CELEBRATING THE PAST FOR OUR FUTURE Services of Broxbourne and East Herts are

nearing the end of their lottery-funded project to tell the story of the contribution the community and voluntary sector have made to local life over the past fifty years or so. Several BArts' affiliated groups and individuals have taken part in filmed interviews and provided significant artefacts, which, together with written material, will form a mobile exhibition that can be displayed in venues across the local area early in 2022. Staff and students of Herts Regional College, based at Turnford and Ware, have played an active part in the filming process.



The Lea Valley Family History Group scored a huge success with its oneday exhibition at Lowewood Museum, timed to coincide with Remembrance week and to incorporate members' own family memories of the two World Wars. The 'help-desk' was particularly busy all day, with computer and screen on site to allow on-the-spot research

and answer visitors' specific queries.

Around one hundred people attended; there was a similar number for the Model Railway Day at the museum during half-term.

So far, attendance at the recently re-opened museum has *exceeded* expectations, as have sales in the café and gift shop. On-site donations have also been encouraging.

So many people in the borough are still unaware of the museum's *existence*, however. A local taxi company, long-established in Hoddesdon, actually asked a client to name the road where the museum was situated! The same sort of ignorance has been apparent when museum volunteers have manned market stalls in Hoddesdon and Waltham Cross to distribute publicity.

A stalwart band of volunteers is currently undertaking numerous, vital, behind-thescenes jobs at Lowewood, transferring the inventory of artefacts to digital format and photographing and restoring some items. A member of the prestigious V and A museum team was recently on-site one weekend to offer expert advice on the care of the collection of costumes at the museum.

New Life for Hoddesdon's Old, Long-Abandoned 'Nick'!

One of the unattractive buildings next door to Lowewood Museum, the Hoddesdon Police Station, has been closed for many years, presumably waiting for some local developer to take the initiative and turn it into flats. (**Ed's note** I thought that the ground floor might make an extension for the museum, with flats above!)



Now, however, the building has been acquired by Teens Unite, the local cancer charity, thanks to the generosity of a long-

standing supporter.

Since November 8th, the premises have been the base for the charity's



office, plus a shop and aptly named **Jailbreak Café**, where customers can enjoy the unique experience of sipping their coffee in the original jail cells!

The shop will stock only *brand new* items of clothing and accessories from high street retailers, as well as a selection of books, rather than the more usual secondhand goods.

Proceeds from the venture will help to fund Teens Unite's long-term plans to build the first retreat in England for young people fighting cancer, at a site in Goff's Oak.

Local businesses / organisations will be able to hold meetings, activities and events within the building.

Have *you* heard of the Broxbourne Museum? It's in *Hoddesdon*, on the main road. Yes! Lowewood— a fine, listed building, Once a John Warner family abode. Double-fronted, it's classical Georgian, With elegant, high-ceilinged rooms, But, flanked by two 'blank', modern buildings, Its existence too often seemed doomed.

It once served as the Hoddesdon Library, Then a tiny Arts Centre became, With just *one* floor for a museum, Until the rest of the floors were so claimed. Lowewood Museum *has* flourished, For seven years, it was run by a team— Epping Forest Museum and our Borough, And it seemed quite a workable scheme.

But the partnership foundered on finance. Broxbourne Council withdrew its support For a lottery-funded project And alternative measures were sought. A lively campaign then developed, People-powered petition was strong, And, at length, Broxbourne Borough relented. *Maybe* its decision was wrong?

Meetings and proposals then followed To form Lowewood Museum Trust And with the help of a museum expert Legal issues were fully discussed. After various delays due to Covid, July 17th the re-opening day And since then the museum's been busy With exhibits, the gift shop and café.

The keen volunteer staff are so friendly And admission is totally free, There's a 'Borough at Christmas' nostalgic display And five other galleries to see. Lowewood's Broxbourne's past *and* its present With an eye on the future, too, It's *your* heritage and *your* museum. And with *your* support, plans *should* come true. Lowewood MU EUM






Walking the Dog Tony Barrell
