Reprieve for the GO Hub, or 'Stay of Execution'?



It looks as though the boroughowned Goff's Oak venue, formerly known as the Village Hall, *will* have the vital building repairs to allow it to re-open.

Apart from the Covid situation, the premises were closed and declared 'unsafe', due to long-term problems with the roof.

It was just over two years ago that **Mayhem Theatre Arts** took over the management of the hall. They had plans to develop it into a thriving community asset, like their Hoddesdon base, with some additional facilities and a wider range of activities and events, but these were frustrated by the structural problems.



The Borough of Broxbourne had also considered eventually *replacing* the building and extending the site,

but it seems that this is now unlikely to happen in the near future, if at all.

There aren't many medium-size venues with theatre facilities left in the borough now, which is a real problem for small groups such as **Cheshunt Dramatic Society**, whose regular 'home' was Wolsey Hall. Sadly, the Spotlight, with a capacity of 500 plus, is too big and too expensive, so it is vital to retain / provide some smaller

alternatives to sustain successful community activities.





New Terms and Conditions at the Spotlight

Around the Groups Having now received outline details of some significant changes in the terms and conditions of hiring the Spotlight when it re-opens in February 2022, regular users, such as the Broxbourne and Lea Valley U3As, *are* beginning to make bookings for their main monthly meetings in 2022, but *price* increases aren't

yet known. U3A groups' memberships are currently considerably depleted, with nearly a third of previous members not yet renewing their subscriptions because of Covid fears and vulnerability, but average attendance at monthly meetings in the past has usually been in excess of 150 and there are no *alternative* venues with a similar capacity within the borough, so there is some concern about what the changing conditions will mean for them.





Impact on Theatre Groups. BArts and the affiliated performing arts groups, such as **Broxbourne Theatre Company, Hoddesdon Players** and the theatre schools, are in a different position, since their events will be affected by: *reduced*, crucial rehearsal times, (get-in, dress

and technical) increased *commission* on ticket sales, a *charge* to advertise their event in **What's On** and the need for their publicity material to be *approved*, before being accepted for publication. In future, the Spotlight won't be taking venue bookings more than *six months* in advance and will have the right to *cancel* them with a shorter period of notice.

Several of **BArts'** regular events—**Let's Do Lunch, Behind the Scenes, Time For Tea** and **BArts in the Bar**, usually involve the serving of food supplied and prepared by them and sometimes a glass of wine in the ticket price, but it isn't yet known if / how these might be affected by changing terms, so booking dates ahead for 2022 hasn't yet been possible.

The fate of the popular, free **My Kind of Music** piano concerts isn't yet known either. The grand piano in the bar has had limited mobility due to long-term damage and reluctance to have it repaired and, since the bar was refurbished with new flooring, had been placed at the garden end of the area, not permitted to be moved and, sadly, completely changing the lively atmosphere of the concerts.



Art Exhibitions The bar acted as an art gallery for local artists for 20 years until September 2019, when it was decided that the walls should be left bare for the sake of potential wedding bookings. There is no comparable space for exhibitions in the borough and portable boards aren't the answer to accommodate sometimes as many as 50 framed pictures. Empty shops may be a short-term, temporary solution, but not really adequate for the *potential* in a borough of nearly100,000 residents.

End of the Box Office? It has been suggested that the physical box office in the Spotlight foyer might be done away with in the future and bookings and ticket-purchasing facilities focused mainly on-line, with the Spotlight bar also selling tickets for *on-the-spot* (**sorry!**) customers. We know that many people are *resistant* to change, but do hope that these new measures are for the *better*, and enable the Spotlight to realise, at last, its full potential as a vibrant community *asset*.





Stanboroughs, the Conservative Club in Conduit Lane, Hoddesdon. The venue has a capacity of around 130 on the first floor, accessed by

a small lift, is complete with bar / refreshment facilities, and has a very pleasant atmosphere. Socialising was the *main* feature of the afternoon, but entertainment was provided by Café Jazz, there was a short promotional DVD made by member John Astin, who died during the year, and the presentation of some long-service certificates and awards for outstanding contribution to the LVU3A.

With some recent examples of statues being pulled down, the names of buildings being changed (eg The Rhodes Centre in Bishop Stortford) and attempts to re-write history, the subject of 'Slavery' promoted some lively discussion at the **U3A History** group's meeting on August 23rd. Several past residents of Nazeing and Hoddesdon had links with the slave trade and made enough money to build substantial houses—Rawdon House in Hoddesdon being one example.

The Family History Group is hoping to resume live meetings on September 6th, with some discussion on unusual first names and surnames found in members' research.

In the afternoon of the 6th, the **Listening** to Music Group will be meeting live at Mayhem for a programme devoted to musical 'Villains' from Scarpia in Tosca to Jud Fry in Oklahoma.

A scene from 'Love Island' or a bedroom make-over in oh-so-fashionable grey? No! This is the latest Globe Theatre version of Shakespeare's 'Romeo and Juliet', which comes complete with a warning for hypersensitive souls. Shame about the socks!

Shame About Shakespeare!

The following extract from The Telegraph review by Allison Pearson was contributed by a BArts' Patron.....

^{******} Romeo, Romeo, wherefore hast thou not read the trigger warning before thou leap't upon mine balcony in manner both hasty and potentially a bit rapey and problematic for a modern audience?

The Globe Theatre has caused a stir by alerting audiences before performances of Romeo and Juliet to things which might upset them. Surely, it's only a matter of time before Shakespeare's characters are allocated new lines to show that, although they were created in times less enlightened than our own, they have finally got with the programme?

The Globe warns: "This production contains depictions of suicide, moments of violence and references to drug use. It contains gunshot sound effects and the use of stage blood. If you have been affected by any of the issues raised in this production of Romeo and Juliet, please find details below of organisations offering advice and support."

....The point of *Romeo and Juliet* was that it was *supposed* to be distressing. The original idea was that, as you watched the harrowing love story you would experience pity and fear, but the redeeming and shaping power of Shakespeare's art would deal with those strong emotions. No counsellor necessary!. If characters in every Shakespeare play are going to deliver their own trigger warnings, where will it all end?"

Theatre is not merely a pleasant, diversionary entertainment. It can have a serious purpose. It is often described as a reflection on real life, human interaction and society and can make a valuable contribution to people's experience and understanding of the world, human nature and individual emotions and maturity.

Audiences may sometimes be *shocked* into contemplating the unthinkable, dealing with it vicariously, empathising with the characters and undergoing a kind of catharsis before emerging *unscathed*, but *wiser*, from the auditorium. The old cliché '*If you can't stand the heat, get out of the kitchen*' could be applied here. Don't *go* to the theatre *at all* if you can't *cope* with a couple of hours of drama! There's far worse on TV!
