

A Day To Celebrate! Lowewood Museum is re-opening on Saturday, July 17th.

After the successful campaign by the Friends of Lowewood and hundreds of other local supporters and eleven months of negotiations under the guidance of a museum consultant, the museum is now a charity with a board of trustees, some funding in place and the outline of a three-year programme of events under the heading 'Your Heritage, Your Museum', The emphasis will be on community interests and involvement

..... So the first event is focused on pubs and local breweries (!) and an exhibition of old photographs and objects, *plus* some recent paintings by local artists. At least two of Hoddesdon's pubs date back to the C15 / C16 and several others in Cheshunt and Waltham Cross can boast of more than a hundred years of trade.

Trustees have been meeting volunteers at the museum to discuss the exciting new possibilities for the community and a project 'Heritage Broxbourne', involving the CVS, is already underway.



Initially, the museum will open on Fridays and Saturdays *only*, from 10.00 am to 4.30 pm



East Herts' newest community venue in Ware, dedicated to making creative experiences and activities available to all.

Ware's Southern Maltings has been a long time in the making. In 1974, the Ware Arts Society was founded and opened negotiations with East Herts District Council (EHDC) – owners of the site—following local government reorganisation. A fire in the north Cowl delayed progress but, in 1980, a lease was eventually acquired for the entire Southern Maltings and planning consent for its comprehensive redevelopment as an arts centre obtained.

Between 1980 and 2013, the premises had multiple uses besides providing a base for Ware Arts Centre (WAC)—club, pub, document store—but parts of the building remained unused as they needed extensive upgrading and there was insufficient funding.

In January 2014, East Herts District Council put the whole building up for sale, but a two-year campaign to retain it was fought by WAC and local residents, until in February 2016 the Council agreed to grant a 30-year lease for the development of the Southern Maltings as a 'Community Arts for All Centre'.

Now there is a full programme of events, covering every aspect of the arts. There's an excellent website, colourful publicity and a clear vision...

"Whatever your age or background, our aim is to make the Southern Maltings an exciting place for you to learn, experience and explore your personal creativity; to make new friends and have fun...Being creative isn't just about workshops and courses, it's also about theatre experiences, musical events, artistic exhibitions and socialising with like-minded individuals. We aim to provide all that, and more!

Hertford Theatre will be presenting their annual Christmas production at Southern Maltings, while the theatre in Hertford is being extended and refurbished.







Breathing Space is an Exhibition by artists from The Herts Visual Arts East Group. Eight artists will do demonstrations which will start at 11.30 am and 1.30 pm.

There are more than 1,000 branches of the University of the Third Age in the UK, 3 of which are in the Borough of Broxbourne. Lea Valley was the first to be set up in 1992, Broxbourne started in 2000 and Cheshunt has been going since 2010. Total membership within the borough (under *normal* circumstances) is usually just over 2,000 people and each branch is self-governing, with a substantial range of interest groups and activities on offer throughout the year. There are no specific membership criteria, but the organisation is of particular appeal to the retired, or those no longer in full-time employment.

Subjects on offer include: **Arts**: Art Appreciation, Painting, Crafts, Book Club, Creative Writing, Flower Arranging, Poetry, Play Reading, Reading For Pleasure, Shakespeare, all kinds of Music, Ballet, Ballroom, Country and Line Dancing, Tap Dancing, Theatre Visits.

Hobbies, Indoor / Social Activities: Antiques and Collectables, Astronomy, Bird and Nature Watch, Bridge, Chess, Cribbage, Gardening, Knitting, Mah Jong, Members On Their Own (MOTO), Model Making, Photography, Pub Lunches, Scrabble, Stamp Collecting, Wood Turning.

Languages: French, Spanish

Physical Activities: Badminton, Boules, Croquet, Cycling, Golf, Keep Fit, Movement and Mobility, Pilates, Sailing, Short Mat Bowls, Table Tennis, T'ai Chi, Walking Football, Walking Netball, Walking, Yoga.
