acts as an incentive for starting over my attempt to live as Christ would have us do.

Let us face facts. For the majority of us, this choice for Christ involves a struggle. Checking out the stories of our great saints proves that none of them had it easy. Both John the Baptist and St. Paul offer the proof. How often they may have asked themselves: "Is this the beginning of the end, or the end of the beginning?"

We must remember that every time we decide for Christ, perhaps to eliminate a bad habit of sin, the devil will "up his game." He hates our efforts to grow close to Christ. But each time we succeed, we can make a victory claim. The end of the beginning.

An anonymous someone identified our struggle with a quotation of his own: "One half of our problems come from wanting our own way. The other half come from getting it."

God love you and give you, His peace.

It's five years since Bishop Frank Caggiano came to Our Lady of Fatima parish on Aug. 15, 2020 to bless and dedicate our Philip Tai Lauria Memorial/Prayer Garden. It is inspiring to see people come by to remember in prayer family members and friends whose names have been inscribed on the granite plaques and pavers placed on and around the cruciform structure.

In his comments that day, the Bishop described the memorial as "a garden of dedication and remembrance," calling it "a great gift" to the parish.

The garden is a spiritual oasis in the midst of a busy community. Benches on either side of the structure provide comfort to those who use the space as a place to reflect and pray.
