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Closure of The Spotlight

First we'll get the really bad news out of the way. The Leader of Broxbourne Borough Council, Lewis Cocking, has announced

that the Spotlight will be closed until Autumn 2021, in order to save money. Current staff will be made redundant.

The venue is one of the largest north of the Thames, hosting all kinds of professional entertainment, including films and relayed NT and RSC productions, as well as regular community activities, amateur theatre and meetings and its closure will have a substantial impact on local life in general and many of BArts' groups in particular.

U3As Both Broxbourne and Lea Valley U3As hold their main Learn, laugh, live monthly meetings at the Spotlight, with average attendances hovering around 150-200, and there just isn't anywhere else with a similar capacity.

The Arts Society, East Herts' monthly lecture meetings are also affected.

Three of BArts' popular, long established events, Let's Do Lunch, My Kind of Music and Behind the Scenes, which help to provide a modest income and



attract supporters, are also in jeopardy. We considered trying to offer 'virtual' presentations of the lunch themes via Zoom, during the current pandemic, but are aware that it's the informal, social atmosphere, interaction with the audience and small details that contribute so much to the success and couldn't be replicated effectively on screen. We will continue to investigate the possibility of a suitable alternative venue.

Of course, the Spotlight exhibition space was already lost last September, after the refurbishment of the bar, and finding a similar alternative has, so far, proved impossible.

There are fears that the Spotlight may never re-open and an on-line petition already has nearly 5,000 signatures. Please add yours!
