Joy Spriggs, founded Jason Theatre School in 1951 and from then until she was 80 dedicated her life to the school, its pupils and the arts, Her granddaughter, Lauren, and co-principal, Tracey, took over when Joy retired. Joy is now 90 and very proud of what Lauren and Tracey have achieved

First classes took place in Joy's front room, then moved to St. James's Church Sunday School on Enfield Highway. Joy was *thrilled* when 58 pupils responded to the ad in the local paper and paid just 2s 6d for their hour's lesson!

As the school grew, 'Miss' Joy, as she was known, took her classes to Trinity Church in Enfield town, where they continue to this day! When she moved to Broxboune in the 70's, she started classes at Wormley Scout Hut and these are *also* still running today.

With branches in Broxbourne, Hoddesdon and Enfield, the school has always offered exceptional training in ballet, tap, modern, national, jazz, singing and acting and many local families have been part of the magic! Thousands of pupils have been through its doors and second and third generations of past pupils have joined the Jason Family!

Over 70 years, the school's success stories have produced A-list celebrities, choreographers, West End performers, ISTD examiners, teachers and more— an array of talent to be justly proud of. However, *every* Jason pupil is seen as a star, and proved even more so during the world pandemic.

The school has had to fight to *survive* these difficult times and could not have done it without the support of the pupils, families and staff. The children have always been the driving force behind all of their decisions and they have done their best to keep them motivated, mentally and physically through these strange times! They hope that, subject to regulations, they will be able to run face-to-face classes for the Summer Term and cannot *wait* to see them all to celebrate this Platinum Anniversary of Jason Theatre School! Here's to the future of arts and the *next* 70 years!


The Survival of the Fittest

# <mark>u3a</mark>

**The U3A** started in Toulouse, France, in 1973 as an extra-mural activity at the Faculty of Social Sciences. Since then, it has spread all over the world, with various modifications to suit circumstance and need.

"The 'third age' is defined as a time in your life when you have the opportunity to undertake learning for its own sake, unrestricted by the needs of full-time employment or raising a family. There is no minimum age.

**U3** The term 'university' may be misleading ,or off

-putting. There are no educational requirements, no compulsory activities or 'tests', it is simply an opportunity to pursue a subject or activity that interests you, in the company of like-minded people. Subjects can range from Astronomy and History to Pub Lunches and Knit and Natter. A recent publicity slogan **'Learn, Laugh, Live'** attempts to encapsulate the aims.

#### The University of the Third Age—an international organisation

The organisation has just changed its logo from bold capitals **U3A** to lower case **u3a**, which is believed to be more 'modern', in an attempt to attract a younger membership.

In spite of its worldly success, there is still a feeling that the u3a's profile isn't strong enough and too many people have never *heard* of it, or have misconceptions about it. With this in mind, there will be a **National u3a day on June 2nd** and the Borough of Broxbourne's three branches—**Broxbourne, Cheshunt and Lea Valley**— are planning some special events and activities to demonstrate what they can offer, especially to the elderly and people living alone.

The National u3a is already receiving information about what some branches will be getting up to which includes flash mobs, walking cricket matches, planting flowerbeds and yarn-bombing! (**obviously growing old <u>dis</u>-gracefully!**)

Lea Valley U3A was the *first* to be established in the borough, in 1992, so now nearly 30 years old. Broxbourne U3A became a 'splinter' group when Lea Valley's membership reached bursting point. Both groups usually meet at the Spotlight. Cheshunt U3A was formed some time later, preferring to meet in Cheshunt's Wolsey Hall. Some members belong to more than *one* group, to be with friends, or to pursue a particular activity.

#### Bad News for Mayhem Theatre Arts and The GO Hub.

Plans for additional housing in Goff's Oak and a possible replacement of the Village Hall have been 'on the back burner' for some time. The building had not been well maintained by the Borough



of Broxbourne prior to Mayhem's take-over in 2017, under the new name the GO Hub, and problems with the roof and asbestos have been of increasing concern recently.

**Public Consultation?!** In the second week of March, BArts was made aware by one of its group members that a consultation document relating to the GO Hub had been produced on *February 22nd* and the *final* date for responses was March 18th! It was subsequently revealed that Mayhem knew *nothing* about the document, nor did some of the regular users of the venue. They had somehow been *left out* of the process. A consultation that *excludes* key interested parties would appear to be seriously flawed.

**BArts' Response** BArts managed to produce a quick, official response to the proposed plans, which have an emphasis on sport.

**Proposed Plan Details** Entrance Foyer/ small café, Kitchen, Meeting Room Main Hall 13m x 23m,Equipment Store, Female Toilets (4 cubicles) Male Toilets,Disabled toilet + Baby Changing facility, Office + Boiler room etc.

There are *no plans* to include a stage or dressing rooms, which have been an important feature of the current building. This would be a *backward* step, rather than an *improvement*, and a huge disappointment to some of the hall's regular hirers, who used to use Wolsey Hall in Cheshunt until it closed in 2017, prior to demolition.

De-mountable staging and temporary imported sound and lighting in a sports hall atmosphere would be a poor substitute. Currently, at least *one* of BArts' groups uses a venue in *Harlow* for small theatre facilities. **GO Hub Closure?** Worse news was to follow for Mayhem. The roof is now considered *unsafe*, but money will *not* be allocated for the work, in view of the proposed re-building, so the GO Hub is unlikely to reopen when the Covid restrictions are lifted. This will result in a considerable loss of income for Mayhem and the loss of a job for the hall manager.

With the recommendations of the Spotlight's consultation report still not published and the re-opening date still vague because of asbestos removal and other repairs, the rest of this year doesn't look too bright for local performing arts. Hertford Theatre is scheduled to close for major refurbishment and *improved* facilities in the summer, so *two* vital venues will be out of action.

# Sports provision in Broxbourne is far greater than for the Arts .

Data from the Arts Council 'Active Lives' Survey 2015-2017 suggested that 52.2% of adults (16+) in England attended an event, performance or festival involving creative, artistic, dance, theatrical or music activity in the twelve months prior to interview.

#### Broxbourne was subsequently listed

among the areas where involvement in the Arts


is significantly *below* the national average. We have the John Warner Sports Centre, the Laura Trott Sports Centre and the Lea Valley White Water Centre, but not *one* building is dedicated to the Arts



Nationally, Arts and Culture contribute billions to the economy and have been highly successful in regenerating areas of deprivation.

Ed. There have been *four* local campaigns in the last thirty years, but there has been little improvement in the provision for arts. It is mainly the strong *voluntary* arts sector that has kept culture alive in the borough.





#### **BROXBOURNE CHORUS** Plans for September 2021

Broxbourne Chorus began in January 2012 as a new community SATB choir for adults and students age 16+. It will resume in September in the Music Centre at the new Broxbourne School.

The choir has worked under several names over the past 40 years and we are looking forward to September 12 when we can begin our Monday evening rehearsals 7.30-9.30.

The choir has a repertoire which includes many of the great and best-known partsongs, madrigals and motets from the 16th and 17th centuries, to choruses and complete works from the 18th to 20th centuries and to more or less anything which has become available to choirs in the last 30 years.
